Field Survey Work Report

Practically all the field work in Queen's County was completed during the season of 1949 it was indicated in the annual report of the Prince Edward Island Provincial Survey submitted by Mr. V. A. MacDonald, Chief Surveyor, and tabled this week in the Legislature.

The work involved surveying and establishing posts at approximately two mile intervals along practically all roads between Savage Harbour and Charlottetown and the Prince County line. About two weeks' work remains to be done in the County. The last two geodetic points tied into were at Shamrock and Irish-town near the Prince County line. Going west from the Prince County line we have geodetic points at Seacow Head and Indian Head lighthouses and the stand-pipe at Summerside. Others are at Miscouche, R. C. Church Spire, Egmont Bay monument and lighthouse, Green Hill monument, West Point monument and lighthouse, Elmsdale monument, Cas-cumpeck lighthouse and Tignish R. C. Church.

Cape Bear Light "In the course of our work we tied, in to the lighthouse at Cape Bear. Later on upon working out our traverses in the office a considerable discrepancy was discovered in the position of this lighthouse. This was all the more confusing as our work tied in nicely with other known points. A search was made for factors in the calculations that would affect our triangulation with the lighthouse without changing our traverses. Nothing was found. At this point

we contacted the Marine Department. The answer was the lighthouse had been rebuilt on a new location.

"Throughout the Province there is a total of 40 geodetic stations as follows: 12 primary, 5 secondary and 25 supplementary stations. Primary and secondary stations are substantially built of concrete at points chosen for their high elevation.

"When these stations were established it was necessary to erect observation towers averaging 54 feet high to clear local obstructions and allow for the curvature of the earth on observations from the mainland.

The highest tower erected in this Province - 70 feet - was at West Point on the south of the O'Leary Road, about 3 miles west of O'Leary on the C. N. R. The average observed distance was 23 miles and the longest was 43 miles. Of the 25 supplementary stations 13 are lighthouses, 10 are church spires and two are stand-pipes.

Division Line Sections Three sections of division lines comprising the rear boundary of a number of farms were established late in the season. The first was west of Richmond in Lot 14. The next section established was on the division line between the Surrey Road farms and the farms fronting the Jona Road. A section of a division line was also adjusted near St. Peter's.

A survey was made for a change in railroad crossing at Pisquid also a plan of same was prepared

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To be submitted to the Board of Railroad Commissioners.

Up to the present time two districts, First King's and Fourth Queen's, have been declared areas where the provisions of the "Survey Act of 1945" shall apply.

Plans for Second and Third King's indicating the position of crossroads posts with the necessary co-ordinates and azimuths for the same have been printed. King's Second District book contains 41 plans, third district book contains 44 plans.

Plan book for fourth King's containing 35 plans is now in the printers' hands and the fifth King's book with 38 plans will soon be available.

Traverse adjustment is proceeding satisfactorily in Queen's County, the third district being well advanced.

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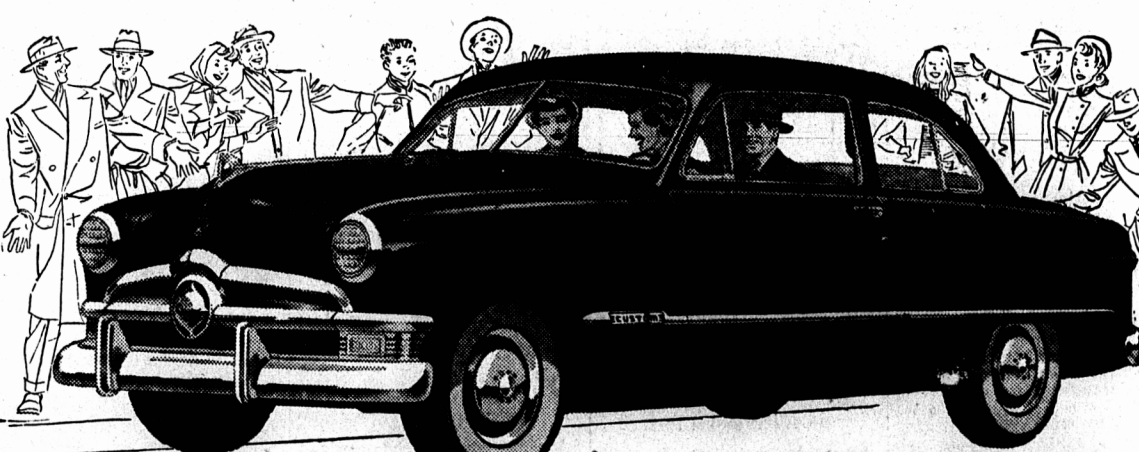
