The Liberal Outlook for the Future

It is with justifiable confidence that Premier Alex. W. Matheson, and his Liberal Candidates, go to the people on their wonderful Record of Performance. Everything indicates that our people approve their efforts and that the Matheson Government will be returned to power with an increased majority on Wednesday next. Our voters are in hearty agreement with the Premier's words at Montague that: "We have accomplished more in the past two years than many governments have in twice the time."

The Premier has on several occasions made the statement that: "As long as I am head of the Liberal Party we will fulfill any promise that we make, and not make promises that we cannot fulfill." It is for this reason, and from past performance, that the following Liberal Platform of 1955 will be accepted at full value:—

LIBERAL PLATFORM 1955

1. At the Federal Conference to be assembled this fall we will exert our utmost endeavour in pressing our claims for increased subsidies for our Province.

2. Having established a feeling of mutual confidence with the Federal Government we believe it would be detrimental to the welfare of the Province to return a Conservative Government at this time. We believe we can get a better deal with Ottawa than our opponents.

3. The present policy of meetings with the Premiers and Ministers of the Maritime Provinces will be continued in order that a unified opinion may be expressed on Maritime affairs.

4. The present policy for rural electrification will be continued and amended where necessary until all areas desiring service have been provided for.

5. To investigate the feasibility of establishing a jail farm or industrial institution so that prisoners will be usefully employed.

AGRICULTURE

6. To continue to encourage the canning, processing and freezing of agricultural and fishery products.

7. To continue and further extend the present policy of veterinary assistance.

8. To take advantage of the fact that this Province is a restricted area, we propose to further encourage the use of pure bred and improved stock.

9. To institute at the earliest possible date additional units for artificial insemination for the further improvement of our cattle.

10. To continue and further improve a policy of dairy instruction and adequate check testing of milk and cream.

11. To continue to support local, county and provincial exhibitions and to institute at the next session of the Legislature methods of equitable subsidies for all such fairs based on amount of prize money.

12. To investigate the desirability of providing regional centres in selected communities for agricultural education, organizing and promotional purposes.

13. To endeavour to formulate a program that will be of mutual benefit to organized groups of interested farmers as well as to the already well-established agriculturists.

EDUCATION

14. Every effort will be made to provide higher salaries for our teachers. Increases which may be obtained under new agreements with the Federal Government will be used in the further promotion of education, including higher salaries for our teachers.

15. We will continue to complete the arrangements which were entered into last year with the other Atlantic Provinces for providing school text books of a uniform standard at the lowest possible rates.

INDUSTRY AND NATURAL RESOURCES

16. To continue in conjunction with the Federal Government the present reforestation policy.

17. Assistance for modern processing and cold storage plants for inshore fisheries will be provided.

18. Extension of trade with Newfoundland, the other Maritime Provinces and to the North Shore of the St. Lawrence will be vigorously encouraged.

19. An effort will be made to secure the services of additional scheduled ferries for the transportation of motor vehicles from Prince Edward Island to the mainland.

20. We will institute a policy to provide adequate fire-fighting equipment to incorporated villages for the protection of property in the villages and surrounding farm areas.

21. We will use our utmost endeavours to preserve for this Province an adequate railway service.

LABOR

22. The new Ministry of Labor which was provided for at the recent Session of the Legislature will be established

by June 15th next and will have as one of its first duties a thorough investigation into minimum industrial wage laws and the establishment of a board to regulate and assist labor relations.

HEALTH AND WELFARE

23. Early completion of the Treatment Centre at Falconwood.

24. Enlargement of the Polio Clinic at the Sanatorium.

25. Provision of polio vaccine inoculation for all children.

26. Enlarged facilities for the housing of our older citizens at Beach Grove.

27. The present policy of dental assistance will be continued and enlarged.

28. The present policy of sanitary inspection will be continued and further developed.

PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

29. To continue the policy inaugurated by previous Liberal Governments in constructing permanent public works.

30. To continue and further extend the present Government's policy of subgrading and hard surfacing of highways.

31. To continue and further extend the present policy of dust free roads for the main streets of villages.

32. To continue in co-operation with the Federal Government the improvement of roads and bridges.

33. To continue and extend the present policy of keeping roads open during the winter months.

34. To establish a research division in the Department of Highways to investigate the most efficient and economical system for the use of local materials necessary for the construction of first class roads.
