TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Another Fight Imminent! The Khedive's Decree. Arabs Favour Arabi!

Special Despatch to the Examiner. ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 23. Wolsley has telegraphed saying that the troops are now being landed with all possible speed, and that a battle is imminent. The Khedive has issued another decree, ordering the authorities to obey at once the commands of General Wolsley, who has come here not to make war with the Egyptians, but to enlavour to restore order in Egypt, and to regain the authority of the Khedive, which has been usurped by the rebels and their leaders. The Arab tribes of Tripoli are growing excited over the reports that are being circulated among them concerning the movements of Arabi and his army. They are actively forming themselves into parties for his assistance, and proclaim themselves to be in favour of his efforts for the freedom of Egypt, and the honour of the Prophet.

France on the Situation.

Special to the Examiner. PARIS, Aug. 23. De Lesseps has telegraphed here that means have been established permitting regular traffic of the Suez Canal to proceed. Much irritation has been felt at the independent action of England on the subject. The French Press almost unanimously comment upon the British action regarding the closing of the Canal. Their denunciations of the action are bitter, and they imperatively demand the Ministry to sue England for breach of agreement on the question, and damages consequent on the checking of the trade and the fluctuation of the Canal stock.

Montenegro and Russia.

Special Despatch to the Examiner. CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 22. Much uneasiness is being felt here over the report that the Prince of Montenegro is going to St. Petersburg at the invitation of the Czar. Important results are expected to follow.

Burmah to the Front Now.

Special to the Examiner. BOMBAY, Aug. 22. The treaty which had been prepared by the Indian and the Burmese Governments has now been rejected by King Sheban of Burmah. The King objects to the abolishing of many of the monopolies from which he gains much of his revenue, and will not submit to the establishing of an armed guard at the British residence at Mandalay.

A Turkish Accident!

Special Despatch to the Examiner. CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 23. The gallery of the Hamedie Theatre fell here to-day, while a performance was in progress. A hundred and fifty persons are severely injured, some of them fatally.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Aug. 21. A despatch from Melbourne says Archbishop Goold, of the Roman Catholic diocese here, has been shot at and slightly wounded. His assailant has been arrested. He is named O'Farrell, and is a brother of the man who attempted to assassinate the Duke of Edinburgh, at Sydney, in March, 1868. A deputation of Irish members of Parliament will be sent to America by the Dublin Mansion House committee for the relief and protection of evicted tenants, and to secure them assistance. The conference of the Celtic Confederation will be held to consider the best means of assisting the movement. PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 21. Considerable uneasiness is felt here and at Cape May, regarding the whereabouts of the steamer "Republic," which left here at 7.15 this morning, for Cape May, with a party of excursionists. She was due at Cape May at 1 p. m., and was reported off Newcastle on her down trip at 10 a. m., since which time nothing has been heard of her. MADRID, Aug. 21. At a Cabinet Council held to-day, it was resolved to instruct the commanders of Spanish vessels on Egyptian waters to follow the example of the ships of other nations.
