The 25-year-old Bedard, first-seeded Canadian in the tournament, opened up with a strong passing game and kept Clark off balance through the match except in the third set, when the Philadelphian displayed a sharp net game.

Clark was the third-seeded foreign entry.

Clark and Bedard held a temporary set-aside strike in the third set after a linesman did not call a close shot, both players thought was good. They refused to play until the linesman was replaced.

Ramanathan Krishnan of India, top-seeded foreign entry, continued his winning ways, beating Montreal's color full lefthander Henri Bouchon 7-5, 6-4, to enter the quarter-finals against Carlos Fernandez of Brazil.

Fernandez, hero of the Brazil Canada Davis Cup tie in Montreal last month, eliminated Vancouver's Paul Willey 3-6, 6-1, 6-1 in a third-round match.

Boxing Manager Is Displeased

LONDON (Reuters) — Harry Shepherd, manager of Canadian lightweight boxer Gordon Wallace, said here Wednesday Canada may withdraw from the British Commonwealth and Empire boxing championship committee.

Shepherd said that the president of the Canadian boxing board of control was "so upset" at the committee's decision to deprive Wallace of the empire title that his action was contemplated.

"I had a guarantee from the Canadian boxing board that only the Canadian national title would be at stake when Wallace met Yvon Durelle and lost in two rounds at Montreal, N.B., May 30," Shepherd claimed.

Less than a month later, the empire championship committee dethroned Wallace and named Durelle new empire titleholder.

Shepherd will be joined by Wallace in London next Saturday and they will both fly to Johannesburg Monday to prepare for Wallace's fight against Mike Holt of South Africa Aug. 31.

"The fight in South Africa will, as far as I am concerned, be for the empire title," Shepherd said. "I maintain that Gordon is still champion and I am consulting lawyers here about possible legal action against the empire championship committee."
