Apportioning The Blame For The Dodgers' Slump

 NEW YORK (AP) — Brooklyn Dodgers fans are beginning to wonder if their team still is in the National League pennant race after their team dropped three games to New York Giants last week. There was considerable apprehension in Flatbush as the three defeats dropped the champions five games behind Milwaukee Braves. If the Dodgers aren't exactly falling apart, at least they are creeping a little at the seams. On Aug. 9 last year they also were trailing the Braves, but only by 1 1/2 games. They were playing .500 ball then. Aug. 9 this year they were playing at a .561 rate. Don Newcombe is one reason. On Aug. 9, 1956, Newcombe had won 17 games while losing only five, and had pitched three consecutive shutouts. He ended the season 27-7. On the same date this year, his record was 9-10 in 23 starts; he completed 11. His earned-run average of 3.41 doesn't compare too badly with his last year's figure of 3.06 but he has the unhappy habit of serving up home-run balls at crucial times, often in late innings when it seems he might be home free. To a lesser degree, Sal Maglie

shares some blame, although in Sal's case he might pass it along to his teammates who seldom hit when he is on the mound. Maglie came to the Brooks May 15 last year, a rather late start however, by Aug. 9 he had a 5-3 record on his way to a 13-5 season. As of last Friday he was 5-5, with five complete games in 13 starts. His earned-run average of 2.73 also is respectable. Johnny Podres has taken up a little of the slack by winning nine games while losing only five, completing eight of 18, and his earned-run average is better yet — 2.50. In fact, the Dodger pitching from the earned-run standpoint is quite proficient, with Don Drysdale at 2.96 and the workhorse of the bullpen, Clem Labine, at 2.73 for the 34 games in which he has relieved. So maybe the fans should look elsewhere for the leak. For one thing, Jackie Robinson's absence doesn't help. Pee Wee Reese makes only spot appearances now. Furthermore, Carl Furillo has spent most of the season in a slump. And Duke Snider missed the Giant series because of an old knee injury. The Dodgers open a long home stand Friday night. It would tell the story, happy or sad.

Favorites In Tennis Advance

 MONTREAL (CP) — The favored players got through their first-round matches in the Canadian tennis championships Monday, but few found the going easy. Straight Clark of Philadelphia, third-seeded of the foreign players, was extended to three sets by unranked veteran George Robertson of Montreal. He won 6-3, 4-6, 6-4. Richard Sorlien, another Philadelphia and sixth-seeded, found the going even harder against little-known Mike Carpenter of Montreal. He won 6-2, 6-3, 9-7. Toronto's Don Platt, seventh seeded native player, got off to a slow start against George Barcelo, 29, 10th ranked in the province of Quebec, before clearing up the final sets 4-6, 6-1, 6-0.

The only thing approaching an upset occurred in the women's singles where unranked Meriel Lindsay Morgan of Whitley Bay, England, downed third-ranked June Lee of Portland, Ore., 4-6, 6-2. Other favorites had less trouble. Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., the first-seeded Canadian, easily crushed Montreal's Doug Robertson, 6-0, 6-0 and Vancouver's third-seeded Paul Willey overpowered J. C. Charbonneau of Montreal 6-0, 6-3. Don Fontana of Toronto, with Willey and Bedard, a member of Canada's Davis Cup team and second-seeded Canadian, downed young Bill Ledingham of Vancouver, 6-3, 6-4. Mrs. Louise Brown, Toronto's top seeded Canadian woman player, took Montreal's Miss G. Morin 6-3, 6-0.

Gets \$5,000 In Golf Agreement

CHICAGO (AP) — World golf champion Dick Mayer paid \$5,000 of his \$50,000 winner's prize to Al Bessellink to complete a pre-tournament agreement. It was disclosed Monday. Mayer's wife, Doris, confirmed a report that Bessellink, a fellow golfer, received the \$5,000, adding "It was a pre-tournament agreement. Bessellink had several such deals with other players also. When Bob Toski won the world championship two years ago, Bessellink collected \$10,000." Mayer won the Tam O'Shanter Sunday.

