Canada Troops Ready If Call Comes From UN

Marines Engaged In Clash

Landing Links U.S., Britain In Massive Military Buildup

Stand Revealed At Parley In U.S.

BEIRUT (CP)—American Marines engaged in a brief but bloody sniping exchange with Lebanese rebels.

AMMAN (CP)—Britain sent 2,000 paratroopers to Jordan Thursday to help young King Hussein face up to new threats to his throne.

There were more than 8,000 U.S. and British troops in Lebanon and Jordan.

United Nations that the U.A.R. was interfering in Jordan's internal affairs.

The Marines opened fire after snipers had been shooting at them for several hours, an American spokesman said.

The sniping was a blunt indication of the growing discontent among the Moslem population at U.S. intervention in the revolt.

Prime Minister Macmillan told Parliament that paratroopers were flown from Cyprus to Jordan at King Hussein's request.

British government sources said the paratroopers flew over Israel to Amman, Jordan, with permission of Prime Minister Ben-Gurion.

WASHINGTON (CP)—Canada's External Affairs Minister Smith indicated Thursday Canada is prepared to provide troops for a United Nations military force to stabilize the turbulent Middle East.

British intervention in Jordan Thursday, he said, had been discussed by the Canadian cabinet in Ottawa that morning and Canada supported it as a temporary military action taken pending steps by the United Nations to stabilize the situation in the Middle East.

Canadian Has Final Curtesy

By SYLVIA HACK Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON (CP)—A Canadian debutante in a fetching red silk dress curtsied gracefully before the Queen Mother Thursday, ending a royal ceremony believed to date back to the reign of the first Queen Elizabeth.

The honor of being the very last debutante in the final royal debutante season fell to blonde, 20-year-old Sandra Seagram, whose mother and grandmother had been presented in earlier years in the gold and white ballroom at Buckingham Palace.

Miss Seagram was one of 40 Canadian debutantes presented to the Queen Mother and the Duke of Edinburgh Thursday along with some 200 other Commonwealth girls. The Queen Mother was substituting for the Queen, who is recovering from an attack of acute sinusitis.

Last week an almost equal number of Canadians were presented to the Queen Mother. Thursday's presentation party marks the end of royal debutante season at Buckingham Palace announced last November that this would be the last year in which presentation parties would be held.

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GRAB TWO MARINES

Two marines were kidnapped by insurgents during the day but were released unharmed several hours later. The rebels were reported to have taken their arms.

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Jordan Army 'Loyal To King'

LONDON (Reuters)—Gen. Sir John Glubb, who commanded Jordan's Arab legion for 17 years, said Thursday night he believes the Jordanian army still is "fairly loyal" to King Hussein.

Attempts by Arab nationalist "to go for young officers with secret propaganda" did not seem to have succeeded, Glubb said in a television interview.

But he declared that the West was rapidly losing the friendship of the Arab world because Western nations did not realize the importance of propaganda.

"Colonel Nasser and the Russians have a regular technique for disseminating ideas... to stir up mistrust and hatred between the Arab countries and the West," he said.

The general, who was retired by King Hussein two years ago, said the Arab nations were in "an awkward dilemma."

Mr. Peakes was replying to Frank Howard (CCF—Skeena), who asked for an investigation into reports that 13 news photographers were locked in a mess aboard the Crescent for 3 1/2 hours.

The account given the Commons by Mr. Peakes differed in some points from press reports.

Camac Gets Job At Summerside

OTTAWA, (Special)—A contract for \$95,900 has been awarded by the Federal Government to CAMAC Construction Co., of Charlottetown, for improvements to the RCAF Station at Summerside.

The work to be undertaken will involve site grading, soil stabilization, a reconstruction of storm drainage ditches.

The contract was let by defence construction (1951) Limited, a crown-owned company. The improvements are part of a huge development program under way for sometime at the RCAF station. Several projects now are being carried out.
