C. J. Schapp declared the nine man mission is well pleased with the outcome of the trip. "Excellent arrangements were made everywhere on our behalf," he said.

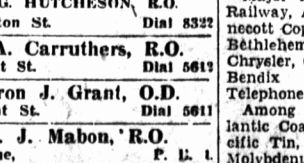
Schapp added that with one member of the trade group still in Peiping, the total contract figures reached "might be higher by now."

WINNIPEG (CP)—Good export interest in all grains prompted firm tone in most prices at the close Tuesday on the Winnipeg grain exchange.

Trade reports during the fairly active session indicated one cargo of barley and parcel lots were sold to the United Kingdom and the Continent. Other reports said 400,000 bushels of Canadian flax was being sold to France and Japan was in the market for further quantities.

There was no information on overnight export loadings of Canadian wheat.

N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market went through a turbulent session Tuesday with prices pounded down in a heavy selling wave.

When the pressure was heaviest, the market began a rally that brought stocks well up from their lows and sent a good group of key issues ahead strongly. The net result was a moderate setback.

General Motors was the centre of attention in the fall as it was Monday when the market climbed to the second highest level in its history.

GM added 7 1/4 Monday in the midst of rumors of stock splits and favorable dividend action. After the close, the company announced an offer to sell stockholders \$325,000,000 in new stock.

STOCK DROPPED

At the opening of the stock market Tuesday, General Motors dropped 6 1/4-8 on a block of 16,000 shares, an indication of Wall Street's disappointment in the news as measured against its enthusiasm for the rumors. It closed off 4 3/8 at 100 3/4.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks lost 60 cents at \$155.80. Volume for the day was 4,420,000 shares.

At the top of the most active list was General Electric up 1 3/4 at 50, and it was followed by Curtis Publishing up 5-8 at 9 3/8 and American Motors up 1-2 at 13 1/4.

LOWER ISSUE

Major losers included Southern Railway, Amerada Petroleum, Kennecott Copper, Du Pont, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem Steel, Republic Steel, Chrysler, Goodrich, Douglas, Bendix, Bendix Aviation and American Telephone.

Among higher stocks were Atlantic Coast Line, Sinclair Oil, Pacific Tin, Radio Corp., Climax Molybdenum, United Merchants, Rheims and Zenith.

A mixture of gains and losses were posted by Canadian issues. McIntyre advanced 3-8 and Distillers Segram was up 1-4. Canadian Pacific dropped 3-8 and Hiram Walker eased 1-8.

On the American stock exchange Royale Oil slipped 1-4.

MONTREAL (CP)—Losses were in the majority at the close of active trading on the stock market Tuesday.

Ford lost 2 1/2 points at 107 1/2 and Algonia was off 1-3-8 at 52 1/2. Aluminum at 75 was 1-1/4 easier while Imperial Oil and International Paper each slipped a point at 39 and 85, respectively. Industrial Acceptance at 53 3/4 and Howard Smith at 30 1/4 were each off 3-4.

Half-point losses were registered by Hudson Bay at 53, Bathurst A at 58 1-2 and B A Oil at 29.

Shawinigan moved up 3-4 while Consolidated Paper at 64 and Noranda at 81 1/2 were each 1-4 better. McGill scored a 1 1/4 gain at 36 1-2.

Miscellaneous industrials moved to lower ground and papers were irregularly easier. Senior metals and senior oils were a shade easier. The remainder of the industrial market was mainly unchanged.

Consolidated Denison improved 37 cents in a mixed mine section. General improvement was noted in the western oil section with gains ranging from 10 to 20 cents.

Industrial volume was 82,000 shares and mines 521,100.

TORONTO (CP)—Mines were relatively unaffected by the sharp drop on the stock market Tuesday—the greatest decline in a month.

