

Boston Might Improve Position If Had 'Needler'

If Boston Bruins could find a "needler" of the calibre of Tony Leswick, they might improve their position in the National Hockey League.

Bruins, surprisingly enough, have the league's most potent power-play at the moment. The only trouble is that the last piece of the puzzle isn't getting as many chances to use its extra-man attack as are the other five teams in the league.

Perhaps a player such as

Leswick would help. Tony was best known for his unique facility of being able to goad opposing players into penalties.

The former left winger spent more than 11 seasons in the NHL with New York Rangers, Detroit Red Wings and Chicago Black Hawks. Today's he's still remembered as one of the sharpest - tongued players in the league ever had. He never backed down from a rival and, if he was sent off the ice by the referee, nine times out of

10 he'd take an opponent with him.

BRUINS LEAD STATISTICS

Bruins, who have only one victory and four ties in 10 starts in this campaign, have scored seven goals while enjoying a man advantage. They've held the edge on 36 occasions, which figures out to a power-play scoring percentage of 19.1.

Goals in this department is Bruins-leading Detroit with nine goals in 53 times they've used the power play for a 17.0 per cent.

Here are the records of the other four clubs: Chicago, nine in 56 for 16.1; Montreal Canadiens, six in 49 for 12.2; Toronto Maple Leafs four in 37 for 10.8; and New York, one in 44 for 2.3.

The leader among individual power-play goal scorers is Parker MacDonald of the Red Wings with four, which is half his league-leading goal total. Bill Hay and Stan Mikita of the Black Hawks have each scored three goals while Chicago has had a man advantage. Hay has had a total of five goals and Mikita four.

All six clubs will get a chance this weekend to improve their power-play percentages.

Tonight Chicago is at Montreal, New York at Toronto and Detroit at Boston. In Sunday's action, Canadiens visit the Bruins, Toronto goes to Chicago and Detroit is at New York.

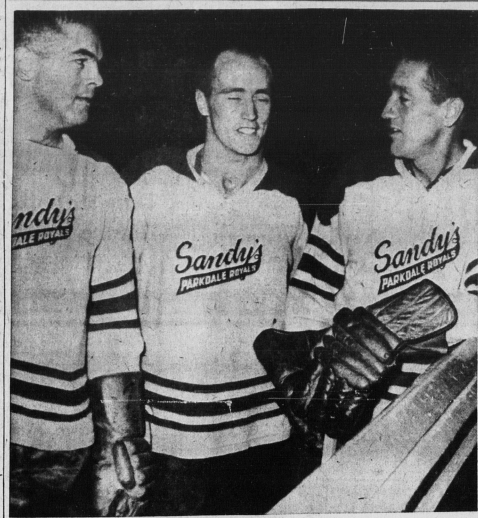
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READY FOR WORKOUT

Als Have Money Worries On Eve Of Playoff Game

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Alouettes, on the eve of their sudden-death Eastern Football Conference semi-final playoff with Ottawa Rough Riders, are reported to be worrying about money.

The Montreal Star, in a sports page story by Ian MacDonald, says "the biggest concern among the Alouette players is money—or, to be more specific, the lack of it."

MacDonald says the Alouettes aren't happy with the money they are to be paid for the game.

"They are disenchanted because they know that at least one other club in the Eastern Conference is getting considerably more. As fate would have it, that club happens to be the Ottawa Rough Riders."

"Conference regulations call for the paying of \$50 to each player for a playoff game. Obviously this is a considerable cut in pay for most of the imports. Regulations go further in disallowing the paying of 'bonus' money for winning games. But the Als' players claim differently."

"Dick Cohee, for instance, the former Alouette who played six games with the Rough Riders before being dropped this week, claims he was promised a bonus by the Riders should the team make the playoffs."

"They didn't mention any specific amount of money," Cohee was saying Thursday night. "But other players told me it would be \$300. The guys who have been on the team for a while talked about extra money for winning the playoffs as well."

MacDonald says there are stories that Ottawa players are

considerably more than \$300 mentioned by Cohee.

"Alouettes sent their three representatives — Bobby Jack Oliver, Ed Nickla and Ted Elyson — to thrash out the affair with head coach and general manager Perry Moss Wednesday morning. They asked if they could get an equal amount for the Ottawa players which allegedly involves a bonus of \$300 for a win today and an equal amount for each additional win. The story goes that Ottawa players reacted with the snarl at the time they won the Grey Cup in 1960.

"Moss assured the representatives that he would pay the players what the Ottawa club paid their men. Because of the fine for giving bonuses, Ottawa officials naturally told Moss that they did not do such thing. Moss told the players the nowa Wednesday night. There has been an obvious letdown feeling around the club ever since."

OTTAWA (CP)—Hopes of a record crowd for today's Eastern Football Conference sudden-death semi-final between Ottawa Rough Riders and Montreal Alouettes 4 1/2 in 4 1/2 Friday when the weather office forecast rain to start sometime around the 12 o'clock mark.
