PROSPERITY BY COMPARISON.

(Montreal Star.)

Taking the exports of a country as one of the surest signs of the nation's prosperity, it is interesting to compare those of Canada with those of the United States, Great Britain, our best customers, and of Denmark, whose natural products greatly resemble those of the Dominion. The figures bear out, what is generally known, that the prosperity of the present time is of widespread area, but that Canada does not share in it to the overwhelming extent the Liberal press and Liberal speakers would have us believe—that it resulted from their party's policy.

Making the comparison between the fiscal years 1895 and 1899, the following results are obtained:

Such a comparison plainly shows to all who reflect upon the matter the present Canadian Government are in no sense to be credited with any part in this increase of exports, small though it be in comparison with the countries named, as indeed in their failure to complete and carry out the fast Atlantic contract entered into by their predecessors, they have actually been the means of retarding improvement in trade probably less than it otherwise would have been.

It is not due to the Liberal party that we have the splendid Northwest as part of Canada, and a great railway carrying cargoes of golden grain and other produce for export from the heart of that once great wilderness, for they opposed it.

It is not due to the Liberal party that our canals have been improved, branch railways constructed in all parts of Canada, and increased facilities afforded the people for getting their products to places of shipment, for they opposed it and called it "bribing the people with their own money."

It is not due to the Liberal party that we have had splendid industries built up under the fostering care of the National Policy, and now counted among the world's producers, for they opposed it and called protection a "public robbery."

The success of Canada, the measure of prosperity we enjoy, is due to the bountiful harvests given by Providence, and the improved prices in the great markets of the world. But of what use would good harvests have been had the country not been opened up to cultivation; what use the improved markets if facilities to get to them had not been afforded by the foresight of the Liberal-Conservative party years ago? The Liberals since they came into power have shown a readiness to spend very freely money they had little to do with earning, taking millions more out of the pockets of the people than any previous Government, far exceeding their predecessors in expenditure and especially in the very lines they found most fault with when in Opposition. They have done nothing to bring about Canada's prosperity, and, years ago, when there was a time of depression, was called for to pull this country out of a period of depression they proved incapable.

They are now boasting of a prosperity they did not produce, and lavishly spending money they did not earn.

China's Military Strength.

The Chinese army, called "The Eight Banners," nominally contains about 300,000 descendants of the Manchu conquerors and their allies. The number maintained on a war footing is from 80,000 to 100,000. The whole force is subdivided into three groups, consisting of Manchus, Mongols and Chinese, and forms a sort of hereditary profession within which intermarriage is compulsory. About 37,000 are stationed in garrison in Manchuria. The Imperial Guard at Peking contains from 6,000 to 7,000, and these are the troops that were expected to defend the foreign legations and protect foreign interests from the mobs. The Yung Ping, or national army, is also called "The Green Flags," and "The Five Camps." This army consists of eighteen corps, one for each province, under the governor or governor general. The nominal strength is from 450,000 to 600,000 men, of whom about 200,000 are available for war, never more than one-third being called out. The most important contingent is the Tien Tsin army corps, nominally 100,000 strong, really about 35,000, with modern organization, drill and arms, employed in garrison duty at Tien Tsin and at Taku and other forts. Besides these forces there are mercenary troops, raised in emergencies, and Mongolian and other irregular cavalry, nominally 200,000 strong, really about 20,000, but of no military value. The total army on a peace footing is put at 300,000 men, and on a war footing at about 1,000,000; but the army as a whole has no unity or cohesion; there is no proper discipline, the drill is mere physical exercise, the weapons are long since obsolete and there is no transport, commissariat or medical service.

FOUGHT ACROSS SON'S GRAVE

NEW YORK, June 20.—Over the grave of their little son in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, in Patterson, N. J., on Saturday, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Dreyer, whose domestic troubles have separated them, quarrelled bitterly, and she hurled at her husband the fresh flowers he had placed upon the mound. Dreyer was accompanied by Mrs. Jennie Carson, a young and pretty widow who, Mrs. Dreyer says, is responsible for her unhappiness.

"You hypocrites, leave this place at once!" shouted Mrs. Dreyer, approaching her husband and his companion with an upraised club. Mrs. Carson fled down the lane.

"Now touch that grave if you dare," continued the infuriated woman. "If you touch it it will be at the peril of your life."

Mrs. Dreyer was accompanied by her sister, Miss Mary Wyner. She, too, threatened the husband and then, with Mrs. Dreyer, tore the flowers from the grave and threw them at him with the remark, "You did not care for the child living and you shall not make the pretence now."

Dreyer later in the day made a complaint against his sister-in-law before Justice Johnston, charging her with malicious mischief. Miss Wyner gave bail. Lawyer Dunn, her counsel, insists that both Dreyer and Mrs. Carson were both trespassers and that Mrs. Dreyer may order both from the grave.

Is it Russia?

The belief grows stronger everywhere in Europe except in France that Russia is playing a deep game of self-aggrandizement in China. Few go so far as to confirm that she instigated the great massacre which it is now believed has taken place. Such an idea is really absurd, for the rising sun grows to such proportions that extensive operations by all the powers are now inevitable and no country will now consent to Russia's taking a disproportionate part in the operations. It is impossible as yet to furnish definite information as to the respective attitudes of the powers or to say whether a tentative agreement has actually been reached, but the attempt in Paris to show serious disagreement on certain points do not find credence in London. The fact that the combined fleet acted in hearty co-operation in the capture of the Taku forts is taken as a good augury of successful unity in the greater operations for the subjugation of the country which must follow.

The Bombardment of Taku

ST. PETERSBURG, June 20.—Vice-Admiral Alexejoff, from Port Arthur, reporting the capture of the Taku forts, says the bombardment fleet was commanded by the Russian Captain Dobrowolski, as senior officer present. The Russian losses were two lieutenants killed, one severely and one slightly wounded, and 16 men killed, and 67 wounded. The gunboat Giljok was seriously damaged by a shell below the water line and must be docked for repairs. The gunboat Norejez was made to leak in six places and had her cabin destroyed. The gunboat Bobr was damaged. Besides the above, Admiral Alexejoff says the French warship Lion, the British Algerine and the German gunboat Illis participated in the engagement.
