NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Splendid growing weather! The growing grain is already covering many fields.

Man and Empire.—The Toronto Globe will have in wheat 94 cents in Toronto and 84 cents in Buffalo.

It is stated that the Dominion Government will withdraw its remedial order and that the Manitoba Government will place the schools upon the same footing as those of Ontario.

It was hoped that when the tumble-down building near Black Sam's Bridge was vacated a few weeks ago it would be speedily torn down.

Another tenant has gone into it. The building is disgraceful to Charlottetown. Cannot the authorities take action in respect to it? The Board of Health ought to look into it.

Newfoundland is suffering from a surfeit of politics. The people seem to have striven to govern themselves to death.

Unless a loan enables them to keep on governing themselves a little longer a royal commission will relieve them of that burdensome responsibility.

About 8,600 lbs. of milk were received at the New Perth Creamery yesterday. People who believe that cows require rest for several months during the winter should make a note of this.

From November of last year the end of the month over 16,000 lbs. of butter will have been made at New Perth. Cheese-making will begin at this factory next week.

The St. John Globe remarks that the country ought to commend the decision of the Government not to give two hundred and fifty thousand dollars to a world's fair next year at Montreal, and says that a fair such as was proposed would be a very good thing, but this country must try and get along without several good things for some time.

A striking contrast between the execution of the laws in the United States and Great Britain is afforded by the cases of Dr. Buchanan and Oscar Wilde.

The former has been dragging on for years and Buchanan is still fighting for life. The latter was first heard of not two months ago, and Wilde has, after a full investigation and trial, entered upon his term of punishment.

Russian activity in Eastern affairs, due in part to the established policy of the government, and in part, no doubt, to the journey of Nicholas II, while Czar, through the countries adjoining his empire, has quickened in the Czar. What may be expected from this autocrat of 120,000,000 subjects of diverse races, in an article on "The New Czar," in Harper's Magazine for June.

The controlling spirit of the State convention of King's Daughters is Mrs. Frank M. Goodchild, the energetic secretary of the organization.

Mrs. Goodchild is a bright, witty woman, as is evidenced by the following conversational incident: "Now, don't you think every woman should have a vote?" earnestly queried a rather severe-looking member of the order.

"I don't know about that," quietly responded the secretary, with a merry twinkle in her eye, "but I do think that every woman ought to have a voter."

Montreal Gazette: Mr. Joseph Chamberlain's latest speech indicates that the Conservatives and Liberal-Unionists, instead of severing their alliance, have become one party, seeking to pursue a sober constructive programme of constitutional reform and legitimate development of the Empire.

The Conservative-Union organization in Britain has gone through the same process as did the Conservative-Union party in Canada.

The Toronto Globe remarks that after repeated failures the Canadian Fishery Department has given up hope of inducing the American authorities to reciprocate in the preservation of fish in the international waters.

NEWS NOTES.

Great Britain, it is reported, has selected the Fanning Island route for her military cable.

Some of the Paris papers are carrying on a crusade against the importation of American lard into France.

General Lord Roberts has been promoted to be a field marshal in succession to the late Sir Patrick Grant.

Jabez Spencer Balfour, the Liberator Building society swindler, has been formally committed for trial in London.

A Missouri farmer sent a dollar in answer to an advertisement to find out "How to get rich," and received a card which reads, "The best plan is to lay off your wicket."

Letters received at Ottawa from Hon. J. C. Patterson indicate that his trip to the Pacific Coast has proved very beneficial. He will probably return to Ottawa in about a fortnight.

A French judge before whom a divorce case was recently tried complicated matters seriously by handing down a decree divorcing the lawyer who appeared for the man who had asked for a divorce instead of the man himself.

G. W. Smalley, for many years the London correspondent of the New York Tribune, sailed from Queenstown for New York on the steamer Teutonic.

Mr. Isaac N. Ford has assumed the duties of Tribune correspondent in succession to Mr. Smalley.

Several young women in London have started a novel and sensible dressmaking establishment. They take last season's dresses and make them over in the prevailing fashion.

No entry new dresses are made, and the charges are reasonable. Bernhardt expects to pass the summer in an old ruined castle on the Atlantic coast of Brittany, where she hopes to lead the life of a barbarian.

Survivors of Waterloo are so few in England and France, where they should be, in the nature of things, more numerous than elsewhere.

According to the Review of Reviews, it is estimated that in Great Britain, with its population of thirty-six millions, there are some about seven hundred thousand men out of work.

Prince Arsenberg, General the Marquis de Galliffet, Benjamin Constant, the painter, and a number of other influential Parisians, by their own initiative, have formed a committee for the erection and endowment of Mohammedan mosques on the banks of the Seine.

The Government approves the scheme, which it is expected, will be realized in the near future.

The steamer Campana, which is to take the place of the old Miramichi on the lower St. Lawrence route from this port is a two-screw, iron steamer, 255 feet in length, 36 feet beam and 20 feet moulded depth.

To pose as "Trilby" means to represent her entirely, writes Edward W. Bok in the June Ladies' Home Journal.

"Trilby" lacked the great and overpowering quality that stamps true womanhood: character.

"Twist the facts as we may, portray 'Trilby' as we like, that one fact stares us in the face and remains. We cannot get away from it.

Mr. Du Maurier states the fact, and states it plainly. It makes not an iota of difference that she did not sell herself for money or for station but of her own accord; she gave away the greatest possession of woman, without which she becomes nothing.

She repented afterwards, it is true. But it is not decreed in this life that the innocence of a woman is restored to her by repentance once her virtue is lost.

It is not meeting the case to point to man in comparison. Nature has set upon woman her law, and that law is inexorable. It is permissible that she shall read of women who make mistakes in life, and we do not necessarily injure ourselves by such reading.

More-over, we can and should sympathize with them, and help them. This is humane; it is Christian; it is Christian-like. We can, in our hearts, condone and forgive. But it is not asked of us to impersonate such women, allowing their lives to be a moment to become a part of ourselves, even when the cause is charity. It is a poor charity that seeks its aims by asking purity to be an impurity.

Let us be content to read 'Trilby's' scandalous and ungracious and virtues which she undoubtedly possessed. But let us leave her in the book, where her author intended she should be.

To take her out of her place, to dress and bring her to life is to take the character beyond the life of burlesque. It merges on to the unsavory. It makes the girl who personates her, for the time being, the "Trilby" of the Latin Quarter, or of Mr. Du Maurier's story, but the American girl "Trilbyized." And that no self-respecting American girl can afford to become.

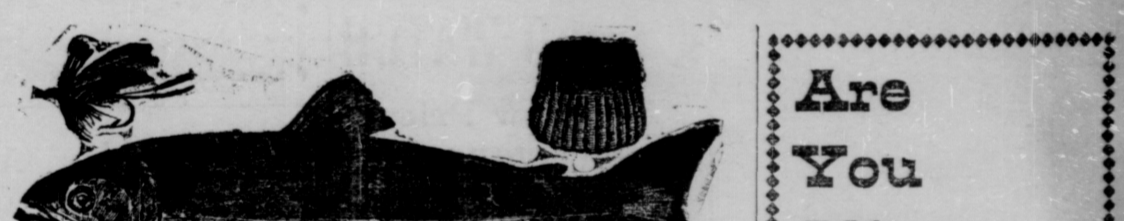
