Island MPs Awaiting Ottawa Developments

Prince Edward Island's members of parliament were pondering yesterday what the immediate future holds for them. Fisheries Minister Angus MacLean, and Mrs. MacLean, who has been here with him the last few days, were flying back to Ottawa to rejoin their family and a possible early cabinet meeting for Mr. MacLean, though he had no word yesterday just when that might be.

"Your guess is as good as mine," he observed when asked for an estimate as to immediate developments on Parliament Hill. The most immediate concern of the MacLeans was to rejoin their family, who are in Ottawa.

MACQUARRIE UP
Health Macquarrie, MacLean's colleague in the dual riding, actually increased his strength Monday with a margin of more than 2,000 votes, with returns still incomplete, comparing with the 2,218 margin of almost a year ago.

Though both won solid endorsements at home, they face possible loss of financial remuneration on return to the capital. Mr. MacLean has his cabinet post, worth \$12,500 and Mr. Macquarrie his parliamentary secretary's post, worth \$4,000 in addition to the sessional indemnity.

JENKINS "DELIGHTED"
W.R. Jenkins, president of the Prince Edward Island Liberal Federation, said he is "delighted" at the progress made here Monday where Liberal members were elected in Kings and Princes.

"The candidates in Queens had a terrific handicap to fight when the campaign started with the huge majorities against them," he stated.

Mr. Jenkins said he is surprised to see the strong Liberal gains across the country, had expected, in fact, the party would have gained a few more seats.

Election to parliament means that successful candidates go immediately on the list of those who will receive their regular monthly cheques from the annual indemnity of \$8,000. The cheque will be one-twelfth of that amount, less a fairly heavy income tax deduction which normally runs to considerably more than \$1,000 in all. The deduction for the members' pension scheme they pay \$20 annually — is also deducted.

EXPENSE ALLOWANCE
The expense allowance of \$2,000 is paid on a single cheque at year's end. In this case the cheque will be for the portion of \$2,000 that will be owing from April 8 to the end of the current calendar year. This allowance is not taxable.

Prior to 1954 when the new system of indemnity payments was adopted, MPs did not receive any pay until the session got underway. Then it was split up into monthly cheques with the balance, if any, being paid at the end of the session.
