GRAVE CRISIS IN INDIA.

Heavy Expenditures and Probable Loss of Life.

The Fall of Fort Ali Masjid Was a Serious Blow.

BOMBAY, Aug. 26.—The latest despatches from the front indicate that the situation is getting worse. It is evident that the Indian Government must face a grave crisis involving heavy expenditures and probable loss of life. The fall of Fort Ali Masjid was a serious blow, for it isolates Fort Luni Natal at the extreme end of the Khyber Pass, which is garrisoned by 300 rifles, and necessitates the prompt reconquest of the pass. This will prove a most formidable task. The wildest excitement prevails among Hindoo traders at the board.

SIMLA, Aug. 26.—All the British army officers on leave of absence have been ordered to return to their regiments immediately.

PESHAWAR, August 24.—It is reported that a large number of Afrids, led by fanatical priests, attacked the Sepoys about noon yesterday, massacring 300, capturing their rifles and then proceeding in large force to make an attack upon the British garrison on the Lowragt. There is a very uneasy feeling in Quetta, where the troops are under orders to be in readiness to march to New Chaman, which is the extreme outpost of the Afghan frontier, southeast of Kandahar, and on the edge of the Registan desert, between the provinces of Toba and Pishin. Khyber pass is swarming with Afrids, and it is feared that the fall of Fort Maude has greatly encouraged the rebellious elements.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—A special despatch from Bombay says there is an unconfirmed rumor in circulation there that the Afrids have attacked Fort Ali Masjid with great determination. The garrison made a sortie in full force, endeavoring to disperse them but met with a terrible resistance and lost 200 killed. The remnant of the garrison then abandoned the post and made its way to the station on the Lowragt.

PRESIDENT KRUGER'S LATEST

Likely to Cause Excitement in Great Britain.

PRETORIA, Aug. 26.—At a meeting of the Volksraad yesterday, president Kruger delivered a speech which is likely to cause the greatest excitement in Great Britain. During the course of his remarks he declared that though the convention of 1881 established the suzerainty of Great Britain over the South African republic yet as the convention of 1884 omitted to mention the matter of such suzerainty therefore the republic cannot acknowledge any such suzerainty.

President Borda Assassinated.

MONTEVIDEO, Aug. 26.—During the national fete yesterday President Borda was shot and killed by an assassin. He was elected President of Uruguay in 1894. The assassination occurred just as he was leaving the cathedral.
