Artist Williams, who is often referred to as the "Will Rogers of the comic art field," is famed around the world for his "Out Our Way" cartoons which he draws for NEA Service, Inc., and which appear daily in more than 700 newspapers.

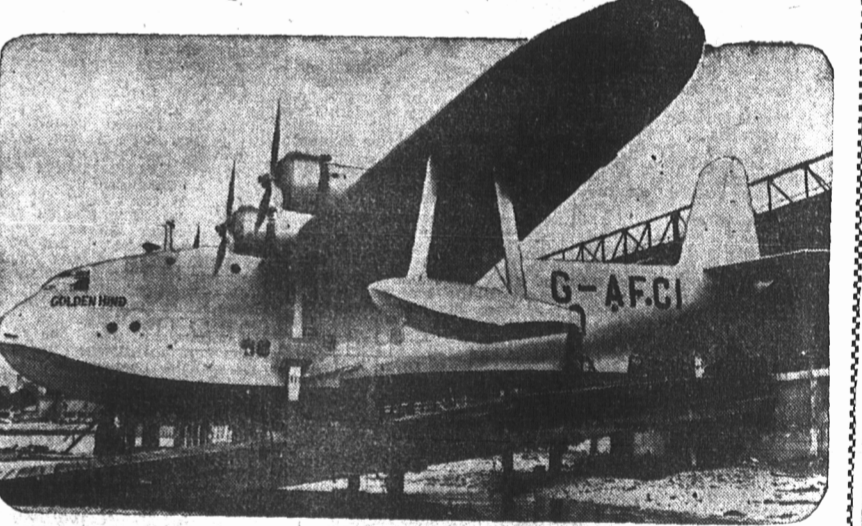

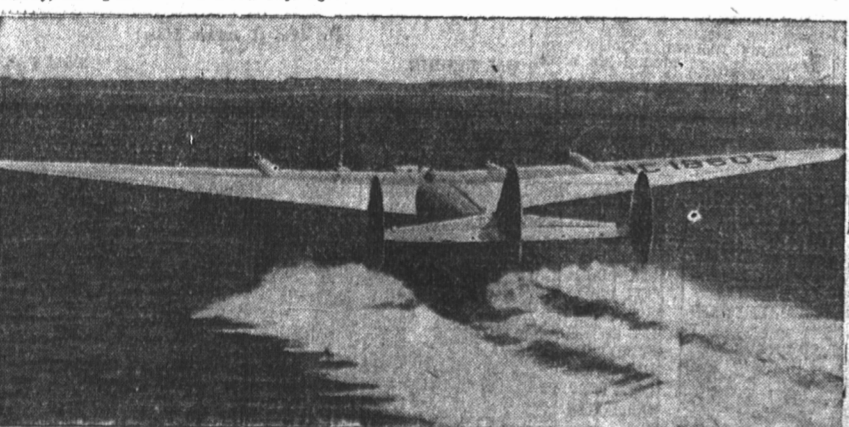

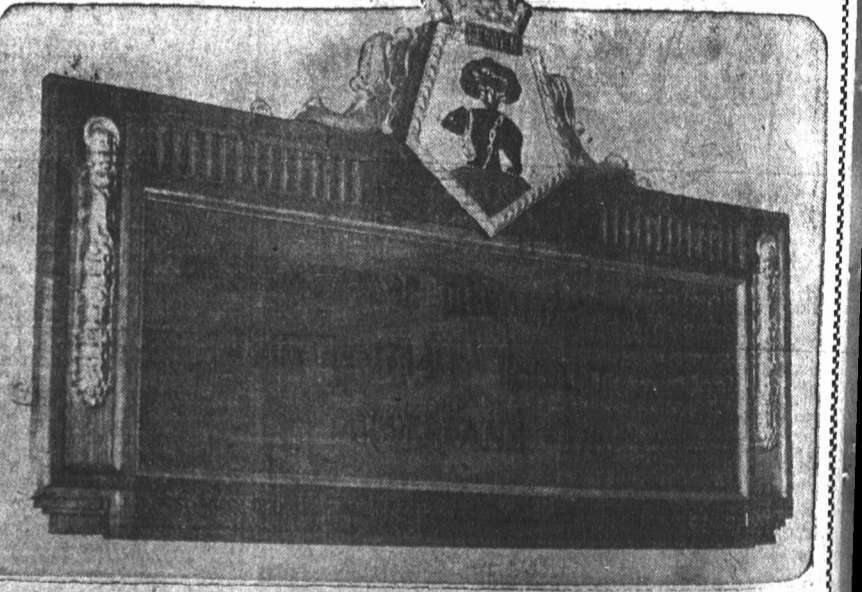
First of the new "G" class flying boats for Imperial Airways, the 31 1-2-ton Golden Hind took to the water at Rochester, Eng., a few days ago. The interior of the huge craft, the size on which is indicated by the figure on the launching incline, is divided into two decks, the upper one for crew and 180-190 miles an hour, and a top speed of over 200 miles an hour.



With little fanfare despite the fact that it was making history, Pan American Airways' 41-ton flying boat Dixie Clipper takes off from its Fort Washington, L. I., base. Carrying 22 passengers it inaugurated the first regular transatlantic passenger airplane service.

Here out in the open, on the quarter deck, is what might be called the trophy room. The crest of the ship is displayed aboard warships, facing the quarter deck, which is aft the mainmast.
