IMPORTANT NEWS FROM AFRICA

Lord Roberts Wants The Colonials

TO JOIN BADEN-POWELL'S POLICE FORCE.

Canadians Who Take Discharge Now Will Leave at Once.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—Lord Roberts is very anxious that large numbers of Colonials in South Africa shall, when the war is over, remain to join the police force which General Baden Powell will organize. The following paragraph appears in the militia orders:—

"Authority has been granted officers commanding corps of the Canadian special service forces in South Africa to grant free discharges to non-commissioned officers and men under their command desirous of remaining in South Africa subject to the approval of the commander-in-chief."

The Department of Militia has received the following despatch from Mr. Chamberlain:

"Referring to your telegram, 30th August, Field Marshal Roberts has been instructed to despatch from South Africa members of the Royal Canadian regiment not willing to extend their period of service to arrive in Canada not later than the 15th of October. In the event of a large number they will be sent direct to Canada by a transport specially detailed, otherwise via England by transport conveying invalids."

This important message has reference to the question which has been under discussion for some weeks. It will be remembered that the English volunteers were enlisted for one year or the duration of war. The Canadians, however, were enlisted for one year only, this term expiring on the dates varying from October 15th to October 20th.

It is not known how long the imperial authorities will require the service of the Regiment. It may be only for a few weeks over the year, or it may be before three or four months.

As the boys have stood the fatigues and hardships of the campaign so nobly, it is considered in official circles that not many will accept their discharge now. Only those who for domestic or business reasons must come home will ask to be released from duty.

The vast majority will undoubtedly remain in order that they may have the honor of being reviewed by the Queen in England.

Those who do take their discharge will have to leave immediately in order that they may arrive home on the date mentioned in Mr. Chamberlain's despatch.

IN ONTARIO.

Liberal-Conservative Leaders Enthusiastically Received.

NAPANEE, Ont., Sept. 14.—Sir Charles Tupper, Mr. Foster, and Hugh John Macdonald were given a magnificent reception in Lennox county in the Napanee driving park yesterday afternoon. The meeting, which was attended by about 3,000 persons, was held in the open air. Sir Charles Tupper, who was in excellent form, took up the charge that he had declared, "Sir Wilfrid Laurier is too English for me." He never said anything of the kind, but he had said that the policy of imperial parliamentary federation, advocated by the premier, was too English for him. This meant that instead of sending members to Ottawa to make our laws, vote the expenditure of money and govern us, we uphold the sentiments of the parliament at Westminster to do so. "I say it boldly and unhesitatingly," he continued, "that the policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier is too English for me. No one will go further than I in assisting the mother country, if need be, but it must be the free act and of the free will of the people of Canada, as determined by their own parliament (cheers), not one in Westminster."

Hugh John Macdonald was cheered to the echo as he denounced the utterances in Paris of Mr. Tarte.

Mr. Foster devoted himself to the fiscal issues and the broken promises of the Liberals, and was cheered throughout. When he wanted to desist the people would not hear of it.

Mr. Whitney also spoke denouncing the West Elgin frauds.

A noticeable feature of all these meetings is the approval shown by the audiences, when the speakers show up, that in the past the liberals have broken every promise they ever made. That looks well for election day.

Father Phillips says he deeply sympathizes with the miners in their efforts.
