WAR NEWS.

Special Dispatch to Examiner.

LONDON, March 16.

The Russians near Bouclair have been reinforced.

St. Petersburg, March 17.

Golos states that in accordance with the orders of the Minister of the Interior, Magistrates of St. Petersburg are compiling lists of persons qualified to officer the Militia, which is about to be formed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 17.

A strong detachment of patrols watch day and night on account of the great excitement which prevails over the posting of seditious placards.

The Turkish garrison of Shumla and Nana, numbering 58,000 men, besides 16,000 Egyptian troops are expected here.

VIENNA, March 17.

It is said that serious negotiations are proceeding between Sir Henry Elliott and Count Andrassy for an alliance between England and Austria. If the negotiations succeed, Andrassy's position will be strengthened; if they fail, a Ministerial crisis will ensue, and Andrassy may possibly resign.

St. Petersburg, March 17.

Ratifications of the Treaty of Peace were exchanged to-day. The conditions of peace will be published as soon as communicated to the Powers. Raouf Pasha will depart immediately.

LONDON, March 17.

Typhus fever rages at Adrianople and Philippopolis. There is much sickness at Erzeroum and Constantinople.

ROME, March 17.

Edward B. Malet, First Secretary of the British Embassy here, will accompany Lord Lyons to the Congress as Secretary.

LONDON, March 17.

A telegram from Constantinople says that Raouf Pasha is empowered to request that Varna be restored to Turkey.

There is less excitement at the Government works at Woolwich than for several weeks, but there is no abatement of energy and no diminution of work. Nearly all hands are at work until 8 or 10 o'clock at night, instead of 5 p. m., the usual closing hour.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 17.

Raouf Pasha bore a letter from the Sultan begging the Czar to permit some modification of the boundary of Bulgaria, especially on the south.

England has obtained permission to disembark some troops on the Island of Teredasa, and send four more iron-clads to the sea of Marmora. M. Onon Dragsmor, of the Russian Legation, has protested against these concessions.

GENERAL NEWS.

LONDON, March 14.

All the corpses of the miners at work at the time of the explosion, 44 in number, have been recovered from the Kearsley colliery.

BELFAST, I., March 14 (midnight).

Danville's distillery is burning; damage already \$400,000.

LONDON, March 14.

A dispatch from Plymouth, Eng., says: "Wivern," turret ship, built for the South-eastern rebels, but detained by the Government, and ever since moored in the harbor, has been brought to Davenport Dockyard to be prepared for commission.

Damage by fire to Dunville's distillery, Belfast, was half a million dollars. Thirty six excursionists attending a fair at Brest, France, were drowned to-day by the capsizing of a barge.

BALTIMORE, March 14.

It is thought that in Baltimore that Kinnear and others on the brig "Alexis" murdered the captain of that vessel (Campbell), but by some it is thought that Williams may have been an assumed name for Campbell. Advices from Nova Scotia will settle this fact. The cargo is to be sent to Hamburg.

LONDON, March 13.

In consequence of the alarming spread of typhus fever at St. Petersburg, many families are leaving the city. Fresh cases are estimated at between 300 and 400 daily.

The Austrian steamship "Sphinx," which took fire with 2,500 Circassians on board, causing the loss of 700 of them, was fired by the Circassians during an *emeute*. They had previously plundered the vessel.

NEW YORK, March 14.

The heaviest storm ever experienced in West Virginia passed over Jefferson County on Monday night. Hailstones larger than eggs fell for an hour, unroofing houses, breaking glass and killing cattle, hogs and sheep. The heavy rain which followed washed out the growing wheat. The damages is estimated at \$75,000 to \$100,000.

OTTAWA, March 15.

At Toronto, W. Malcolm, aged 13, was arrested in school yesterday for attempting to wreck a Grand Trunk Railway train, by placing a fence rail and large stones on the track, "just to see," he said, "what would happen!" The obstructions were discovered in time to avoid an accident.

A Mollie Maguire, arrested at Thorold for murder in Pennsylvania, has been extradited at Kingston.

A number of steamers and sailing crafts are preparing to resume navigation. At Port Roan, last night, three buildings were burned, and the Baptist Church and other buildings were threatened at last advices.

COLOGNE, March 13.

The "Gazette's" special from Rome says the Pope is considering the expediency of appointing Cardinal Ledochowski, Arch-

bishop of Posen, to a post in the Vatican, to pave the way for the appointment of Archbishop of Posen in agreement with the German Government.

PARIS, March 13.

The newly founded Communistic journal, *La Commune Afranchi*, has been seized.

LONDON, March 13.

Hesper won the grand international race handicap, at Craydon, to-day.

The deficiency will be considerably increased when the shrinkage in the assets are considered. In some of the above estates where the assets are nominally as large as the liabilities, the settlements did not amount to fifty per cent. on the liabilities.

Review of the Weather During February.

A weather review is issued monthly from the Meteorological Office, Toronto, by Mr. G. T. Kingston, the Superintendent. The review of February's weather, just received, states that during that month the mean atmospheric pressure, at all stations, was below that of January. It was also below the average for the four previous years, the difference being greatest at places in Ontario. It was considerably lower than in the same month last year, at all places in Ontario, but differed very little at other stations.

The mean temperature was above the average for the four previous years, at all stations, the difference being greatest at places west of Quebec. It was slightly below the mean for the same month in 1877.

The total amount of rain and snow-fall was considerably above that in the same month in 1877, at all stations west of Montreal, and below at all other places except Halifax and Charlottetown, P. E. I. It was below that of January at all stations except in the neighborhood of Lake Erie and stations in the north of Ontario. It was above the average for the four previous years at all the stations in Ontario, except in the extreme north-west, the excesses being greatest at Port Dover, and below at all stations except at Charlottetown, P. E. Island.

The probabilities issued daily at 10 a. m., were posted in the telegraph and post offices at 95 of the principal places in Canada. The average time of posting the bulletins at places in the Maritime Provinces was 11 a. m., Toronto time. The number of predictions issued was 332.
