Tiny Invader From Space Hits Earth's Atmosphere

WASHINGTON (CP)—A tiny, super-powered invader from distant space penetrated our system last month and crashed into the earth's atmosphere, setting off a cosmic ray shower over New Mexico.

The invader was a mere nucleus of atoms, but physicists say its energy was so great it may have come from some distant star, outside our own Milky Way.

The event is reported, in the current issue of Physical Review Letters by John Lindsay of the laboratory for nuclear sciences at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Lindsay detected the shower at the Volcano Ranch recording station near Albuquerque, N.M.

Physicists report that the atomic nucleus that invaded the earth's atmosphere must have come from a much more energetic galaxy than our own, because of its enormous power.

It is created from the earth's air blanket, it struck the nucleus of an atom of the air—and the resulting atomic debris grew by a sort of chain reaction into a shower of high-speed atomic particles.

A man-made machine could produce that powerful a particle would have to be as large as the earth's orbit around the sun.

Other high-energy particles have been observed in the past, but this one was described as a record-breaker.

One theory cited as a possible explanation for the high-energy cosmic particles is that our galaxy or family of some hundred billion stars acts as a huge accelerator.

The magnetic field in the galaxy—a billion times weaker than the magnetic field in a man-made atom accelerator—holds the particles in the galaxy while the particles are accelerated to tremendous energies over the vast range of the galaxy.

The assessment was made Friday by Emile Alias, twice world ski champion.

Alias said "she is very talented. Classical dancing has given her excellent legs, the legs of a champion if she wanted."

\$6 Million Settlement Made in Divorce Case

HOUSTON (AP)—Mrs. Cecil Blaffer Hudson, divorced from multi-millionaire Edward Hudson, won an uncontested property settlement of \$6,500,000 in Domestic Relations Court and her lawyer said it may be a record.

Mrs. Hudson, a Humble Oil saleswoman, filed for divorce in 1943. They separated in 1940, when he used for divorce. Mrs. Hudson filed for divorce in 1943, charging Hudson with acts of cruelty and desertion.

Judge Wendell Odum ordered Hudson to pay \$1,200 a month child support until the younger son, Robert Lee Blaffer Hudson, 11, is 18. The other boy is Edward Joseph Jr., 14. Both attend school in Connecticut.

GETS HOME ART

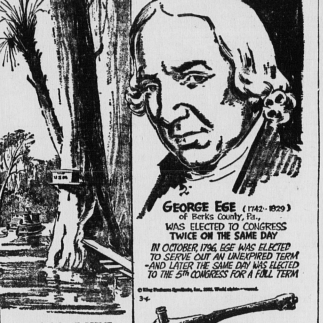
Mrs. Hudson's settlement includes the family home, valued at \$2,000,000 and \$1,000,000 in paintings and sculptures.

Hudson, 39, formerly of New York and New Jersey, founded Hudson Oil and Gas Company—recently sold for \$100,000,000—and was founder and principal stockholder in Hudson Engineering Company.

Mrs. Hudson, 43, has an art studio in New York and a home in Newport, R.I. She is the daughter of Joseph H. Blaffer, a founder of Humble Oil Company.

Mrs. Hudson's lawyer, Percy Foreman, noted that the settlement is bigger than Mrs. Winthrop (Bobo) Rockefeller's \$5,000,000 settlement in 1954. "The wife of Mr. Hudson said she wanted more than Bobo," he said.
