The Cholera.

This dreadful disease is creating the most fearful havoc in Danietta and elsewhere in Egypt. Hundreds are daily falling victims to the terrible scourge. One hundred and twenty persons are reported to have died on Monday last. Before and since then, many more have been added to the death list, and there is at present but little sign of abatement. There are many reasons given for this outbreak, the most important of which point out the fact that it is largely due to the poor and unhealthy condition of the people, and the absence of anything like sanitary arrangements. As it has often done before, so now cholera has reached America. One case is reported from Toronto. With the view of ascertaining, if possible, the cause of the attack, Dr. Caniff, medical officer of health, visited the place on Saturday last. He found certain conditions, any of which might, under favorable circumstances, produce disease with choleric symptoms. A sink was placed close by the kitchen door, which every person in the house had to pass in going to the yard and back buildings. This sink connected with the privy by a pipe, and another pipe from the privy entered the street sewer. The position in which the pipes were placed was such that washing out of the pit was impossible. Bad ventilation, imperfect sewage, foul gases arising in houses from sinks, existence of dirt-heaps, decomposing vegetable matter, etc., will introduce the terrible disease in any community, especially in the hot summer months, and will assist in spreading it. Therefore it ought to be imperative on the part of everybody to see that the yards, sinks, etc., are as clean as possible.

Charlottetown Hospital.

ABOUT three hundred patients have been treated in the Hospital since its doors were opened less than three years ago. It is worthy of remark that of these only six terminated fatally.

Last autumn, the Hospital was considerably enlarged; and since then the number of patients has consequently increased. During the six months, ending 30th June, seventy-two were admitted and treated; and though this is the season when the applicants are fewest, there is even now, quite a number of persons under treatment. A glance through the Hospital will show that every part of it is scrupulously clean, and that the Institution is well ordered. Here is a young girl whose life has been saved by an amputation above the knee. There is another whose eyes have been preserved. Younger are poor women suffering from rheumatic affections, general debility, apoplexy, etc. In the men's department several very important cases are under treatment, perhaps the most important one being that of a young man who has had his leg cut off at the hip. The cures effected, in some cases, are really wonderful. They show that the physicians are men of great skill; that the nurses are careful and constant; and that the Hospital is absolutely needed. As there is no test of admission except that of suffering, the patients are drawn from all classes and creeds in the community.

The Senate.

The chief ground of the attack of the Opposition against the Senate is that the Senate usually passes the measures of Sir John Macdonald. Referring to this argument the Toronto Mail says:

"What the Globe says of the Senate, viz: that it 'always does what Sir John tells it,' is just what it says of the Commons also. The Senate supports Sir John—abolish it. The Commons supports Sir John—then abolish that, too! The people support Sir John—away also with the people! Our Governors-General generally support Sir John Macdonald—let them be well abused! The law officers of the crown, invariably sustain Sir John—hang the law officers! Her Majesty the Queen honors Sir John—the Globe professes it is not loyal to such a dynasty! These fit notions rapidly reduce themselves to absurdities."

The result of the Emerson election has taught the Manitoba Premier the wisdom of party stability. In addressing the electors of that constituency after the return of the Conservative candidate, Mr. Douglas, Mr. Norquay said that "if there was a doubt in the minds of any with regard to his government not being a party government he wanted that doubt removed from their minds, as from that day forward his government would be run on strict party lines, and he hoped they would consider him the leader of the great Conservative party in the Local House." As a result of that announcement Mr. Norquay will be stronger in Manitoba than ever before, a section of the Conservative party having lately become alienated from him because of his disposition to wipe out party lines in the last provincial general elections, and this wing, as Capt. Scott, M. P., stated, after hearing the Premier's declaration will now give him his cordial support.

POTATO BUG.—"This pretty little insect," writes a correspondent at Bathurst to the Chatham Advance, "is causing our farmers no small amount of alarm this season, having already appeared in large numbers. A Salmon Beach farmer is responsible for the statement that they are sitting on the fences in that neighborhood waiting for the potatoes to grow."

There is a hum in herring, not in quantity so far, but in size. Fishermen feel cheerful at the thought of having a good catch of the present size when the proper time arrives. They are "so big" now—days that they look like a cross-breed between a codfish and a mackerel. They are not quite as large as a decent codfish—that's a fact—but it would take quite a respectable mackerel to out-do them. They are fat and fry well, and if you were only up here yourself, your voice might add additional weight to their edible qualities; that is if Editors are capable of anything less than salmon steaks and roast beef.

The gloom of the tragedy of Barbara Weir reached even here. Some of the young folks who perished were well known to many in this village. We are born to laugh and weep. In the centre of life comes death. The "three score and ten" may be cut short by many a year. The sunshine of pleasure is dimmed by clouds of sorrow, and accidents become inexorable realities. Only four or five weeks ago the writer spent a pleasant hour with two of the six who so sadly met a watery doom. It was an hour well spent. "Next time we meet, we'll have a good time," was the laughing good-bye. "Next time we meet" sternly will tell the tale in the stern fact of to-day. For the present, tears will flow. May the weeping friends of all who perished find true peace from the thorn crowned King of comfort, who loveth better than a brother. Our sorrows may be heavy, yet smiles may visit them. His were the weight of a world, borne alone; a loneliness terrible in its intensity, the sunless resurrection of Calvary, almost his only companion. He who walked on the waters and conquered the angry waves, can surely comfort them in the midst of their heaviest sorrows. The fire of compassion never dies in His sacred heart.

Souris has been all alive during the present week. It is years out of all recollection since so many people were here together at once. The oldest inhabitant never saw the like of it. The Redeemtorist Fathers have paid us a visit, and we have had a week of prayers and sermons. Some of the Priests have already departed. Others remain, continuing the Mission during part of next week. If authority has any weight, and truth any force, we should all be the better for the visit of these holy men. That actual good is being done, is patent to all. They spoke, as none dare speak, or can speak, save Catholic Priests. Your Catholic readers know all about it; your Protestant readers may possibly be careless about it. After all, there is the same heaven or hell for the whole of us; the same judgment; the same mercy and love. "Where will we be then?" was the solemn question asked. We all must answer, but there are only two roads, the one "narrow" the other "broad." The instructions given by the four priests who visited here, were intensely earnest, thrilling in their truth and eloquence, and inspired by a pious zeal, breathing forth eternal truths in no uncertain sound.

Austin McDonald, Esq., M. P., is on a visit here. Many hearts are sad because of the intelligence of the death of the much beloved Father McGillivray. Summer prospects for general trade, are on the whole, very fair. Pleasure parties abound. Tea parties come round now and then. Dominion Day was flat. 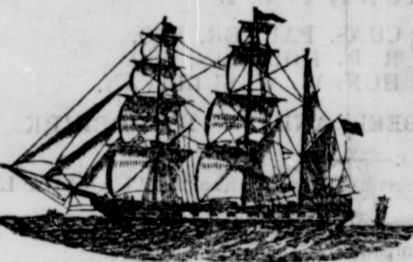
