

say stories—he has been advised and truly believes that such and such a one has strong political prejudices—that he holds a government office, or that he has represented a member of the government upon the hustings at elections, &c. &c. Thus, forsooth, because a man dares to entertain political feelings in opposition to those of the deponent—or because he may be the possessor of a petty government office, he is therefore to be denied the enjoyment of his civil rights; or, if allowed to exercise them, to be stigmatised as one who has "no regard for the sanctity of an oath."

According to the views expressed of the Jury panel by Mr. Duncan Maclean, it is quite evident that no Jury would satisfy him unless one in which every man held political opinions adverse to the defendant and to the Government;—with such a jury it would not be "wise and useless to go to trial;" but let there be even two determined liberals on the panel, and he is ready to shirk going to trial, hiding himself behind a flagrantly false and wretchedly quibbling affidavit. We now say that the affidavit above inserted is false, and we are prepared to prove that it is false in several particulars. It is false, and thoroughly false, in its allegations against the under Sheriff—it is false in asserting that any one of the Jury "are" what is "termed Rowdies"—it is false in asserting that any one of them is of "a low standard of morals."

We do not know of any man, out of the whole panel, who has ever yet been arraigned for any violation of the laws of his country;—but is Duncan Maclean the man, who liveth not in a glass house, and who may with impunity libel his fellow colonists about their want of morality? Who has ever, or who ever could, take the gauge of his moral standard? Is he not a blasphemer? Has he not been publicly accused of that crime? and has he not shrunk from an investigation? Is he not a convicted libeller—the records of the Supreme Court to prove the fact? Has he purged himself from the accusation of felony? And is he not an infidel, or the very next thing to it? And at what period of his life—in what sphere of action, has he given evidence of the existence of a higher tone of morality than what distinguishes the commonest herd of humanity? He is, indeed, "a Daniel come to judgment" on the score of morality. We are sure the humblest man on the special panel would be sorry to make Duncan Maclean's character as the standard of morals for his own.

The objections to the jury made by Duncan Maclean, may be summed up as follows:—1. That a majority of them had political opinions in opposition to his own. 2. That some of them hold Government offices, and represented at one time or another members of the Government at elections. 3. That those and others had been "animadverted upon in the public press by the said Deponent." Really, these are very substantial reasons for setting aside a jury. With regard to the first, we should like to know where any twelve men can be found in this country who have not their political opinions on the one side or the other? If the existence of political opinions on one side or the other was to be considered as a text for disqualifying a man to serve upon a jury, then we should never have a jury to try any cause. As to the second ground of complaint, that some of the special panel hold Government offices, such as Road Commissioner, Collector of Excise, &c., it is not to be presumed that the possession of any such office must necessarily entail the crime of perjury, although the slander is broadly insinuated by Maclean. "Suppose they were not Government officers, and cherished "deep prejudices" against the Defendant, would they be fit persons to try the cause at issue? Of course Maclean thinks they would, and it is only such persons he would be satisfied to see upon the jury.

But the third objection to the jury is the most shallow and unprincipled of any offered by Maclean—some of them being, as he says, persons "upon whom he hath commented in the public press." Here, then, it is broadly asserted, that when an unprincipled writer chooses to scatter his ribald slang and indulge his slanderous propensities against unoffending persons in the community, those unoffending persons must be debarred their civil rights; should the exercise of those rights come in contact with the slanderer! Such an open and shameful avowal of guilt and rascality, we have never before heard! As to the serious crime imputed to some of the jury, that they represented the Hon. George Coles, a member of the Government, at his election, we might urge a very fair set-off in the person of Mr. James Miller, "No. 8," who represented Mr. George Beer, in opposition to Mr. Coles and the Government, and was appointed, at the last election, to represent Mr. John McLeod on the same ticket.

Other observations respecting the affidavit of Duncan Maclean, and the jury whom he has slandered, we must reserve for another week. We have much satisfaction in presenting the list for the inspection of the public, and it will be seen that it embraces many of the most respectable names in the County.

**UNITED STATES.**  
**CALIFORNIA.**—Dates from San Francisco are to the 5th of June. Casey and Cora, the murderers of Mr. King, were hung on the 22d of May, the day the latter was buried. Several other desperate characters, including Yankee Sullivan, had been arrested by the Vigilance Committee. That notorious individual committed suicide in his cell on the 1st of June, leaving a confession touching the elections in San Francisco. Martial law had been declared in the city; but the Committee were determined to carry out their measures, and continued to make arrests. All the journals, except the Herald, sided with the Committee.