Tyro Outshoots Some Of Top Service Riflemen As Annual DCRA Shoot Gets Under Way

CONNAUGHT RANGES, Ont. (CP) — A tyro Monday outshot some of the country's top service riflemen to win the Queen's medal match at the annual Dominion Rifle Association prize shoot. About 275 entries participated in the difficult event fired with .303-calibre rifles under service conditions. In one of the match's four stages, competitors run between five firing lines 100 yards apart, getting in two shots at each line at a target exposed for only a short time. CLASSED AS TYRO The army winner, who has been shooting the large-bore service rifle for only three years, is classed as a tyro—a competitor who has never ranked among the top 300 grand aggregate scorers at the DCRA meet. It is only his second year in competition here. About 650 of the country's top riflemen were on hand as the meet began. Main prizes include the Canadian service rifle championship and the 18 places on Canada's 1958 team at the National Rifle Association shoot at Bisley, England—both awarded on the basis of aggregate scores in various matches here. Sgt. G. R. Harper of New Glasgow, N.S., won the tyro match, in a dusk shoot off, beating out nine other competitors who had scored possible 50s in the main shoot. A dusk shoot off also was needed to decide top man in the Borden Trophy when three competitors finished with 47 of a possible 50. Cpl. R. R. McKay of the Royal Canadian Army Postal Corps, Dartmouth, N.S., won the shootoff and match, WO2 F. N. Haire of army headquarters, Ottawa, was runner-up and Sgt. J. R. Hardy of the Royal Canadian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers School, Kingston, Ont., placed third.

Cecil Dowling In 6th Place In Golf

TORONTO (CP) — Lyle Crawford of Vancouver and Moe Norman of Kitchener each shot a four-under-par 68 Monday to lead the opening round of the \$4,500 bursary golf tournament in nearby Port Credit. Bob Dean of Cornwall, far ahead of the field with seven-under-par going off the 18th tee, blew up after his drive and took seven strokes to finish the hole. He tied for second place with Bob Wilson, Calgary, at 69. Crawford and Norman played almost identical games in making the first 18-hole round at the Mississauga golf course. Each shot a one-under-par 35 on the outgoing leg of the course, and three-under-par 33 on the return. 70 FOR THIRD Jerry Magee of Toronto carded a 70 for third place and John Henrick of Gattineau, Que., scored 71 to take fourth spot. Bill Mahoney of Vancouver was fifth with a 72. The low 40 scorers from Monday's round will compete today in a 36-hole final. Seven players shot 73s to tie for sixth place: Jack McLaughlin, Toronto; Bill Richardson, Brampton; Cecil Dowling, Charlottetown; Norm Hunt, Toronto; Roy Roman, Dundas; George Gilmurray, Toronto; and J. Davidson, Oakville. The 54-hole tournament, open to professionals and assistant professionals aged 30 and under, is designed to encourage young Canadian professionals to improve their skill in the United States professional golf winter circuit competition. Winners of the three \$1,500 prizes must compete in the U.S. pro circuit for at least 10 weeks next winter.

