DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Timber Limits Again.

Charlton's Resolution Defeated.

OTTAWA, Aug. 6. In the House yesterday Charlton moved his amended resolution regarding timber limits. He paraded a lot of exploded scandals. He declared that members of Parliament should not lease timber limits. When Sir John Thompson extorted from him the admission that he was a lessee himself, being confounded with the affidavit he had made, which was altogether inconsistent with the fact, Sir Richard Cartwright came to his rescue and apologized for him, as also for the acts of the late McKenzie Government, in letting timber limits. The resolution was defeated by a vote of 100 to 81, a majority of 19. Thirty-one members were absent. The Speaker was in bed all day. One Grit member broke his pair and voted.

THE TARTE-MCGREEVY CASE

Thomas McGreevy's Evidence

He Contradicts Robert McGreevy's Testimony

AND MURPHY'S ALLEGATIONS.

OTTAWA, Aug. 6. In the Tarte-McGreevy case, Thomas McGreevy was examined. He gave an emphatic denial of Murphy's allegations and of Robert McGreevy's testimony. Statement after statement sworn to by these men, he unhesitatingly declared to be false. He never received the moneys alleged to have been paid him by Robert McGreevy and Murphy from the proceeds of the Connolly contracts. He explained his connection with the steamer Admiral, admitting that he was the real, although not the registered owner. Nothing had ever been stated in his presence about payments of money to Sir Hector Languevin. He had received fifty thousand dollars from Connolly's firm for political purposes between 1883 and 1887, and spent it in elections in the Province of Quebec. As for the rest of the charges, he gave them a distinct and categorical denial. McGreevy's evidence has awakened considerable surprise in consequence of reports circulated by the Grits that he was going to make a full confession of guilt to save Languevin. People are beginning to see that there is another side to the story. There was a great deal of excitement yesterday, consequent upon the charges made in the Senate Railway Committee by the Solicitor of the Ontario Bank, that one hundred thousand dollars of subsidy, voted by the Quebec Government and charged as paid by the Chaleur Railway Company, had been intercepted by Mercier and his colleagues and used for political purposes.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, Aug. 6.—Cod fair and herring poor at English Bay. Cod and herring poor at Fox Bay. Quebec.—Cod good at Magpie and Shel-drake and Moise; fair at Thunder River, Long Point, Pierce and Newport Point. Lunenburg very good at Thunder River, Long Point and Shel-drake. Herring very plentiful at Magpie. New Brunswick.—Cod fishing good at Escominac, and cod, haddock, halibut, hake, herring, mackerel and sardines very plentiful at Campello. P. E. Island.—Mackerel fishing poor at Mimmingsh, but good at Malpeque. Cod fair at the latter. Hake plentiful at Souris. Cape Breton.—Hake plentiful at hake and mackerel fisheries good at Port Hood, but bait scarce. A fair catch of cod at Margaree and of herring at Arichat; but fisheries poor at other places. Nova Scotia.—Cod fair at Lunenburg and Port Medway; poor at Lockeport. Mackerel good at Lunenburg and Port Medway, and fair at Lockeport. Herring very plentiful at Port Medway and Lockeport. Bait and squid very plentiful at Beaver Harbor, N. S., where 50 pounds were taken in traps at night. Also plentiful at English Bay and Margaree, C. B. A fair quantity at New Port, Que., and Campello, N. B. Herring bait procurable at Lockeport, N. S.

Seining to be Abolished.

The Dominion Government purpose passing at the present session of Parliament an act to prevent seining within the three mile limit. We believe that this law will meet the approbation of our fishermen. Owners of seines may grumble a little; but private interests must give way to the public good. The destructive practice of seining will not be abolished any too soon.