**GREAT FIRE IN PORTLAND, MAINE.**—A destructive fire broke out in Portland on the morning of the 24th June, at 3 o'clock, on Middle-street, near Temple-street, and, as we learn, committed great havoc. The fire broke out in the small buildings in the rear of Barker & Dingley's stable, and consumed that building, the Casco House stable, a building next the stable containing sheriff Emery's office, the Temple-street Church, the Codman House and stable, Muzzey's Block, the Casco House, and the small buildings in the rear of Exchange-st. The whole space between Exchange-st. and Temple-st. was entirely burned down, with the exception of the buildings fronting Federal and Middle-streets, also the two story block on the corner of Temple and Middle-streets. The horses and carriages were principally saved. It is stated that most of the sufferers are pretty well insured. The State of Maine estimates the loss at \$200,000.

bishop; accordingly a large number of churchmen in Canada soon subscribed, among themselves, the required sum, upon the somewhat singular condition that the clergyman selected should not be a Canadian; and it was afterwards agreed that the money should be handed to the Colonial Secretary, together with the name of the Rev. Thomas Higgs, who consented to accept the bishopric, if he could be appointed without becoming a candidate, or presenting himself for election by any body of clergy or laity. The bishop of Toronto insists upon the new bishop being elected by his clerical synod, and thus the matter remains.

The Legislative Council, on the 28th ult., by a vote of 12 to 9, threw out the Supply Bill. This extraordinary step, which, if not immediately remedied, will throw the whole province into confusion, was taken in consequence of the Council's objection to the vote of £50,000 for the seat of government building at Quebec.

**NEW BRUNSWICK.**

We are authorised to state that his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has, upon the petition of the jury, and the recommendation of the Judge who tried the prisoner, commuted the sentence of death passed on O'Neill, for killing Cotter, to fourteen years imprisonment in the Penitentiary. We understand that during the prisoner's incarceration he has manifested unusual signs of penitence, and since he has known of the commutation of his punishment, joy has had almost as much effect upon him as grief had previously.—*St. John Morning Courier.*

**NOVA SCOTIA.**

**Pictou, July 3.**  
**MAN SHOT.**—A mutinous affray took place last Tuesday evening on board the brig Oregon, Capt. Green, lying in the stream ready for sea. It appears that the mate and crew, who were all more or less under the influence of liquor, quarrelled with the captain, under some pretext, the particulars of which we have not heard, when he retired to his cabin for protection. They attempted to follow him, and even went so far as to smash in the door and windows, when the captain in self-defence found it necessary to resort to fire arms, and seizing a pistol, shot the foremost one of the gang, the contents entering the stomach. This had the effect of sobering the crew who attempted no further violence. An investigation was had before the magistrates yesterday. We shall endeavor to give particulars next week. The wound, we understand, is not likely to prove fatal.—*Eastern Chronicle.*

**FATAL ACCIDENT.**—While Mr. Henry Mills, of Goose River, County of Cumberland, was engaged, on Monday last, in driving a cart-load of deals to market, in going down a steep hill the horse ran, and he being in advance of the load was knocked down, the wheels passing over his body, injuring him so severely that death resulted in a short time.—*ib.*

A smart thunder-storm, accompanied with rain, passed over this place on Tuesday morning. The storm was felt more severely to the westward of this. At Peggwash a barn belonging to the hon. Mr. Pines was struck by lightning, and burned to the ground, together with a large quantity of hay which it contained.—*ib.*

The body of Captain Watson, of the brig James Douse, was found on Wednesday morning last, at the head of Pownal wharf, in a standing position. It is supposed that the deceased fell between the wharf and the vessel.—*Hus. Gaz.*

The steamer *Rosbud*, with the Honorables G. Coles, W. W. Lord and George Birnie on board, ran over to Tatamagouche on Tuesday last, for the purpose of ascertaining the practicability of making that harbour the mail route between Halifax and Charlottetown. After inspecting the several landing places, they left for Truro the same afternoon, and returned the following morning to Tatamagouche, when they proceeded to Point Beule, and embarked for Charlottetown, arriving here at a quarter past eight, p.m. We understand those gentlemen report favourably of the harbour and the road to Truro. The advantages connected with this route are the saving of about thirty miles (on land and sea) between Charlottetown and Truro, compared with the Pictou route, and the great accommodation to travellers of resting for the night at Truro. The *Rosbud* made the trip each way in four and a half hours, and the journey from Tatamagouche to Truro will not exceed four hours. The whole distance from Charlottetown to Halifax can be performed within fourteen hours, as the railroad from Halifax is promised to be completed within twenty miles of Truro, in June next.—*ib.*
