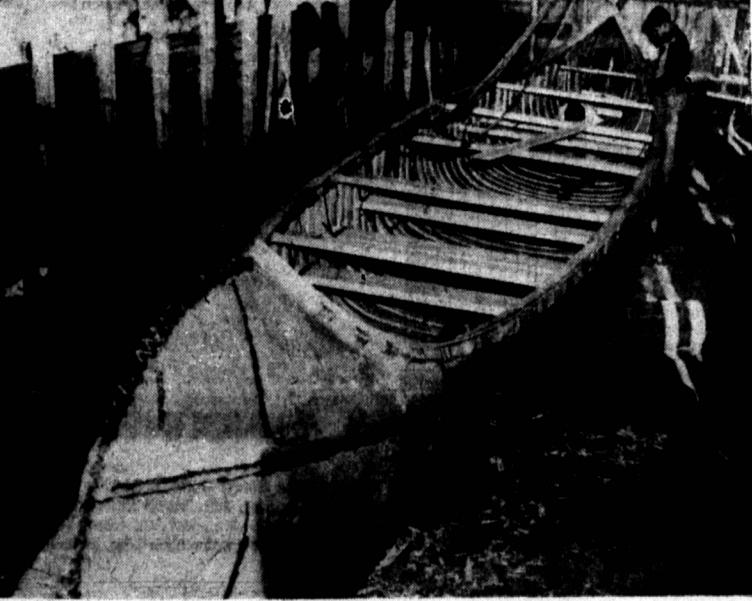

LAST OF THE FREIGHT CANOES
An almost lost art was revived by Indian canoe-maker Mat Bernard, who built this 1,800-pound model at Golden Lake, near Pembroke, Ont. It is prob-

ably the last of the giant birch bark freight canoes to be made anywhere. During the early days of fur trading in Canada, all river and lake commerce was transported in these huge craft and many of them were paddled and

carried thousands of miles in a route that stretched from Montreal to the Mackenzie river. This one stands five feet high and is 36 feet long. It will be presented to the National Museum in Ottawa.

RECORD CATCHES IN B.C.
OTTAWA (CP)—The bureau of statistics reported Monday British Columbia fishermen caught a record 677,225,000 pounds of fish in 1956, about 36 per cent more

than the previous year's 498,378,000. Landed value of the catches increased by 30 per cent to \$36,055,000 from \$27,711,000 and the value of fish products rose by 13 per cent to \$67,725,000 from \$60,032,000.

Will Compete In Competition

LONDON (CP) - An RAF detachment including two Canadian officers will compete in the United States Air Force strategic air command bombing, navigation and reconnaissance competition at Pinecastle air base in Florida, beginning Oct. 30. Canadian participants in the competition are Flt. Lt. Verne Montgomery, 35, of South Mountain, Ont., a pilot, and Flt. Lt. Bert Perowne 34 of Kingsburg N.S. a navigator. Both are attached to a squadron of four-jet Vulcan bombers. The RAF aircraft which left for Pinecastle last week, are scheduled to make a fly-past Oct. 16 at Jamestown, Va., during the Queen's visit to the United States.

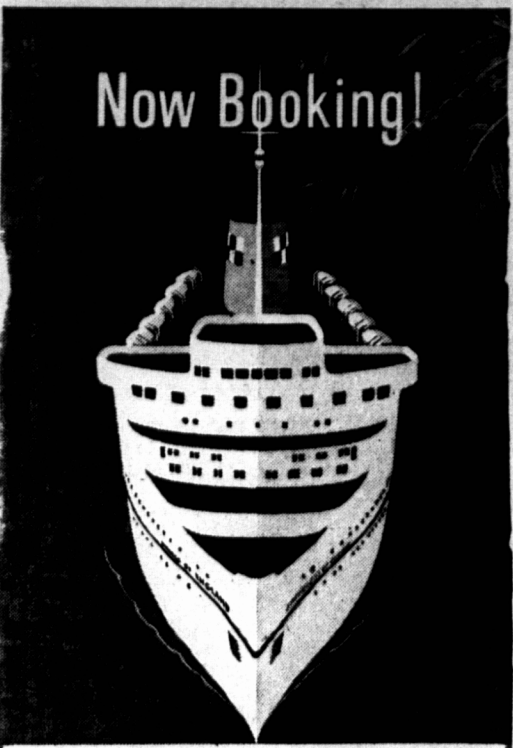
