PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

TUESDAY, April 19.

House met at 11.45.
Hon Mr. Warburton presented "The Charlottetown Sewerage Act," which was ordered to be read a second time tomorrow.
Hon Mr. Rogers moved the House into committee on the second reading of the bill relating to the regulating and driving of bicycles on the streets of the city. The bill provides for the imposition of a tax or license not exceeding \$1 and for a fine not exceeding \$25 for infractions of said law.
Mr. Prowse moved in amendment that the bill be read a second time this day three months.
Mr. Shaw seconded the motion for the three months hoist.
After discussion, the amendment was put and carried, only two members, Hon. Messrs. Rogers and McNutt—appearing in favor of the bill as introduced.
Hon Mr Macdonald introduced a bill to alter the time for holding certain terms of the Supreme Court as the several counties of this Island. Second reading tomorrow.
Hon Mr Macdonald introduced a bill amending the July Amendment Act, 1888, which was set down for second reading tomorrow.
Mr D A McKinnon introduced a bill providing for the better auditing of the public accounts. Second reading tomorrow.

On motion of Hon H C Macdonald the House went into committee on the bill respecting Queen's Counsel, Mr Prowse in the chair. The bill provides for the appointment of Queen's Counsel by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council if this Province, and makes lawful the appointments that have already been made in this way.
At one o'clock recess was taken until three.
At the afternoon session the bill respecting Queen's Counsel was further considered in committee and adopted with amendments. The third reading was fixed for tomorrow.
On motion of Hon. Mr. Rogers the bill amending the Charlottetown Waterworks Act was read a third time and passed.
Mr. Arthur Peters presented a bill to alter some of the provisions of the wills of William Douglas and George Douglas, late of Head of Hillsborough. The bill was referred to the Private Bills Committee.
On motion of Hon. Mr. Warburton the House resumed committee on the bill respecting assignments for the benefit of creditors. In committee the bill was discussed by the promoter, Hon. Mr. Gordon, Hon. H. C. Macdonald, Mr. Shaw, Mr. Sinclair and Mr. McKinnon. The bill was then reported agreed to with amendments, and made the order of the day for third reading tomorrow.
House adjourned until ten o'clock on Wednesday.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 20

House met at 10.30
Mr. D. A. McKinnon asked the Leader of the Government if a petition had been received from some inhabitants of Townships 59 and 61 asking for a proper survey of the line between these townships and whether the Government will proceed with the matter.
Hon. Mr. Warburton said the petition had been received but had not yet been fully considered. There was a likelihood however, that the survey would be proceeded with.
Mr. D. A. McKinnon asked the Commissioner of Public Works when the proposed Road from Wilmont, Lot 64, to Murray River will be surveyed and proceeded with according with the petition presented; also whether any progress has been made with the opening up of Blue's Road Extension, St. Mary's Road connection with Sturgeon and the Heatherdale Valley field Road, and when these will be completed.
Hon. Mr. Warburton said he was not prepared to answer the first question at the present moment. With regard to the second question he believed the work would be proceeded with during the summer.
Mr. Shaw asked the Commissioner of Public Works to table the plans and copies of all specifications and also copies of all tenders for the construction of a new wing or addition to the Hospital for the Insane at Falconwood, the name of the tender accepted, and also a copy of the bond and agreement between the Government and the person whose tender was accepted, also all papers and correspondence between the person whose tender was accepted and the Government, also a copy of all reports relating to the aforesaid wing or addition, the names of the person or persons from whom plans and specifications were obtained, the amount paid or agreed to be paid for each plan and specification respectively, the name of the person appointed Inspector, and a copy of the agreement entered into by Government with said Inspector, and the amount paid or agreed to be paid for services of said Inspector.
Hon Mr. Warburton promised copies of the original plans and specifications or the plans and specifications themselves and such other information as could be brought down. He could not promise to bring down copies of the correspondence asked for inasmuch as the correspondence was not yet completed and he could not promise to bring down an incomplete return.
Mr. Arsenault asked the Commissioner of Public Works to table a detailed statement of all money expended by John McKinnon, Road Supervisor, for District No. 10, Prince County, during the past year.
Hon Mr McLean said all this information might be found in the Supervisor's returns in the Public Works Office. The hon. member could get it there.

