THE entertainment in aid of Queen Square fund will take place July 1st (Dominion Day) on which occasion Sir Edward Lytton Bulwer's beautiful romantic drama, "Lady of Lyons" will be performed. Coburn, and judging from the manner in which the plays during Miss Claire Scott's engagement in our city some few days ago were produced, we can be sure of a delightful entertainment. A NEW POTATO PLANTER was seen on the Market Square yesterday afternoon dropping its potato sets when put in gear as it passed along the square. It is intended to plant with it again on Friday next in Mr. Hooper's field by the edge of the town on Malpeque Road. It is a construction of Mr. Geo. W. Millner for this city. It is automatic in its operation, and is expected to open the ground, deposit the plants and cover at an equal distance of 12 inches apart, at 2 o'clock on next Friday, June 3rd. DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

IMPORTANT DIVISION

Government Majority—Fifty.

MR. YEO SUPPORTS SIR JOHN.

OTTAWA, May 27. The division on the Manitoba disallowance question had been looked forward to as the most important in the session except the fishery question. The subject has been persistently discussed since the beginning of the session. The majority was 48, namely 65 against 113. Mr. Trywhitt who floored the House after the question was read, lost his vote, the majority was therefore fifty. All the members present voted against the resolution, and one British Columbia member voted for the motion. The Government was supported by all Quebec Independents, and had a majority of thirteen from that Province. Only three New Brunswick members, Messrs. Weldon, Ellis and Gilmor voted with the Opposition. Five Prince Edward Island members voted want of confidence, but Mr. Yeo, to the great disgust of his colleagues, who vainly beckoned him to rise and vote, supported the Government.

O'BRIEN AT MONTREAL.

ENTHUSIASTICALLY RECEIVED

MONTREAL, May 27. The procession and demonstration to O'Brien and Kilbride to-night was a great success. The streets along the route were literally jammed with spectators, all eager to get a glimpse of the visitors. As the procession moved along cheers were given for O'Brien and Parnell. As O'Brien and Kilbride appeared on the balcony at the Lawrence Hall cheers continued for some time from 10,000 throats. President Cloran of the League said that he was sure they would give O'Brien an enthusiastic reception, and thus show that they protested against such revilers as Goldwin Smith and Rev. Dr. Potts who were the prime instigators of the bloody scenes that were enacted in Toronto and Kingston. O'Brien in coming forward was received with terrific cheers. He said he was proud to find French-Canadians and Irish-Canadians under one flag. If Lord Lansdowne were here to-night he would find that his troubles were not over but only beginning. If he would pass through the street he would find a spirit which would hasten him to his end. He referred to the Orangemen of Ontario amid groans from the crowd.

The French Crisis.

PARIS, May 27. President Grevy this morning summoned M. Rouvier and M. Deves for a conference, and induced M. Rouvier to undertake the forming of a cabinet. It is understood that M. Lecroy and M. Wanet, ministers in M. Goblet's government, will remain in office. Gen. Sausier is mentioned for Minister of War and M. Fallieres for Minister of Interior.

Berlin, May 27.

The Bourse was buoyant yesterday under prospect of formation of a French ministry. PARIS, May 27. The Bourse was depressed to-day owing to the delay in forming a ministry. Smaller rumors have caused a depression in business.

The Theatre Disaster.

PARIS, May 27. The roll call of attaches of the Opera Comique to-day shows that seventeen actors and employes are missing, exclusive of supernumeraries, of whom no record is kept. A late official report announces that sixty-eight bodies have been recovered. The work of searching the ruins continues tonight. Inquiries show very few English and no Americans missing. The wife and daughter of Gen. Meredith Read had a very narrow escape.

Railway Disaster.

ALTOONA, Pa., May 27. To-night as a fast train was nearing Kittanning, the wheel of a car on a freight train burst and the car crashed into two passenger coaches, killing instantly four men, and injuring many others.

A Murder Trial.

WOODSTOCK, May 27. The case of Duley, indicted for the murder of John Lovely, was begun to-day. So far the evidence is chiefly circumstantial, and as to threats made by the prisoner to deceased.

Killed by a Horse.

CARTWRIGHT, Ont., May 20. A son of W. Beacock, while in a field, was followed by a horse, which struck him with its fore feet, killing him instantly.
