THE LEGISLATURE. Legislative Council Debates. WEDNESDAY, July 8. MORNING SESSION. The Bill to amend the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act was read a third time and passed.

County Courts Act. House in committee on the further consideration of the Bill to amend the County Courts Amendment Act 1878. Several clauses were read and agreed to.

A Stirring Appeal. Rev. W. W. Brewer preached a noble sermon Sunday evening in the First Methodist Church, on the subject of manliness, referring in the course of it to the civic contest. His text was St. Luke, 1. 15. For he shall be great in the sight of God. These words of St. Luke were applied to John the Baptist. What is greatness? In the sight of man it is Power, Strength Skill, etc. In the sight of God it is Goodness. It is not dependent on birth, or rank, or position, or gold, or raiment. Shakespeare says apparel makes the man. It often makes a fool of him, and of woman too. Greatness is also independent of success. It is an unwavering decision for God and the right and the truth, never halting between two opinions, never giving on the fence. It comes from character and service, and is obtained only from God. The preacher then made an earnest and rousing appeal for a nobler christian manhood. The crying need of to-day is men of brain, of purpose, of heart and of conscience, not time serving, weak, sneaking, cowardly men, who are always sold like their cattle, not men who will doff their caps to what they know to be wrong. God give us men, for a time like this in Charlottetown demands them.

In order that the public may represent as they best know how the slanderous utterances of the Rum-Anti-Reform party through their organ the Herald, we give below, without comment, its latest falsehood. happ it is just as well to leave it as it is. There should be an additional circuit of the Court at Mount Stewart which is a large village where a considerable business is being done, and it is to be regretted that the Leader of the Government took no notice of the wishes of the people in that matter. We cannot in this House introduce an amendment which would cause an expenditure of money.

Mr. SCHEMBOUR.—I cannot understand the object of this Bill. There is no difficulty for the Judge to get to Eldon at any season of the year; if the Hillsborough is impassable he can take the train to Peake's Station and drive to Eldon. There would be just as much difficulty for the men who are used from Eldon or Wood Islands to get to Charlottetown Court. This Bill will not benefit the honest traders in the country, but there is a class of people in the shape of agents who go through the country and induce people to purchase articles, and then they sue those persons to the Charlottetown Court at a season of the year when they know it will be almost impossible for them to attend. If we make any change we should make it to favor the poor man. Another provision of the Bill is that the first circuit in King's County is to be held near the Head of Murray River as may be deemed most convenient. It has always been held in the same place and the place should be fixed, otherwise people might not know where the Court was held. Men can be sued to Charlottetown from any part of the country and the Bill provides nothing to add to the convenience of the people; it is all in favor of the Judges.

Mr. ROSE—I quite agree with the remarks of the hon. member from Cardigan; if the time of holding the court at Eldon is to be changed to suit the convenience of the judge, the time of holding the court in Charlottetown should be changed to suit the people. I would move that the court in Charlottetown be held the second Tuesday in March instead of the fourth. People from Eldon and all that part of the country who are sued to Charlottetown in March have to come around by Mount Stewart as they cannot cross the river at that season of the year. I may say I am sorry that when the Legislature was amending this act they did not see fit to make an additional circuit of the court at Mount Stewart. A large petition was sent in by the people of that section of the country and I am sorry the leader of the Government ignored that petition. I am informed it was not presented in the House of Assembly. It was signed by a large number of his political friends, but it appears as if the leader would rather favor the petitions of lawyers and judges than of his own constituents. I would move the following amendment: "That said Act be amended by adding an additional circuit at Mount Stewart in accordance with the petition presented to this House." There are a large number of persons in the St. Peter's district who wish to have a court at Mount Stewart. People on the east side of the river are put to a great inconvenience in the spring as they have to come around by Mount Stewart to get to the court at Dunstaffnage. There was a move made to have that court removed to Mount Stewart and it passed both Houses of the Legislature but when it came up for the Governor's sanction it was found that a schedule had been omitted and the bill did not become law.

Mr. ROGERS—I have great sympathy with the amendment proposed by his honor to alter the date of holding the court in Charlottetown, but the day he proposes to change it to is the day the court is held at St. Peter's road. I would suggest striking out the month of December and inserting January and striking out the month of March and inserting April for the court at Charlottetown. On the fourth Tuesday in January the ice would be safe to cross and in April the steamers would be running.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—That would interfere with the Supreme Court. Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—With respect to the statement of his honor from Cardigan the alteration proposed in the Bill only provided for the convenience of the people as well as of the Judge. I have no objection to the proposal to change the time for holding the Court in Charlottetown except that we must be careful not to run against some other convenience.

Mr. NICHOLSON.—I am well satisfied with the change in the time of holding the Court at Eldon; it will be a convenience to the people as well as to the Judge. I would like to see the Court in Charlottetown held at an earlier date than the fourth Tuesday in December and March, but the difficulty is to choose a day that will be suitable. However not many cases from that side of the river come to Charlottetown so per-

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
