

Local and Other Items.

Onions were very scarce at the Market today. They sold for 10 cents per bushel.

Two corner loafers were fined \$3 or twenty cents at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court today.

Green are rather poor and scarce this morning. They sold in the Market to-day at 60 to 70 cents.

A meeting of the P. E. Island Poultry Association was held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, last evening, at 4 o'clock.

An unfortunate inmate, Jane Looney, was found dead in a lane in Toronto, on the 10th inst., she died from intemperance and exhaustion.

The liabilities of Mr. T. Sherman Peters, amount to about \$170,000; assets amount to \$15,000, including \$7,000 book value.

An Ottawa despatch to the Boston Journal states that the receipt of letters announcing the life of the Marquis of Lorne, and recent occurrences at Rideau Hall, caused a sensation.

The "Northern Light" reached Georgetown yesterday evening at 5 o'clock with mails and thirty passengers. She left again for Montreal at the usual hour this morning, and will return this evening.

Mr. SIMON JONES has been re-elected Mayor of St. John, N. B. The Election took place on the 10th inst. Mr. Jones was opposed by Mr. Allan who received 578 votes against making the majority 1057 for Mr. Jones.

PLANTING is made by farmers that a heavy load of snow still remains at the foot of Tea Hill, which is a great obstacle to parties having to draw loads up the hill. The Supervisor will have it removed at once.

THE NEWFOUNDLAND SEALERS.—The Newfoundland sealing steamer "Falcon" and "Star" arrived at St. John's Nfld., from the latter, Saturday; the former with 21,800 seals, the latter with 31,000 old and young seals worth nearly \$200,000.

The Post Office at Kamouraska, Quebec, was totally destroyed by fire on the night of the 9th. A sister of the postmaster perished in the flames. It was with the greatest difficulty that the registration office, which was in an adjoining building was saved. Origin of fire is not known.

It has been received here of the death of John McLeod, a native of this Island, and formerly employed on the Steamer "St. Lawrence." He died of yellow fever, on the United States war-ship, off the coast of China. He was about twenty-one years of age.—Herald.

THE BIRTH IN A TOWN.—The distinction of the first birth in the town of Broadview, in the Northwest Territory, belongs to Mr. G. Clark, wife, formerly of Alberton, P. E. Island. The child has been presented with a handsome carriage by the citizens, and in accordance with the custom, it is said the C. P. Railway Company will convey a deed of a parcel of land to the baby.

A very impressive ceremony was performed in Montreal, recently, by Mgr. Fabre, on the occasion of the reception of a number of young ladies into the community of the Sisters of the Congregation of Notre Dame. In the list of names of the two young ladies from this Island, namely, Miss Mary Ann Gaul, in Sister St. Marie; and Miss Lizzie Gaul, in religion Sister St. Joseph de Bernier.—Herald.

AN old landmark is being removed from the scene. Hazard's Corner, on Powell street, is being razed to the ground. Historic associations, it has stood the ravages of time well, and passed through scenes of varied interest. It was here that Hazard's Gazette was published, and its occupants during the years of its existence have embraced all classes. To hear that it is to be replaced by a fine new building.—Herald.

The Dynamite Scare.

LONDON, April 13. The dynamite prisoners were yesterday examined and remanded for a week. Great precautions are being observed in the city.

Another arrest of a dynamite plotter was made yesterday. The prisoner's name is McNulty.

Telegraph Notes.

A police steamer has been ordered to cruise in the vicinity of the Woolwich Arsenal day and night. A peculiar key found on Whitehead, of American make, is believed to belong to some magazine.

The London Times says there was practical reason for the haste in which the Bill in regard to explosives passed through the Parliament on the 9th, as some members of the dynamite party are believed to be on steamers now coming from America.

The Czar, accompanied by the Czarina, visited St. Petersburg on Friday last, and passed through the streets in an open carriage. They were unaccompanied by any escort whatever. The Czar seemed unusually thoughtful, and made scarcely any response whatever to the loyal salute of the public.

An Englishman named William Menefy, believed to be a crank, called at the Central Police Station, Pittsburg, Pa., on the night of the 9th, and stated that he was one of the murderers of Lord Leitrim, and wanted to give himself up. He claims he is a member of the Land League, a Nihilist and Socialist and says he was one of the six men chosen by the Land League to kill Lord Leitrim, and that they shot him on the Killarney Road, County of Antrim, Ireland, on November 18th, 1881. He was locked up.

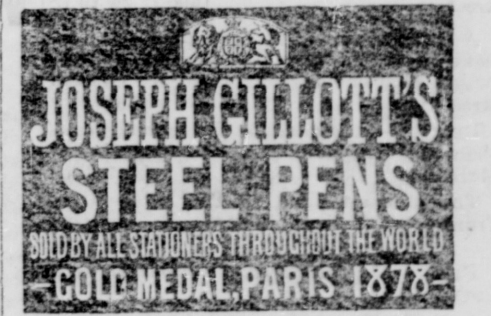

IN THE SUPREME COURT.

In the matter of An Act of the Parliament of Canada, passed in the forty-fifth year of Her present Majesty's reign, Chapter 23, intitled "An Act respecting Insolvent Banks, Insurance Companies, Loan Companies, Building Societies and Trading Corporations," and of the President, Directors and Company of the Bank of Prince Edward Island, an Insolvent Banking Company.
