

CJCH Official Has Views On Controversial Channel

The last remaining high power television allocation for the Central Maritimes region is changing hands as the province prepares an operation at maximum power. The use of this channel is planned to be done by CJCH-TV in Halifax which is affiliated with the CTV network.

In a company policy statement by Finlay Macdonald, president of CJCH Company Limited, Halifax, N.S., the views and aims of CJCH in applying for the station are laid out.

The company is using the channel to plan a new station at Amherst, N.S. area and the report the service at this power is technically inadequate.

In presenting CJCH views to the public Mr. Macdonald

notes that the central Maritime region receives the national service (CBC) mainly through CJCH-TV, Charlottetown and CKCW-TV Moncton. Sooner or later, he says, this must change. Robert Brown in the captain's cabin on board the ship.

IDEAL SITE
The region in question covers P.E.I., southeastern N.B. and northern N.S. The Amherst site is said to be ideal because transmission from any of the site would not cover the entire region.

The CJCH company said that the area could not support a full-fledged television operation but that a high powered re-broadcasting station would provide first-rate technical coverage.

CJCH-TV has already made application for this channel and the application resulted in the Board of Broadcasters' errors of decision that a study be made of the situation.

Mr. Finlay states there is widespread public support for the CJCH application and that the only opposition comes from the owners of CJCH-TV in Charlottetown and CKCW-TV in Moncton. The management of CPKY contends and CJCH agrees that it is competition and could cause their situation financial hardship. On the other hand CKCW could not be expected to be enthusiastic about new competition, but their market area is much larger and should be able to stand the advent of a new service.

POSSIBLE SOLUTION
The recent negotiations between the CBC and CPKY regarding the possible purchase of CPKY by the Canadian Broadcasting Company offers the possibility of a happy solution, he says.

Such a solution would fulfill the CBC's desire to be represented in every province with its own television outlet and a solution would be reached by CJCH competition would insure that service.

The CJCH company states that once they are given permission, the new service would be in operation within four months.

The matter, however, is subject to the recommendations of the Board of Broadcasters' members following a public hearing. This hearing could take place September 1964, but there is some speculation that a recently announced inquiry into broadcasting could cause a deferment of some months.

Glenn Gould Will Appear Only Once

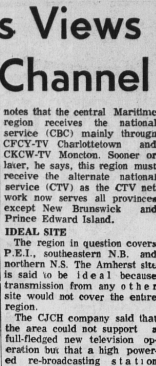
World-famous pianist-composer Glenn Gould will be making his only 1964 Canadian appearance on July 19 in Confederation Centre Theatre.
