

# Halifax St. Mary's In Third Place After 5-2 Win Over Millionaires

HALIFAX, Jan. 13 (CP) — Halifax St. Mary's bounced into a third place tie in the Maritime Major Hockey League standings by defeating cellar dwelling Sydney Millionaires 5-2 Saturday night in a swift-paced, wide-open game.

Saints were forced to come in with a three-goal third period to ensure the decision. They had a 1-0 lead when the first period ended but the always-dangerous Millionaires snapped back in the second to take the lead. The locals tied the score, and in the third fired three unanswered tallies.

Saints' win moved them into a deadlock for third place with Glace Bay Miners, idle Saturday night when they were unable to get through for a game at Saint John. The clubs are two points ahead of Moncton Hawks and six behind Charlottetown Islanders.

Out to crack the Saints' home win streak, Millionaires attempted to match strides with Saints but found themselves on the defensive several times. Goalie Cliff Hicks turned in a strong game to hold the goal-hungry Saints at bay.

## Tempers Were Short

Tempers were short. Hughie Campbell and Gallagher hooked in the Sydney crease but the referee broke it up before it became too serious. Later, Danny Nixon and Dunc MacIntyre tangled behind the Halifax net.

Standouts for Sydney were Cliff Fauch, Bill Dinning, Joe Levandowski and Fred Hildebrand and Alex Birukow. Levandowski played a particularly good game on the defence, the best of the Sydney rear-guard. Hughie Campbell managed to get away from his checks to score one goal and set up another on a sweet play.

Top performances for the Saints were turned in by Frank Bergeron, Pete Leswick and Bill Watson. Fred Weaver was a standout when the

Saints were short-handed. Millionaires tied it up at 1:17 of the second while Frank Bathgate was doing time. Levandowski knocked down a Halifax pass and his quick shot found the target. Ten minutes later MacIntyre's screened backhand put Sydney ahead 2-1. The lead didn't last long. Saints got a break when they caught Millionaires up the ice with only one defenceman back. Four of them skated in and Nixon received credit for a goal that appeared to go in off a Halifax player's skate.

# Islanders Take Fast Game 4-2 From Hawks But Win Is Costly

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 13 (CP) — Charlottetown Islanders shot three goals in a fast-moving first period here Saturday night and went on to beat Moncton Hawks 4-2 in a bruising Maritime Major Hockey League game.

The win was a costly one for Islanders. Two of their forwards suffered injuries, likely to keep them out of action several weeks. Jim MacKenzie was put out with a broken shoulder in the first period, and Connie Bonhomme skated off with a broken elbow when he crashed heavily into the boards in the third.

Hub Bewley, Buck Whitlock, Walt Pawlyshyn and Dennis Smith scored Islanders' goals. Morrie Hamilton and Sam Kennedy were the Moncton marksmen.

## M. M. H. L. Meeting Held At Moncton Over Week-End

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 13 (CP) — A "scorching" letter advising referees in the Maritime Major Hockey League to clamp down on rough play will be sent out, Judge J. Elliott Hudson, league president, said at a meeting here today.

Representatives of all six teams in the league were present at the meeting. A new franchise was granted the Moncton Hawks Community Hockey Association replacing that held by Moncton Hawks Club Ltd.

Two new full-time referees were appointed to work in the league. They are Gerry Mathieu formerly of the Quebec Senior Hockey League and Blair Peters of Moncton. They bring the number of referees to seven.

Marty McIntyre of Sydney was appointed to referee games in Sydney and Glace Bay only. Coach Leo Lamoureux of Charlottetown Islanders said he was not satisfied with the way referees were handling the games. He pointed out that two of his players were seriously injured Saturday night in a game here against the Hawks.

Word was received from the C. A. H. A. that the Maritime loop and the Quebec Senior Hockey League only major series loops in operation this season would be permitted to acquire professional hockey players until Feb. 1. Each team will be permitted to have 18 men on its roster.

A player lost to a professional team may be replaced at any time during the playing season. Several teams worked out arrangements to play postponed games. Glace Bay and Moncton will play at Amherst Jan. 18. Halifax will play at Saint John Jan. 28. Moncton and Halifax will play at Amherst Feb. 6 and Glace Bay will play at Halifax Feb. 27.

