Mr. T. W. Hodson, Dominion Live Stock Commissioner, arrived in Charlottetown on Saturday and is registered at the Hotel Davies. Today Mr. Hodson conferred with the Provincial Government and Board of Trade regarding the development of markets abroad and transportation facilities for live stock. Mr. Hodson is accompanied by Mr. Robertson of the Experimental Farm, Nappan, N. S., Mr. W. W. Hubbard, of Sussex, N. B., and some other gentlemen interested in the live stock industry. During their stay public meetings will be held at which addresses upon matters of importance to farmers and dairymen will be delivered.

LIVE STOCK MATTERS.

Interesting Meeting in the Premier's Office To-Day.

This forenoon, Mr. T. W. Hodson, Live Stock Commissioner, Mr. E. B. Elderkin, of Amherst, president of the Stock Breeders' Association, Mr. R. R. Robertson, superintendent of the Experimental Farm at Nappan, Nova Scotia, and Mr. W. W. Hubbard, of the Co-Operative Farmer, Sussex, N. B., waited upon the Provincial Government and the Board of Trade with regard to the matter of the transportation of live stock and the promotion of an industry of importance to our people. The meeting was held in the Premier's office in the Provincial Building, and there was a good attendance of members of the Government and of the Board of Trade.

Mr. Elderkin, who was the first speaker, emphasized the importance of co-operation on the part of the Federal and Provincial Governments and the people with a view to the promotion of the live stock industry in the maritime provinces. There was no reason why these provinces by the sea should not receive a large share of the live stock trade. The climatic and other conditions were highly favorable and the people were just as intelligent as the people of the upper provinces. The people of the maritime provinces should leave nothing undone that would be calculated to promote this industry, and the most advantageous rates of transportation should be obtained.

Mr. Hodson followed, speaking at considerable length. He dealt largely with the matters of transportation and organization, his remarks being largely along the lines set forth elsewhere in today's paper.

Mr. P. Blake coincided with Mr. Hodson regarding the breeding of live stock, and emphasized the importance of breeding nothing but the best. He thought it was a good thing to have Mr. Hodson address meetings of farmers throughout the country as the subject was one of vital importance to stock-raisers and others.

Mr. Geo. E. Hughes, President of the Board of Trade, also expressed his appreciation of Mr. Hodson's address. He would like to know what the Federal Government intended doing. He regretted to say that our horse trade was not what it should be nor what it had been. He thought the Government should import some good horses. He also thought a horse breeders association would be a good thing for the Island province. He hoped the visit of Mr. Hodson would be productive of much good.

Mr. Hodson, in reply to Mr. Hughes, said he had \$7,000 for use in his department. But he would not take up any work contrary to the wishes of the ministry of the day no matter whether that administration was Liberal or Conservative. He urged the importance of organization and system. Without organization nothing could be done. He did not believe in the government making importations and selling them cheaply to the detriment of private enterprise.

Mr. Robertson urged the importance of promoting the live stock industry and everything pertaining to agriculture.

Mr. Elderkin, referring to the purchase of thoroughbred horses by the Government, pointed out that such horses, as a rule, cost more money than private citizens cared to invest.

Mr. Horace Haezard spoke of the importance of direct steamship accommodation for the shipment of live stock as well as other products. It is important that facilities be afforded for the shipment of live stock after it has been provided by the farmers. There has been a notable decline in the demand for horses of late years, and as a consequence our farmers have not been paying the attention to horse-raising that they had been giving that industry in previous years.

Mr. Blake thought it would be a good idea for the Government to import a thoroughbred horse.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson thought it was slow work for the Government to import horses. But private enterprise moving in that direction might be subsidised by the Government.

Hon. Mr. McLean thought it was advisable to have a thoroughbred horse brought here. But whether the Government should import such a horse was a question.


Mr. Elderkin pointed out that the Stock Breeders Association proposed to have its annual meeting in Charlottetown in November, at which leading stock breeders and others would speak. The meeting then adjourned.
