Scouts And Guides Plan Commissioners' Course

A one-day course for commissioners and commissioner's staff of the Boy Scout and Girl Guide associations will be held at the Charlottetown Hotel on Saturday, Jan. 6. The course is sponsored by the provincial council of the Boy Scouts of Canada.

This is the first time such a course has been attempted in the province, the council states, and already some 25 senior leaders have signified their intention of attending. It is expected that this number will be greatly augmented by personnel from many areas throughout the province who have not yet been advised of the course.

The course gets underway with registration at 9:30 in the morning and an address of welcome by Brig. W.W. Reid, DSO, president of the P.E.I. Boy Scouts Association. It ends at 10 o'clock in the evening with a closing talk by F.A. Large, QC, provincial commissioner of the Boy Scouts.

The dinner in the evening at 5:30 will have as guest speaker Dr. Alan Hopper, Moncton, N.B. Those attending the course will be guests of the two associations. An open invitation to attend is extended to all who are interested in the youth movements. A minimum charge will be made.

Dr. Hopper is well known throughout the Atlantic provinces for his interest in scouting. SUMMERSIDE — Two men reported yesterday as possible candidates in the Summerside civic election next month both denied interest.

J. Watson MacNaught, QC, rumored candidate for mayor, said he had no intention to nominate for the mayoralty, but at the same time indicated that he did not plan to retire from political service in provincial and federal fields.

George Olscamp, rumored as a potential councillor candidate in the west ward, also denied that he had any interest in being a candidate.

Mayor W.A. Currie, along with Councillors W.E. MacCausland, W.E. Jenkins and Fred L. Arseneault will be reaching the end of their term of elected office and will be up for re-nomination or retirement.

But those of this group who were available for comment yesterday expressed the opinion that with the election almost two months away it was too soon to express a definite decision regarding their re-nomination as candidates in the Summerside civic election scheduled for Feb. 27.

Some in this capital of the seething North African territory feared a new crisis was about to break over Algeria, torn by an Algerian national rebellion and violent opposition by the European minority for more than seven years.

MAY REACH AGREEMENT

One factor was a growing belief that France and the Algerian nationalist regime may soon reach agreement on a formula for independence.

The Moslem nationalists, it is believed, want to make a show of strength as the secret talks progress. And the European underground wants to demonstrate its resistance to letting Algeria break loose from France.

High sources in Paris said the negotiators now are seeking agreement on a cease-fire and a transitional period leading to independence. But they saw no assurance of a quick settlement.

The worst violence occurred Wednesday in Oran, Algeria's second-largest city and stronghold of European extremists. European youths killed six Moslems within a few minutes after a Moslem terrorist gravely wounded a Jewish woman.

EIGHT KILLED
Eight Moslems and seven Europeans were killed during the day elsewhere in Algeria.

Of the dead in the three days of terror, 22 were Europeans, the rest Moslems.

Despite repeated police action to silence Secret Army radio transmitters, the voice of the Secret Army leader, ex-Gen. Raoul Salan was heard in Algeria in the afternoon.

Salan, who is under a death sentence for his part in last

The Bearcats went undefeated in the competition, beating the Czech Red All-Stars and top Swedish teams. Port Arthur won five games in the tournament, which concluded the Bearcats' long European tour.

The Bearcats took a three-goal lead in the first period but the Swedes came back to score two goals to Port Arthur's one in the second session. Both teams tallied once in the final period.

In a match for third place in the tournament, the Red All-Stars defeated Sweden's Vaestra Forelunda 11-3.

Construction Of Vocational School Is Delayed At S'side

SUMMERSIDE — Construction work on the new Vocational School being erected on Summerside's Upper Granville Street has been at a standstill since before Christmas, while awaiting arrival of pre-fabricated structural steel from the Robb Engineering Company in Amherst.

A spokesman for Williams and Murphy, general contractors who are consultants on the government project, stated that the steel will be erected during the month of February and has been delayed longer than anticipated.

However he added that materials will be arriving from time to time and its expected a few employees will return to work shortly.

One wing of the large structure is to be completed before Sept. 1.

The Vocational School sod-turning ceremony was performed by federal Labor Minister Michael Starr late in September.

The postponed meeting of the town organizations will be held at the George R. Peakes VC branch home.

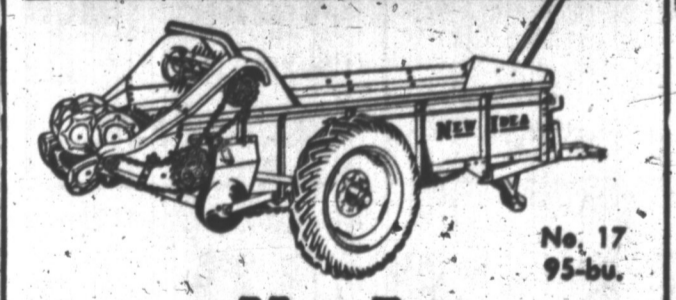