Dates for the remainder of the postponed games will be set by C. S. McAlden league secretary.

Only the Halifax Saints of the M.M.H.L. are in favor of extending the player importation deadline until Feb. 1, it was learned yesterday from Islanders coach Leo Lamoureux. The Islanders are in favor of sticking by the Jan. 15 deadline. Lamoureux also referred to Johnny Morrow who may be recalled. It is doubtful if Morrow will see action with the Islanders but he may be traded for another wingman if a suitable trade can be arranged.

Hawks came to life in the second and held Islanders on even terms. The first Moncton goal came at 1:10 while George McLagan of Islanders was serving a two-minute penalty.

Hawks continued to press the attack and with only seconds remaining, Smith broke down the centre for an unassisted goal.

Coach Johnny Horeck announced after the game that left winger Ronnie Rowe had been suspended indefinitely for his actions during the game.

He was withdrawn from the ice after offering his stick to Horeck when the coach was issuing instructions to him from the bench. The loss moved Hawks back into fifth place, behind Halifax St. Mary's. It was the first time this season Hawks were shunted out of a playoff position.

Bill Winemaster, rangy defenceman who had been on loan to Bagotville, Que. made his first appearance in Moncton in six weeks. He was recalled to replace Tom Rockey, who was called home last week due to an illness in his family.

Right winger Bonhomme fractured his left elbow when he slid into the boards after being checked or tripped. Conny had an operation on the elbow yesterday morning and is a patient in the P. E. I. Hospital. Last night Dr. T. A. Laidlaw stated he may be out of action until play-off time in March.

MacKenzie was rammed into the boards and suffered a shoulder separation in the first period. He is a patient in the Prince Edward Island Hospital and will be out of action for five or six weeks.

Bob Gray will take Bonhomme's place on the right side of Willie Marshall and Don Bellinger. "Hub" Beaudry will replace MacKenzie and play on the Whitlock-Smith line. Bob Gray and Beaudry have slight injuries, Gray a bad hand and Beaudry a sore ankle.

Although not blaming the Hawks for intentionally injuring Bonhomme and MacKenzie Saturday night, coach Lamoureux stated it was the Hawks and other teams — not the Islanders, who should be called the butchers.

Coach Lamoureux was irked over the fact that no penalties were called on either of the plays in which the players were injured. "There were numerous other infractions also enabled Boston Bruins to overtake the fourth-place Rangers."

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 13 (CP) — Coach Norman (Bud) Poile of Glace Bay Miners has been fined \$75 as the result of an incident in a game between Miners and Saint Mary's at Halifax.

In announcing the fine, second imposed on Poile this season, Judge J. Elliott Hudson, quoted today from a report on the incident by referee Frank Elliott. Elliott said Poile came on the ice and pushed him, abused him with foul language and attempted to trip him with his stick.

After receiving the match misconduct Poile refused to leave the penalty box and sat there for the rest of the game.

Following the match, won by Glace Bay, Poile came to the referees dressing room and abused the referee some more, keeping his foot in the door so that it could not be closed.

Mr. Hudson said Elliott should have awarded the game to Halifax when Poile refused to go to his dressing room after receiving the match misconduct.

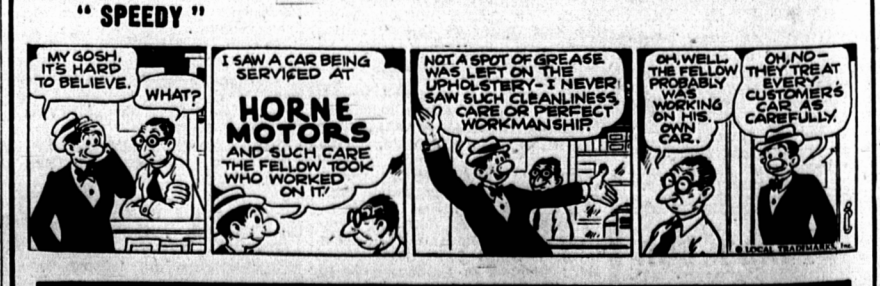
