THE OIL OUTRAGE.

The Montreal correspondent of the New York Journal reports:

"The influence of the Standard Oil trust on Canadian politics is daily becoming more marked. The Liberal party in Canada has allowed the Standard Oil Company to monopolize the Canadian oil business to such an extent that when the city of Montreal allowed an opposition company, about three months ago, to erect a tank on the canal bank the Government tried to force the city to annul the order on the ground that there was danger of fire. According to the last census there were in the rural parts of the country 855,585 houses, of which more than 700,000 are lighted by coal oil. There were 921,643 families equally dependent for light upon coal oil. All the farmers, nearly all the laboring men and practically all the poor classes are forced to use this article, which to them is a necessary of life.

"The coal oil industry is no longer a home enterprise, and the profits made out of the duty go directly to the trust. Every cent of duty paid and every cent of profit charged by them comes out of the pockets of consumers. These profits are immensely increased by the help of the present administration. By collusion of the Liberal government with the Standard Oil Company of the United States the latter acquired the ownership of the Canadian refineries and the absolute control of the industry.

"The result is that the trust has since increased the price six cents per gallon, which as 20,000,000 gallons are consumed annually in Canada, amounts to \$1,200,000. Refined oil in barrels now costs at wholesale 18 cents per gallon. Before the business fell into the hands of the Standard octopus it cost 12 cents, a difference of six cents. The consumers in Canada now pay 25 cents per gallon. Consumers in the United States pay, for a much better quality, 10 cents, making a difference of 15 cents per gallon against the Canadian consumers, or the immense sum of \$3,000,000 on the 20,000,000 gallons annually consumed."

Here we have a plain, straightforward, business-like statement of the result of the government's operations in oil. Will the farmers of P. E. Island make a note?

Montreal Star: War has not yet been declared against China by any nation, but in fighting so far the allies have lost 800 men, and the Chinese 11,000. The Chinaman fights from behind stone walls just as vigorously as the Boer, but he stays there and takes his medicine when the cover is broken.
