## Coroner's Jury Returns Verdict

**SUMMERSIDE** — A coroner's jury at Summerside found that Norman Louis Gallant, aged four years, nine months, came to his death almost instantaneously July 15th as the result of injuries caused by being struck by a half-ton truck, driven by George S. Morrison.

The child was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Gallant, 383 Central Street, Summerside. Mr. Morrison is the street department foreman with the Town of Summerside.

The jury located the scene of the child's death at a point on Central Street North, about 30 yards south of the Pope Road. Coroner Dr. W. E. Callaghan presided at the inquest, and the first witness called was Mrs. Peter Swaski, who told of seeing the child fall to the ground where the truck reached the point where he had been walking.

**BOUGHT CANDY**  
Margaret Ann Arsenault gave evidence describing the purchase of candy made by four children, including the deceased child, at the canteen store operated by her parents. After running to the scene of the accident the driver of the truck had told her companions to "take-off" and after looking at the child he got back in his truck and headed away up the Pope Road.

The witness had observed and made a note of the truck license number. The third witness, Janet Livingston, had been in the canteen with the previous witnesses when she heard the sound of screams and had rushed outside to see the child lying on the ground. She gave evidence similar in part to the preceding witnesses, and said she had not been closer than ten feet to the driver of the truck who had stopped his truck, gone back to look at the boy, and then driven away.

Const. Eric Bishop, RCMP, gave evidence of police investigation at the scene of the fatality, and measurements made at that time. Diana Elizabeth Gallant, eight-year old sister of Norman Gallant, gave evidence of her knowledge of the child's death.

told of buying candy at the canteen and sharing it with three other children who were walking towards her home when the accident occurred.

**WALKING ABREAST**  
Three of the children had been walking abreast and one walking behind the others. Norman had been on the side nearest to the pavement but she was not sure whether he was walking on the pavement or shoulder of the road when struck by the truck.

Sgt. T. J. Keefe, RCMP, officer in charge of the Summerside detachment, gave evidence concerning his examination of the truck following the accident, and of conversation with the driver, George Morrison, which took place at the Summerside town police office.

He said Morrison was in a very up-set condition, was weeping, and talking jerkily, although he was steady on his feet and his speech was clear.

**HAD COUPLE OF DRINKS**  
The witness said he detected the odor of liquor from Morrison while talking with him, and later evidence revealed that Morrison had said he had a couple of drinks about 9 a.m., and had taken another in his office after reporting the accident to the town police and before talking with Sgt. Keefe.

## Harrington Man Nominated By Third Queens Liberals

Liberals from the Third Queens District have a new candidate for Assemblyman in Harold P. Cudmore of Harrington, who won nomination over two other opponents last night.

Hon. Eugene Cullen, minister of agriculture, was renominated as a candidate for Councillor without opposition.

Last night's Third Queens District Liberal convention was held at Mount Stewart, with Harry MacLaughlin of Stanhope, president of the district association, presiding.

Mr. Cudmore won on the first ballot over Bruce Affleck of Mount Stewart and Smith MacFarlane of Harrington. The voting was 53 for Mr. Cudmore, 19 for Mr. Affleck and eight for Mr. MacFarlane.

Mr. Cullen's nomination as Councillor was moved by Lee Stewart Macklin and seconded by Ernest MacInnis of Southport.

Mr. Cudmore's nomination was moved by Irving Thompson, Dunstonside, and seconded by Lynnwood MacNeil, Mt. Allison and supported by Russell Clark, Mr. Affleck's nomination was moved by Elmer McIntyre and seconded by Albert McIntyre, while Mr. MacFarlane's mover was Daniel O'Connell, Bedford, and seconded John Docherty, Harrington.

At this meeting Russell C. Clark who first entered politics in 1923 and who has represented the district continuously since 1927 announced his retirement.

**MR. CLARK HONORED**  
Fitting tribute to the long, faithful and efficient service of Mr. Clark was expressed by Premier Alex Matheson, and his running mate for three elections, Hon. Eugene Cullen. His constituents expressed their sentiments in a nicely worded address read by Irwin Jenkins, Mt. Herbert, and a lazy-boy chair was presented in their behalf by Alex MacKenzie of Scotchfort.

Both candidates addressed the meeting and expressed gratitude for the great honor that was theirs. Hon. Keir Clark, minister of education, reviewed the policies and achievements of the government in the field of education. Premier Matheson quoted what he termed contradictory statements made by the federal minister of Northern Affairs, Hon. Alvin Hamilton, with regard to the Roads to Resources program. He prophesied the Ottawa would be quick to come forward with an agreement as soon as the election was announced in Prince Edward Island.