The base metal index climbed a half-point to a 1934-55 high of 182.89. Campbell, Chibougamau touched \$4.55 and Consolidated Denison \$2.94 on a sharp climb. Mentor jumped \$1.25 to \$11.75. Cody Reaco reached \$1.33 and Lo-Low-priced mines were extremely active.

Oil Stock Case Gets Underway

MONTREAL (CP)—The defence Tuesday attacked indictments against five men who appeared for preliminary hearing on charges of fraud, conspiracy and illegal use of the mails in connection with an alleged \$341,000 oil stock swindle.

Motions to have the indictments quashed were made before criminal court judge Gerald Almond on behalf of Walter H. Link, Harry Green and Lou Wyman, all of Montreal, and George P. Caldwell and William Brady, both of Toronto. The motions were made after the crown requested postponement of the case.

The accused were arrested on warrants of the Quebec attorney-general's department after an attempt by the United States justice department to have Link and Green extradited to Detroit failed in Superior Court here.

The extradition proceedings resulted after a Detroit grand jury indicted the two Montreal security firms and 14 of their salesmen on 14 fraud counts.

The now-defunct firms of T. M. Parker Inc., and Laurentian Securities Ltd., were alleged to have promoted sale of phoney Canadian stocks to Americans, mostly residents of the state of Michigan.

Plants Flag Of N. S. 60 Feet Under Water

HALIFAX (CP)—As a symbol of his faith in the sea as a source of food and wealth, John Sweeney plunged into the icy surf off nearby Packer's head on New Year's Day and planted a flag of Nova Scotia on the ocean floor, 60 feet under water.

She air was freezing and the sea only 38 degrees as Sweeney, dressed in a frogman's suit with an underwater camera attached to his neck, walked into the frothing waves.

He held the flag carefully above his head until a wave tilted him off his feet, then swam 500 yards offshore and submerged.

RIPPLING GENTLY The flag-staff snapped as he attempted to jam it into a rock crevice, so he anchored the cloth with two rocks. He worked at it for 40 minutes, 10 fathoms down.

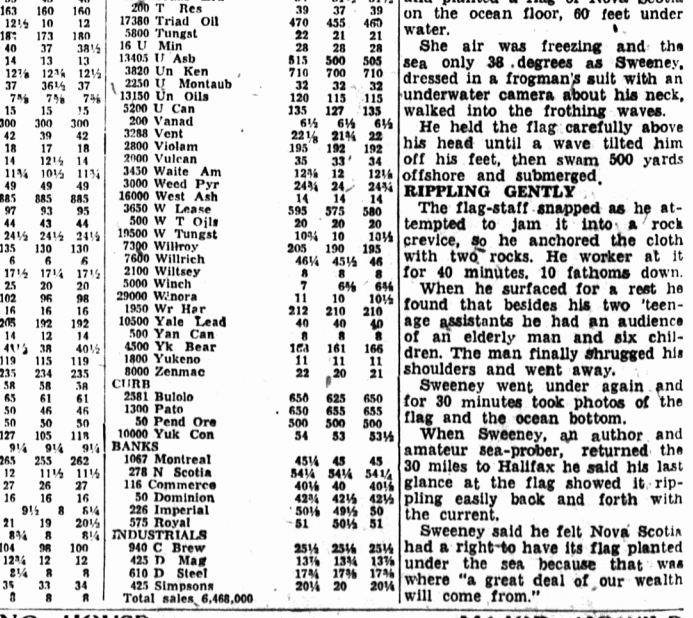
When he surfaced for a rest he found that besides his two teenage assistants he had an audience of an elderly man and six children. The man finally shrugged his shoulders and went away.

Sweeney went under again and for 30 minutes took photos of the flag and the ocean bottom.

When Sweeney, an author and amateur sea-prober, returned the 30 miles to Halifax he said his glance at the flag showed it rippling easily back and forth with the current.

Sweeney said he felt Nova Scotia had a right to have its flag planted under the sea because that was where "a great deal of our wealth will come from."
