**EXPLORATIONS:**

This is a serious program dealing with farmers and their problems. It was first released last June. Now by popular demand C.B.C. Farm Broadcast Department is reproducing the series over the Halifax station on T.V. The Farmer and Farm Policy on June 4th, at 10 p.m.—"Man on a Tiger". This programme will take one farm, that of Bruce McBlain of Colclonia, Ontario, which produces hog, beef and poultry with some orchard. This will be used as an example to discuss four questions. First, what farmers say they need in terms of policy. Secondly, what they're getting. Thirdly, how these two fit. Fourthly, what farmers think needs to be done by Federal and Provincial Agencies. The fifth important aspect is just how does all this affect the tax payer.

The second program, June 11th, 11 p.m. ADT "Cow on a tight Rope" is pretty much along the same line as the first, applied to the dairy industry. The problem in our Canadian dairy industry is one of the balance: the balance between production and consumption and balance between the different kinds of production; i.e. fluid milk, cheese, butter, milk powder, etc. This program will show what happens when the balance gets "out of kilter", and the forces, government and otherwise, which attempt to maintain the balance. The case in point in this program will be a dairy farmer from the Chateauguay Valley, supplemented by statements and interviews with a dairy plant operator in Montreal, the Minister of Agriculture, and Dr. J.H. Hannan.

The third program on June 18, 11 p.m. ADT "Road to Rosetown" discusses problems arising from the break-up of the traditional rural life. In past this has centered round the village with its school, community hall, two stores, doctor and so on—all probably clustered at some convenient crossroads. Roads were not good, transport, limited, and each village tended to be a self-contained unit. But with the great improvement in transport, this pattern is rapidly breaking up. Consolidated schools, supermarket, shopping in towns, city entertainment are all taking farmers and their families away from the villages.

Many people deplore this movement, but there's not much good in deploring it. This program will take a typical Saskatchewan community — and the prairies have this problem even more acutely than the other provinces — and show not only how it is changing, but also how the less desirable aspects can be minimized and the change brought about in an orderly fashion.
