2 tablespoons flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon curry powder

Lizards abound everywhere and the species are very numerous. There are those kind of the land, the water, etc. Every district has its kind; but they swarm in the desert places, while some frequent cultivated plains, and others the forest.

The hog was adored as a female deity in ancient Egypt, and was the symbol of regeneration. In the Book of Revelations hogs represent uncleanness.

Mana (What is it?) is a small white seed which tastes like wafer and honey. It comes from the tamarik trees near the Arabian desert. The Arabs collect it before sunrise, boil and strain it for eating; melts as soon as the sun rises.

Barley is the most universal cereal in the world, because it can be grown in countries where wheat and oats will not thrive.

The native soap of Palestine is made from olive oil and potash, and dates back from the remotest antiquity.

Tahrets were sounded in Biblical days to drown the cries of human victims sacrificed by fire, in the infamous Valley of Hinnom. The furnace itself was called topeth, and in Job XVII-6 the word means an abomination.

Beggars in Palestine scrape their teeth with their thumb nails, and then show the clean nails to those from whom they beg, as an evidence that no food has passed their lips the day.

Whales give birth to their young alive, just as a sheep does, and nurse them with milk. Some baby whales are 22 ft. long at birth and weigh up to 7 tons. Some baby! . . . The monkey wrench was named for its inventor, Charles Monkey, and not after the jungle animal by that name, as many persons believe.

Sixty years ago passenger pigeons were quite numerous but today not a single living specimen remains in the U. S. A. The last one died on Sept. 1, 1914, at the Cincinnati Zoo. Mounted, it now rests at the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D. C.

The following birds are known as "tree surgeons": Brownie creeper, downy woodpecker, black capped chickadee, white-breasted nuthatch and the golden-crowned kinglet—all live on destructive insects and their larvae.

Although surrounded by water, there is no drinking water to be had on the island of Capri. It is imported from Naples at a dollar a ton.

In 1948, Canadians smoked 15 billion cigarettes which cost approximately \$285,000,000. 66 per cent of these cigarettes were smoked by city folk and only 34 per cent by country people.

If you smoke one pack a day, you inhale 840 cubic centimeters of tobacco tar in a year. In other words, your throat and lungs feel the effects of 15 cocktail glasses of tobacco tar containing henzo-pyrene.

The Engelmann beetles work in pairs, a thousand pairs have been known to attack a single spruce tree. The female lays about 150 eggs in the inner bark, and the male mixes the boring dust with pitch and packs it around the eggs to protect them. When the family gets down to work the juices of the tree are completely cut off.

2 cups milk

1 can (approximately 8 oz.) of salmon

1/2 cup fine dry crumbs

Wash the rice and cook in boiling salted water until tender; drain, rinse and drain again.

Arrange the rice in the bottom of 6 greased individual baking dishes.

Cut hard-cooked eggs into halves and remove yolks carefully; mash yolks and blend in the Worcestershire sauce, vinegar, celery salt and molten with about 1 tablespoon mayonnaise or thick dressing. Pile yolk mixture back into egg-white halves, then put two halves into each of the prepared baking dishes.

Melt 2 tablespoons of the butter or margarine in a saucepan; remove from heat and blend in the flour, salt and curry powder. Gradually stir in the milk. Cook, stirring constantly, until smoothly thickened.

Drain and flake the salmon; add salmon to sauce and mix lightly. Spoon salmon mixture into baking dishes, over the rice and egg.

Melt the remaining 1 tablespoon butter and margarine and mix in the crumbs; sprinkle over casseroles.

Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, until heated through—about 30 minutes.

 In the land in which we live.

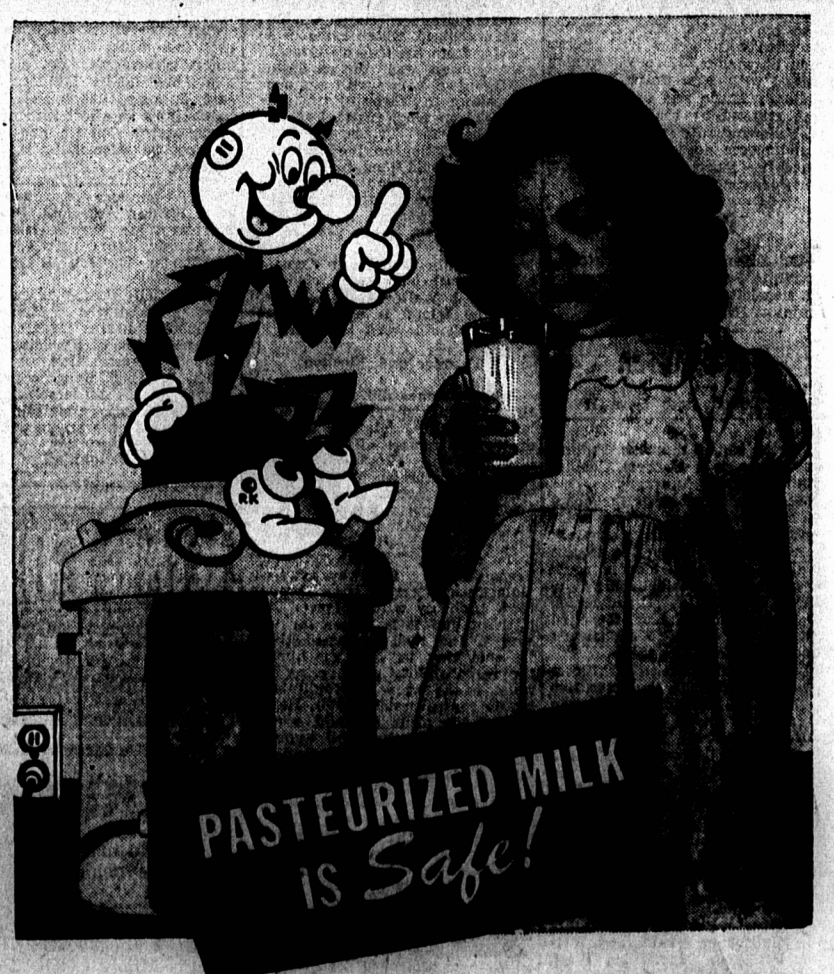