Mr. Birch asked the Commissioner of Public Works to table plan and specification of the Gillan Bridge, Lot 3, also showing in detail a copy of all tenders for the repairs of Gillan's Bridge, Lot 3, the name of the tender accepted, and the amount paid to said contractor, the name of the Inspector appointed, and the amount paid or agreed to be paid for services of said Inspector per day, the number of days said Inspector was employed.
Hon. Mr. McLean promised the information.
Mr. Birch asked the Leader of the Government to table a statement showing names of all persons who received Teachers licenses from the 1st January 1894, till January 1897, and date when said licenses were issued respectively.
Hon Mr. Warburton had no objection to bringing down the information asked for. But the hon. member could get all the information he wanted at the Education Office.
Mr. Birch asked the Commissioner of Public Works to table a statement showing in detail a copy of all tenders for the construction of Doyle's Bridge, Lot 1, the name of the tender accepted, and the amount paid to said Contractor, the name of the Inspector appointed, and the amount paid or agreed to be paid for services of said Inspector per day, the number of days said Inspector was thus employed.
Hon. Mr. McLean promised all the information asked for.
Mr. McKinnon asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to complete McLenna's road leading from High Bank Road to Grey's Road according to the contract subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Public Works, entered into on the 20th of June 1896, and renewed July 1897.
Hon. Mr. Warburton said this question had already been answered.
Hon. Mr. McDonald moved the House into committee with Mr. Forbes in the chair on the bill to alter the time for holding certain terms of the Supreme Court in the several counties of the Island. Progress was reported.
Hon. Mr. McDonald moved the House into committee with Mr. Forbes in the chair on the bill respecting the Jury Amendment Act. Progress was reported.
Mr. Arthur Peters moved the House into committee on the bill incorporating the Charlottetown Light and Power Company, Limited.
The House took recess.

A GRIEVOUS MISTAKE.

U. S. Consul McGarr Thinks Eis Country's Action Unjustifiable.

Boston, April 19.—Consul McGarr, who has lately returned from Cienfuegos, is quoted by the Globe as follows:
"A declaration of war against Spain by the United States would be a grievous mistake."
"The situation in Cuba has been most grossly, yes criminally, exaggerated by irresponsible persons for the purpose of bringing on a war between Spain and the United States."
"The people of Cienfuegos, where I was stationed, were profoundly grieved and surprised at the possibility of war between Spain and the United States when I left there."
"I hardly believed my instructions recalling me a week ago yesterday."
"How many Americans are there in Cienfuegos?"
"I should say about 150 in all."
"You don't seem to be much of a Cuban enthusiast?"
"No, sir, I'm not. I think we have completely lost our heads over this Cuban revolution."

CANADA'S CREDIT AT STAKE.

(Canadian Grocer.)
Should the insolvency bill, now before the House of Commons, fail to become law Canada will undoubtedly lose prestige among the business community in Great Britain.
The influential deputation which waited upon the Finance Minister when he was in London, the tone of the British press ever since the preferential tariff was brought down in June last, and the private expressions of commercial men in the Mother Country have all emphasized the necessity of Canada passing an insolvency law. And now the British exchange to hand are urging the adoption of Dr. Fortin's bill.
The Canadian Gazette, a journal published in London, England, primarily in the interest of Canada, says:
"It is satisfactory to know that there is still some possibility of insolvency legislation this session at Ottawa. The Canadian House of Commons can hardly be blind to the fact that the time is more than ripe for resolute effort to remedy a state of affairs which is at once damaging to the Dominion's credit and a serious hindrance to the trade development which she is rightly anxious to promote."
"Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself frankly admitted the existence of a universal desire for reform," remarks the same paper, and it urges him to lend his influence in passing the bill. It is to be hoped he will do so.
The Canadian Grocer does not for one moment believe that the rejection of Dr. Fortin's bill would destroy Canada's credit in Great Britain or that it would prevent the development of trade so much desired.
But we have no hesitation in saying that the rejection of the bill will injure Canada's credit and will hinder trade development which business men in both Canada and Great Britain are aggressively trying to induce.