Some Surprise Upsets Seen In Junior Tennis Tourney

 OTTAWA (CP) — A Montreal team and a youngster from Detroit pulled surprise upsets in different events in the Canadian open junior tennis championships. Fred Drilling, 14, an unseeded United States entry, dumped two top-ranked Canadian players—one in the junior men's singles and the other in the boys' singles. He shared the day's spotlight with Montrealers Don McDougall and Derek Penner who knocked out a seeded U.S. team in the junior men's doubles as 75 matches were run off in the official first day of the open event. Players from the U.S. and Bermuda are competing with Canadians for 15 titles in the week-long tourney. Winners of the closed championships — open only to Canadians — which finished Sunday were presented with prizes Monday night at the Rideau Lawn Tennis Club, permanent site of the eight-year-old tournament. Drilling eliminated second-seeded Don McKush of Vancouver in the first round of the junior men's singles 6-3, 6-1, and trimmed John Zichmanis of Toronto 6-2, 6-1 in the second round. DEFEATED REDDEN The Detroit youngster cut an unseeded Canadian out of the running in the boys' singles, defeating Bill Redden of Halifax, third-ranked Canadian, 6-3, 6-0 in the second round. Penner and McDougall pulled their upset in the third round of the junior men's doubles, eliminating brothers Pat and Sam Dugan of Hamburg, N.Y., second in the foreign seedings, 4-6, 6-2, 6-4. The Montreal team is not seeded. In the junior men's singles, top event of the tourney, Yvon Leblanc of Montreal, winner of the closed junior men's, went to the third round. He eliminated Vincent Congreaves of Cornwall, Ont., 6-1, 6-0. John Bassett of Toronto, another favorite Canadian, also moved into the third round of the junior men's singles with a 6-1, 6-2 win over David Woodworth of Halifax. Roy Laver of Brisbane, Australia, who won the junior men's open last year, is not defending the title at this meet. Petite Virginia Hesse, 15, of Hamtramck, Mich., who won six titles here last year, soared through her first three matches. She defeated Margit Lukk of Sar-

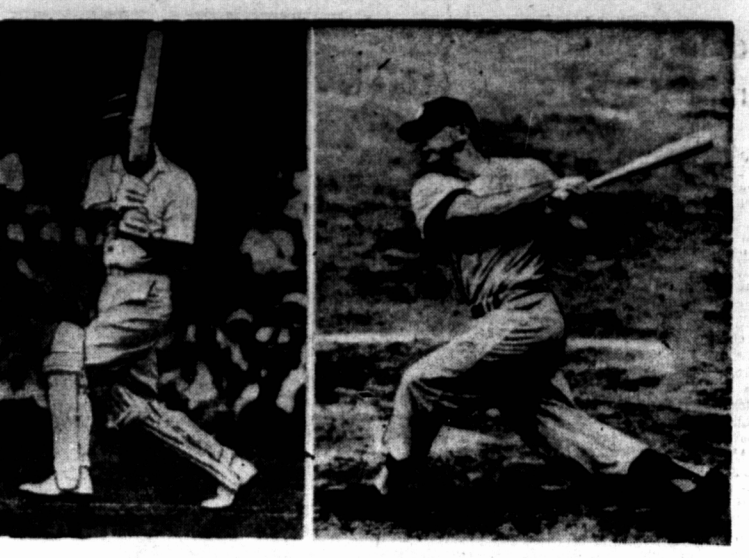
Mickey Mantle Narrows AL Batting Race With Williams

NEW YORK (AP) — Mickey Mantle is chasing Ted Williams and both are chasing the .400 mark. That sums up the American League batting race with only seven weeks remaining in the 1957 season. But there is more to Mantle than his batting average. He has gained considerable ground while Williams has shown signs of slackening off, in last week's games, Mantle hit at a .530 pace. The New York Yankees' switch-hitter collected 13 hits in 25 times at bat and boost his average 11 points to .379. Williams, meanwhile, dropped two points to .387. The 38-year-old Boston outfielder had eight safeties in 22 tries. Their close battle will be a feature of the three-game series between the Yanks and Red Sox opening in Boston tonight. TWO HOMERS Mantle walloped two home runs in last week's action while Williams and the other contender, Roy Sievers of Washington, failed to connect for the circuit. This gave Mantle the lead with 21 round trippers. Williams and Sievers each have 20. Sievers continues to set the pace in runs batted in with 81. Mantle has 80. In the National League, Hank Aaron of Milwaukee regained the batting lead after relinquishing it early last week to Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cards. Aaron climbed one point to 338 while Musial tailed off a single point to 332. Willie Mays of New York Giants and Dick Groat of Pittsburgh are deadlocked for third place at 330. Aaron maintained his edge in home runs with 32 although Brooklyn's Duke Snider slammed three last week, giving him 29 for the year. Aaron has Musial share the runs batted in lead with 87.
