

East European Communism Is In State Of Upheaval

FRAGUE (AP) — Communism in Eastern Europe is in a state of upheaval. From the Russian borders to the frontiers of the West, Communist leaders

are urgently seeking new ways to make socialism work. Many old Communist ideas are being abandoned and some new ones adopted. Communist thinkers no longer

pretend their system is infallible. They are looking at their mounting economic and social problems and trying to find answers. "If we can't build a better

system than ours in the West, we have lost the game," an influential Hungarian said. A Prague economist said: "You know, I spend sleepless nights trying to think up answers to our economic problems. If only we could find a way out."
The problem everywhere is to find solutions to the economic, political and moral crisis of two decades and, at the same time, keep the Communists in power. Some years ago, the Com-

munist leaders thought they had started making progress when they got rid of Stalinist police terror, gave millions of people a small taste of freedom and did something to improve living conditions. But that has only made their problem more acute. Eastern Europeans now look at the prosperity of Western Europe and ask why communism lags behind. They push and press for more food, more comfort, for less control, for more personal freedom.

"We can't go back," a Czech official admitted. "We dare not use force again, like using police and telling people they have to tighten their belts." Here are some of the concessions the governments have made in the last two years to try to keep their people content:
1. They have relaxed the Iron Curtain to relieve the acute claustrophobia of 18 years of forced imprisonment behind their frontiers. Tens of thousands of Hungarians, Czech-

slovaks, Poles and Rumanians are travelling to the West. And the gates have been thrown wide open to Western tourists. But millions still are denied passports to travel. It's mostly communist's new elite — the technicians and the bureaucrats — who get the hard currency they need to go abroad.
2. The Red regimes have let in more Western influences, more films, more music, more theatre, more Western literature. Most have stopped jam-

ming Western broadcasts. They are carrying out more cultural exchanges with Western nations. People are not afraid to talk to Westerners any more — except in Bulgaria.
3. They have given more elbow room to their artists, writers and playwrights to criticize Communist evils. Political jokes circulate freely — except in Bulgaria where they are a crime

But Communist intellectuals still are knocked down if they get too far out of line. The Communists are releasing political prisoners.
4. Finally, they have provided more consumer goods, more cars, more food, more housing, more amusement. But the cost of living is high. An average man still has to work a month for a suit.

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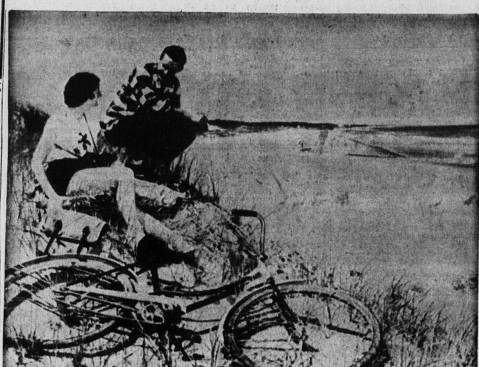
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
