HOW TO ACT IN

CASE OF A BAD FIRE

The recent disastrous fire in the Windsor Hotel in New York, in which over a score of lives were lost, has elicited some excellent advice from Chief Bo.ner, of the New York fire brigade, on how persons in danger should act during a fire. In the New York World he says:

From my thirty years experience in fighting fire I offer the following suggestions as to the best things to do in a fire emergency in all classes of buildings. In the precautions which I here point out were taken in every case, few lives would be lost in New York city fires.

The terrible fate of many guests in the Hotel Windsor fire makes directions to hotel patrons of first importance.

The first thing a hotel guest should do on entering his room is to locate the nearest outside fire escape. After that he should familiarize himself with the location of the hall windows and discover their relation to the roof of the adjoining buildings. He should next learn the position of the stairs and their top and bottom landings. The top landing particularly he should know all about, as well as the method of egress to the roof.

All this information the guest can acquire in ten minutes or less. After making these investigations, should a fire break out, he knows his relative location and his various avenues of escape.

Precisely the same rule apply to private houses and flat buildings.

WHAT TO DO IN A HOTEL.

Should the cry of "Fire!" resound throughout the hotel and volumes of smoke fill the corridors and the room, the thing above all others to do is to keep cool.

"Keep cool, keep cool, keep cool"—no matter how serious the fire seems, is the advice that I reiterate. If those who jumped from the roof of the Windsor had kept cool and waited for the firemen instead of jumping, most of them would have been saved.

When smoke clogs the corridors, follow these instructions:

1. Keep the door and transom of the room shut.

2. Open the window from the top.

3. Wet a towel and stuff it in the mouth.

Breathe through it instead of through the nose. It will keep the smoke, cinders and fire from the lungs, and its moisture will have a reviving effect.

4. Stand at the window and get the benefit of the outside air.

5. Should there be a rope fire-escape, use it only when you deem it necessary for your safety. If it is secured, as many of them are, merely by an iron hook, twist it several times around some solid article in the room. Then begin your descent.

It is a dangerous experiment at best, and there is only one safe way of doing it. That way is this: Protect the hands by covering them with towels or anything of like nature. Grasp the rope firmly with both hands, twist it once around the right leg, then placing it between the feet, keep them firmly together and in that position slide down the rope as slowly as possible.

A woman should go down the rope in the same way. In the average case her clothes will permit her to make an easier descent than a man.

TO SAVE A WOMAN OR CHILD.

6. If possible, never let a woman or child descend on a rope alone. The husband should secure the rope under his wife's arms, place some article of furniture higher than the window sill, near the window, and then let the woman descend by paying out the rope gradually. If the child is small, it is well to tie it with bed clothing to the breast or back of the person going down the rope.

7. Never jump unless the blaze is scorching, and not then if the firemen with their scaling ladders are coming up to the building or are near.

8. Never go to the roof unless as a last recourse when you know that there is no escape from it to adjoining buildings. In the big buildings fire always climbs to the top.

9. If caught in a corridor or a room always keep crouched to the floor and keep close to the wall. Keep as low as possible. Fire and smoke ascend.

10. If a jump must be made through flame within a building to the lower floor, throw the distance as carefully as possible, throw a blanket or covering over the head and make the leap. Then remove the

covering, breathe but little and carefully and work gradually along corridor until safety is reached.

Theoretically I know of no other instructions. The most important feature is to be prepared for an emergency, and the only way to obtain that preparation is by a preliminary examination. When one has made that examination he knows when the emergency arises what is the best method of procedure.

What I have said may seem elementary, but I speak from long and active experience, and I know that the instructions are accurate.

FED ON FALSE NEWS.

How the Courage of the Spaniards was Ketchup.

The New York Sun says that captain H H Dexter, of the ship Honolulu, of St. John, N. B., which arrived in that port a few days ago, 145 days out from Manila, saw Dewey destroy the Spanish squadron, and later the bombardment and fall of Manila. The captain said that he had learned the great part of what had gone on under his own nose from newspapers and talks subsequent to the events themselves. His reminiscences show this, as they are a mixture of personal observations and facts of which he became cognizant later. The captain is a Nova Scotian, and his wife and two children were with him on the Honolulu, which arrived at Manila with 2500 tons of Now South Wales coal on April 25.

He told the story of the battle as it had been told many times before and of the uncomfortable position of the merchant ships which lay between the forts at Manila and Dewey's fleet, and how everybody aboard the merchant fleet kept ducking as the shells from the fort passed high over them towards Dewey's vessels, but failed to carry far enough.

"The Manila newspapers," he said, "did a great deal to keep up the courage of the Spaniards. One day they reported that the Baltimore was aground, and another day that the plague had broken out in the American fleet. The attitude of the German consul and German residents was all-encouraging to the Spaniards."

After the capture of the city, business began immediately, and I got a full cargo of hemp for New York, by November 1. I would have been ready to sail by the last of May, probably, if it had not been for the war."

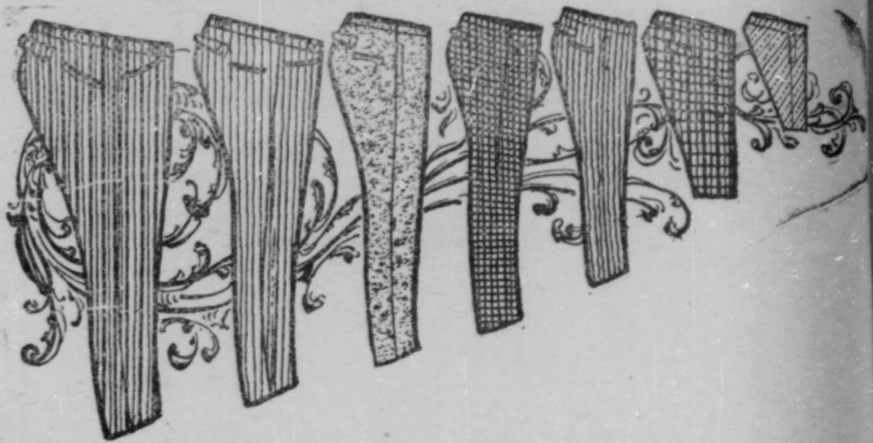
Not Days Enough.

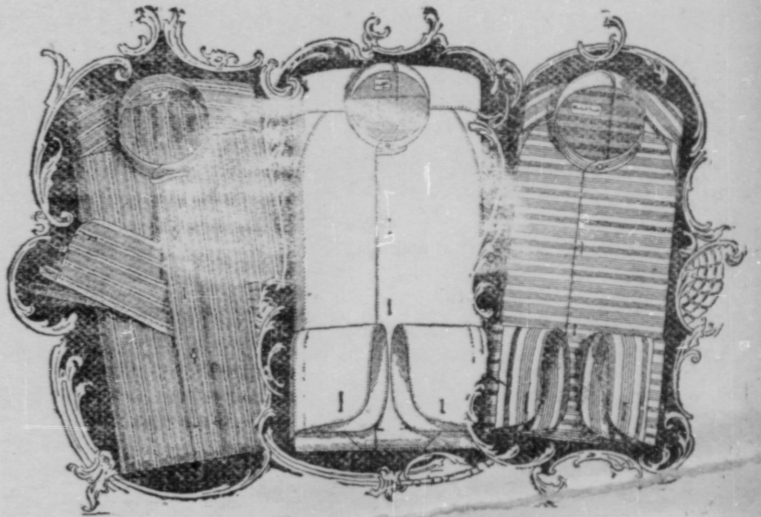
