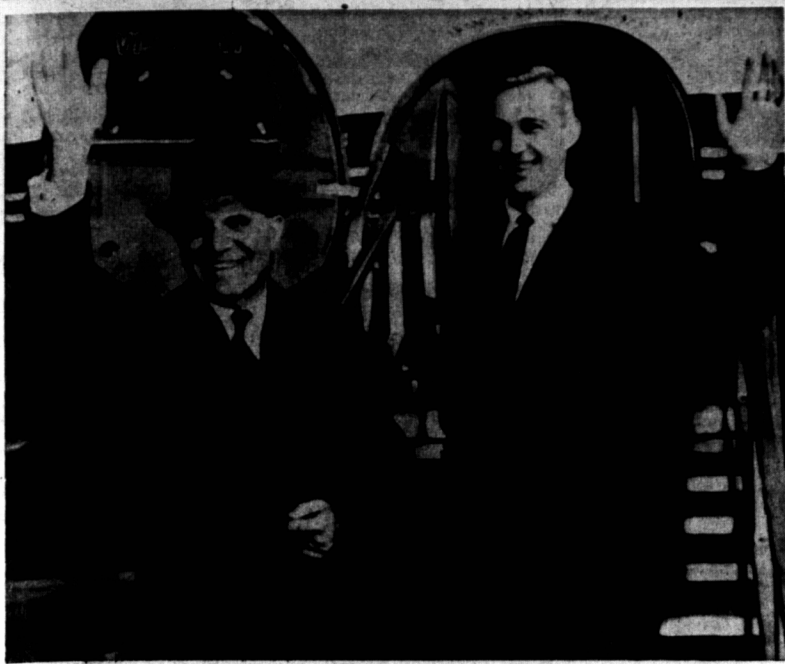

City Health Officer States There Is No Asian Flu Here

There have been no cases of Asian flu in the City to date, according to City Health Officer, W.L. MacDonald. He stated however that an influenza which is akin to, but not Asian flu is very rampant in Charlottetown.

Asian flu, Dr. MacDonald said a small amount of preventative serum has been used in Charlottetown but stated there would be no widespread inoculations such as for polio or other diseases. One reason given for this, the Doctor explained is because sufficient amount of the anti-toxin is not available.

New Lieut.-Governors Will Be Named By Nov. 1

OTTAWA (CP) — "Three or four" provinces are slated for new lieutenant-governors by Nov. 1. Prime Minister Diefenbaker said Wednesday, but he identified only three of them — Ontario, Nova Scotia and Newfoundland.

MONTREAL (CP) — Pickets marched for an hour Wednesday in front of the Ritz Carleton Hotel to protest a visit here by Alfred Krupp, German steel magnate. The pickets represented Montreal labor organizations. They carried placards with slogans such as "Back to Nuremberg, War Criminal," and "After Murdochville, Kruppville."

Mr. Krupp came here to study the possibilities of developing iron-ore deposits in Quebec's Ungava region. He is scheduled to meet with Quebec's Premier Duplessis next week.
