The amount of the purse presented to Father Strubbe by his Montreal parishioners was \$1000. Interesting addresses were delivered on the occasion by Hon. Mr Justice Curran and by Mr. M. J. F. Quinn, Q. C., the brilliant member of the Federal Parliament who is to speak at the A. O. H., gathering on Dominion Day.

The largest holder of Bank of Montreal stock is Mr. W. C. McDonald, the Montreal tobacco man, who has 2,050 shares. At 242 per cent., the present price of the shares, Mr. McDonald's holdings are valued at \$992,200, or very nearly a million dollars. Just a year ago the shares were only quoted at 233, and they have therefore within that time increased in value by fully \$36,900. To this may be added the dividends, which calculated at the present earning power of the stock, are approximately \$40,000, so that Mr. McDonald's holding during the year have earned practically \$77,000—a fortune in itself.

AN EXTENSIVE ORCHARD.—By far the most extensive fruit grower in Westmorland, if indeed not in New Brunswick, is Mr. Geo. L. Welling, of Shediac Cape, who has an orchard of some three thousand trees covering some fifteen acres of land. At this season of the year this forest of trees is in full bloom and presents one of the most gorgeous sights that the imagination can picture.—Moncton Times.
