If Mr. Wise should be enabled to take his seat, the government will be in a minority; or if, as some persons anticipate, Mr. Pineau should appear, the Government will be defeated at the first vote. If neither can, or will take his seat, the tenure of the Government will depend upon the casting vote of Mr. Speaker; and, in the circumstances, seeing that if all the members elect were enabled to be present the Opposition would have a majority of two,—it is clearly the duty of the Speaker to give his casting vote in favor of a vote of want of confidence.

This is the course which is consistent with Parliamentary precedent.

A SUGGESTION.

Dr. Morrison's lecture was the last of this year's interesting course before the Natural History and Antiquarian Society. We trust that ere another course shall have been begun an arrangement will have been effected under which the large room in the Provincial building, formerly occupied by the Legislative Council, may be available for the purpose of holding the society's meetings, as well as for preserving the valuable books and papers obtained by the society, from time to time, and for the purposes generally of a library and museum. There is precedent for the adoption of such a reasonable arrangement in Nova Scotia and other provinces. The idea has occupied the attention of Premier Farquharson and others, and we trust that whoever may be in office next year, such an arrangement will be carried into effect.

—It is reported that there was an awful row in the camp, last evening, over the draft copy of The Speech published by THE EXAMINER. How it got out was the question. It is said that the Premier has not been so mad since the night on which he jumped over the table in the cabin in the West River steamer. But this may be an exaggeration. Of course the draft speech "would never do at all," and another had to be prepared forthwith.

—A statue of Gladstone is to be erected at Westminster. It is reported that the statue is a splendid work of art. It represents Mr. Gladstone with life-like fidelity in one of his most characteristic attitudes as an orator. The statue, including the plinth on which it rests, is eight feet in height, and the work has engaged the attention of F. W. Pomeroy, the sculptor, during the last eighteen months. With the permission of Her Majesty's Office of Works, the statue will be unveiled by Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman on Saturday, May 19. Carved in Carrara marble, Mr. Gladstone is represented in a characteristic attitude. His left hand is raised holding his notes, while his right hand rests on a pillar, which is covered with the robe of the Chancellor of the exchequer.

THE INDIANS OF AMERICA.

Whence Did They Come? And How?

These are the questions which were discussed by the Rev. Dr. Morrison, before the Natural History and Antiquarian Society in the upper hall of the Y. M. C. A. building last evening, the President of the Society, Mr. John Newson, presiding. As to the first question, Dr. Morrison repelled the idea held by some persons that the Indians of America are not of the same origin as the people of the Eastern Hemisphere. Concerning the second, he contended that they came over by three different routes of travel, (1) across Behring Strait, (2) from Kamtschatka, by way of the Aleutian Islands, (3) from other Asiatic countries across the Pacific ocean by way of the Pacific Archipelago, the Islands of which were more numerous than they are now.

Dr. Morrison drew from an ample store of learning in support of this theory. He showed that there had been great subsidences in the bed of the Pacific, by the fact that on the present ocean bottom coral reefs had been found which must at one time have been on or very near the surface; he maintained that many of the tribes of Eastern Asia were maritime and fearless, as well as curious, and that it was more than likely members of these tribes had adventured upon the ocean, from island to island, until America was reached. He referred to the similarity of certain ruins found on some of the islands of the Pacific and those found in Central America. From all these facts he argued that the early immigration of man to America was from the west towards the east and not from east towards the west. The dissimilarity of type and language he accounted for by reference to change of environment, intermixture of blood, fierce wars in which the weaker tribes were driven out or annihilated; and to the long continued custom of tabooing words, which necessitated the coining of entirely new words in their stead.

The lecture was followed with the closest attention, and warmly applauded at the close.

The vote of thanks was moved by Charles Palmer, Q. C., seconded by Mr. J. S. Clark, and supported by Mr. Percy Pope, and a hope was expressed that the reverend doctor would return to the subject next year.

Royal Donations

LONDON, May 5.—Queen Victoria has contributed 500 guineas and the Prince of Wales 250 guineas to the Mansion house, Ottawa fire relief fund. A Relief fund was opened at Glasgow to-day and about £2,000 was subscribed in a few hours.
