Notes and Clippings.

The Boston Herald has a half column despatch under the startling heading "Achance to get a home. New Hampshire has 887 farms that are deserted."

A London despatch reports that considerable excitement is caused in Vienna by the report that the Prince of Montenegro has ceded a portion of the Bay of Antvri to Russia, and that the Czar has already given orders for the establishment of a naval depot there, and the building of a fort.

W. H. Hutchison, Esq., of London, England, is now on a visit to Canada, in the interest of the Anglo-Continental Guano Works. This company, which is probably the largest operating in artificial manures in the world, is about acquiring a valuable phosphate property near Ottawa.

The attitude of Mr. Laurier and Dr. Caven on the Jesuit estate question is declared by the Globe to be highly satisfactory to it. As these gentlemen have taken diametrically opposite views on the subject, the endorsement of both of them by the Grit organ seems unaccountable at first sight.

Henry Longworth, Esq., Glynwood, was winner of the second prize for best pure-bred shorthorn calf.

Mr. A. Robertson, East River, was winner of third prize for best Ayrshire, Jersey or Guernsey grade heifer, calved in 1887.

Mr. James Stewart, East River, won second prize for Pekin Ducks.

For best ducks of any other breed, Mr. Nelson was winner of the first prize.

Mrs. and Miss D. Kennedy, of this city, were winners of prizes for knit goods—not included in the prize list as published.

Mr. John Dickieson, Royalty, was the winner of the first prize for best ram lamb in long-wool grades.

Mr. D. Irving, Vernon River, was winner of first prize for pair of ewe lambs.

Mr. A. Eszwall, Lot 49, was winner of the second prize for two yearling ewes.

Mr. George Vessey, Little York, was winner of third prize for pair pigs under seven months old.

Decidedly, the best oil paintings (landscape) were exhibited by Miss Katie McLean, of this city. They were marked "not for competition."

A specimen of bread, from Knight's Bakery, Kent St., attracted attention—and was pronounced "splendid" by those who tasted it.

Personal.

Alexander Ramsay, Superintendent of the Canada Life Insurance Company, died at Hamilton, Ont., on the 8th inst.

The members from this Province of the Presbyterian synod, now in session at Picton, returned home last evening. Rumor says that many of them paid heavy tribute to Neptune, when crossing the Strait.

A VALUABLE CARGO.—The Champion, Capt. Verge, was towed out of Summerside harbor by the Frank C. Batt last Tuesday evening. The Farmer says she was loaded by the Messrs. D. Rogers & Sons, and sailed for Demerara. Her cargo consists of 12,000 bushels white oats, 110 sheep and 70 bbls. potatoes, the value being \$5,500.

FOR INCORPORATION.—The incorporation election took place at Stellarton, N. S., on Tuesday, and resulted in a majority of 22 votes in favor of the town becoming incorporated. The poll stood 51 against and 73 for. At a former election, a few months ago, incorporation was defeated by 8 votes.

Telegraphic Odds and Ends.

A BUDGET OF GENERAL NEWS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD.

LONDON, Oct. 8.—The British gunboat Enterprise was wrecked on the Island of Anglesa during the gale yesterday. Everybody on board was saved.

ISHPEMING, Mich., Oct. 8.—Typhoid fever is epidemic in a number of upper peninsular towns, notably at Negaune and Ironwood, there being nearly 100 cases in each of those places. The disease is also prevalent in nearly all the other towns of the district. An investigation is being conducted by the state board of health.

MONTREAL, Oct. 8.—Argument is going on in the case of the Ville Marie Bank against the nuns of Hotel Dieu, and interest arises from the fact that the Bank is endeavoring to force the sisters to leave the cloister to testify. The question also arises as to whether the ladies are dead civilly or not. Judge Mathieu appears to think they cannot legally give evidence in a court of justice.

HALIFAX, Oct. 8.—Ann Hardy, aged 88, lived with her sister, Mrs. Lepitilman, aged 90, in one of the filthiest and most dilapidated shanties in Halifax. They were once well-to-do, but now, though helpless and destitute they were too proud to receive aid and refused admission to all callers. On Sunday after eating soup from bones gathered from the street, Miss Hardy went to bed and died. The sister slept with the corpse two days before realizing the position.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., Oct. 8.—Typhoid fever is on the increase here. Twenty-one persons are sick with the disease at the hospital. Two died yesterday. The cold weather is causing great suffering. The distribution of the \$1,000,000 relief money is delayed. But a few persons have winter clothing and the homes many live in are shanties into which the snow will drift. Two bodies were found in the debris yesterday.

The Lyceum.

"STANDING room only," was the information imparted by the stalwart police officer who guarded the door of the Lyceum Theatre last night. The audience at both afternoon and evening sales was composed of our most prominent citizens, and the ladies turned out in large numbers. The sales will be continued afternoon and evening at 3 and 8 o'clock, until further notice.

Presbyterian Synod.

PICTON, Oct. 8.—The Presbyterian Synod to-day discussed the Jesuit question. Rev. Drs. Burns and McCulloch moved a lengthy resolution, which was a modification of the motion adopted by the General Assembly at Toronto. Revs. Thomas Sedgewick and Robert Lang moved in amendment "That the Synod while pledging itself to adopt under the constitution all practical means for the maintenance of equal rights and Protestant principles in the Dominion, does not deem it necessary under the circumstances to pass judgment on the matters contained in the motion." The Synod adopted an amendment to the amendment, moved by Dr. McKnight, and subsequently adopted the combined motions of Drs Burns and McKnight by a vote of 53 to 21. The supporters of Mr. Sedgewick's amendment were J. G. Forbes of St. John, T. C. James of Charlottetown, and Revs. Sinclair, Dusan, Jack, L. G. Macneil and Allan Simpson.

HORSES AND SHEEP.—A large number of horses and sheep, besides other freight, are being taken away at present by the S. N. Co's. steamers. Last Monday, twenty-six horses were bought up from Charlottetown and taken over to the Mainland. Half of them were shipped by Mr. McKie and the other half by Mr. McKenzie. Six were sent over by R. Hunt for the Miramichi market on Tuesday and four more on Wednesday, two of the latter going to the same place, and the other two shipped by Mr. Wm. McKay, for the ship railway. On Tuesday, 470 lambs were shipped by the Messrs McGrath, and on Wednesday 270 more were sent to the States by Mr. Davis.—Farmer.
