

Islanders Score Third Shutout In Series

Down Moncton Hawks 1-0 Last Night To Take 3-1 Lead In Semi-Finals

MONCTON, N.B., March 6 — (CP) — Goalie Hal Gordon chalked up his third straight shutout tonight as Charlottetown Islanders blanked Moncton Hawks 1-0 to take a 3-1 edge in their five-of-nine Maritime Major Hockey League semi-finals.

The outcome of the game was decided 34 seconds after the second period opened when Walt Pavlyshyn rapped in a loose puck from near the Moncton cage.

Bucko Trainor had carried the disc into Moncton territory from the face-off and it went loose after he lost it to a Moncton player.

Hawks displayed a sharper brand of hockey, in contrast with their mediocre performance of last night when they went down to a 5-0 defeat. But Islanders played it close all the way, checking closely and receiving flawless back-stopping from goalie Hal Gordon.

Most of the fireworks were exploded in the fast-moving first period when four players were sent to the penalty box, two of them drawing triple sentences, minor, major and misconduct for fighting.

The flare-up occurred when Mike Demchuk of the Hawks and Marcel Clements started a roughing duel behind the net. They dropped their sticks and traded punches until the referees pried them apart. Then they were tagged with misconducts for attempting to start a

second set-to after the first had been quelled.

Hawks missed many scoring chances through erratic shooting and long shots which were easily turned aside by Gordon. They hammered 36 drives at the Islanders' cinder, compared with the 20 turned aside by Les Colvin.

The teams will go to Charlottetown for the fifth game of the series Thursday night.

Halifax Defeats Saint John 6-1 For 3rd Win In Semi-Final Series

SAINT JOHN, N. B., March 6 — (CP) — Halifax St. Mary's sank Saint John Beavers under an avalanche of goals tonight, won the game 6-1 and came close to scuttling Beaver hopes of surviving the Maritime Major Hockey League playoffs.

It was the third straight triumph for Halifax in as many games of the best-in-nine semi-final series. The fourth and fifth contests will be played here Thursday and Saturday, with the series winner to meet either Charlottetown Islanders or Moncton Hawks in the league finals.

Hughie Campbell, with a brace, Eddie Brown and Rock Sullivan gave Halifax a 4-1 lead in the first period. After a scoreless middle session, Muckle Hollett and Cy Thomas added unnecessary tallies. The orphan Saint John goal was shot by Ossie Carnegie.

The pattern of the two previous playoffs was repeated as St. Mary's piled up a big early advantage which Beavers couldn't overcome.

Brown, with three assists in addition to his goal, led the game in scoring points. Sullivan had one and one and Bill Watson gained two assists.

They turned in the kind of performance, that unless we are mistaken, will see them come back fighting, despite the odds, when they meet Abbies again in that final contest that will be played over Western ice later this week.

But there was no denying Abbies superiority on the play. They skated faster, smoother on their passing and showed plenty of finish in and around the opposing cage. They had plenty of opposition from young Rogers in the Summerside cage, who despite the fact that the Abbies banged 15 pucks past him, successfully kicked aside 32 others and made Abbies work for every goal they got. P. E. Island Rink Loses Extra End Match To Manitoba 14-13

 HALIFAX, March 6 — (CP) — It took a rousing extra end in the second round of the Canadian curling championships tonight to put Manitoba in the select undefeated class with free-scoring British Columbia rink, a sizzling hot quartet from Nova Scotia and the by-ide Northern Ontario entry.

It was the second close call for Roy Frysth's rink from the Strathcona Curling Club of Winnipeg.

Barely pulling out a 10-9 victory over Quebec in the afternoon play, the Winnipeggers caught a surprisingly strong rink from Prince Edward Island tonight and a big five seventh end was a life-saver in the Westerners' 14-13 victory.

It was a different story with A. M. Chesser's rink from Trail, B. C. The west coast champions breezed through to two one-sided triumphs, hanging a 14-6 victory on Newfoundland in the opening round and walking off with a 20-9 win over a faltering Quebec rink.

But it was left to the Nova Scotia rink to provide the big highlight of the two rounds. The unheralded quartet from Kentville cut loose in the afternoon with an 11-9 victory over Saskatchewan and promptly confounded the experts again with a 9-7 setback for Ontario's entry from the Toronto Granite Club.

Northern Ontario had the bye tonight among the 11 provincial championship rinks and was still rated with the undefeated although it was a close call before the Northerners got by Alberta with a 9-8 first-round win.

Saskatchewan came back from a first round defeat at Nova Scotia's hands to win from Newfoundland tonight 15-5 and Alberta got an even break on the two rounds with a 10-8 win over New Brunswick.

Manitoba Surprised
 The Manitoba rink, figured to walk away with Prince Edward Island, found themselves in the toughest struggle of the night.

Skip Frank Acorn of the Island team knocked out two Manitoba rinks in the sixth end to give his rink a four count and take over the lead.

Forsyth got it back in a hurry and more, with a five in the seventh when he took out P. E. I.'s only counter with a brilliant shot and the house was left cluttered with Winnipeg stones.

The Islanders caught up again in the 12th when Acorn drew his last shot to give his rink two and tie the match.

Manitoba was lying one in the extra end when Acorn tried for a knockout and just missed.

Ontario's two defeats came as a distinct surprise. Gordon Campbell, who skipped a Hamilton Thistle rink to the championship in 1935, was edged out 12-8 by Nick Thibodeau's New Brunswick rink in the afternoon and by Nova Scotia's dose 9-7 win tonight.

Don Oyley's Kentville entry made their big end the 11th, with a three count that broke a 6-6 tie. In that end Campbell hit a guard and took his second shut out. Oyley drew in to give his rink the three and Ontario's single in the last end wasn't enough.

Thibodeau's rink from Bathurst, N.B., threatened to bring about a second upset for the Maritimers and was all even with Alberta 6-6 after seven ends.
