MAGISTRATE'S COURT - For having care and control of a motor vehicle while its ability to drive was impaired by alcohol, a resident of Charlottetown was fined \$60 and costs or two months imprisonment, when he appeared yesterday morning in Queen's County Magistrate's Court before the Stipendiary Magistrate, Gilbert Gaudet. Under the Temperance Act five cases of possession of intoxicating liquor in place other than the residence. Each received the minimum fine of \$20 and costs or 30 days imprisonment. The offenders were from Charlottetown, East Royalty, St. Peter's Bay and rural Central Queen's County. Another resident of rural Central Queen's pleaded guilty to having possession of intoxicating liquor not purchased from a vendor and was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days imprisonment. An Argyle Shore resident was fined \$18, including costs, or ten days in jail for assault. BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) - Interior minister Lucio Pabon Nunez says a misconception of Colombians by United States citizens is at the bottom of charges that Colombia persecutes Protestants. He said much misunderstanding would disappear if those who make the accusations "would realize that we are a civilized people and not savages to be catechized and if they realized that Colombian democracy is based on the precepts of Catholicism."

Canada and the United States can do more to relieve these conditions, he would like to see to Communism," he said. Dr. MacDonald paid high tribute to Rev. Dr. Murphy, Dr. J. T. Crösu and Father Francis whom he joined and labored so hard in the interests of the Credit Union and Co-operative movement in Prince Edward Island. "However," he said, "we cannot live on the accomplishments of these men, we must go on and build for the future."

The speaker had a word of praise for the work being accomplished in the Co-operative stores of the Island. "We are proud of what you have been able to do on Prince Edward Island," he said. "You have given our stores in Nova Scotia a splendid example to follow."

PANEL DISCUSSION

The feature of the morning session was a panel discussion presided over by Mr. Brandon O'Grady, of the faculty of St. Dunstan's University. Taking part in the discussion were Messrs. Lorne Calbeck, Louis O'Connor, A. B. MacAdam and Brenton Clark. Under discussion was "The financing of the Co-operative Union." It was pointed out that the staff of the Co-op Union is the same as it was in 1947 but that the business being conducted is more than double what it was at that time. It was felt that a part-time managing supervisor and a part-time educational field man were needed to serve the needs of the various Unions throughout the Province. It was also agreed that if all local Co-ops were efficiently run they would be able to meet their obligations to the Co-op Union, allowing it more funds to provide this service.

President Brenton Clark, in presenting his report, noted that the past year was one of economic distress for many people. This he felt was due to the depressed potato market, and went on to say that "but for the Potato Marketing Board, the situation could have been disastrous."

"A serious problem confronting us," said Mr. Clark, "is one of finances." He felt that a solution to this problem lay in the fact that if greater contributions were forthcoming from the local Unions, the League could render the service expected of it. "These services you wish and the services we wish to give are limited only by the financial assistance your local Co-operative is able to give."

Mr. Clark concluded: "We can only be successful if we support one another, there is not such a thing as an individual co-operative association - at least not for long. If we believe the individual must depend upon his fellow co-operator, how much more necessary is the inter-dependence of our associations. The lack of support of the Co-operative will reflect in the local Co-operative."

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dennis, in his annual report, called attention to the fact that the aim of the Co-operative in a community is something more than expansion. "We must, if we are to adhere to the principles of our movement, be beneficial to that community... we must build monuments of good deeds as well as monuments of financial success." In this connection the speaker recommended the institution of a boys' and girls' camp, owned, operated and supervised by co-operative organizations and supported by all co-operatives in the Province.

Mr. Dennis spoke of the need for a diversified farming program and in this connection felt that plans should be proceeded with for the establishment of plants for the processing and canning of small fruits and vegetables, also meats and perhaps fish. He reported on the organization of the Kinkora Dairy Co-operative Association and the Montague Co-operative Association. These he noted had made excellent progress during the past year. Mr. Dennis reported that at least one more Co-op would be established on the Island before the year was out. Rev. W. Simpson reported on...

News Briefs

WASHINGTON, (AP) - The United States and several of its allies are putting the finishing touches to a plan creating an international "atoms - for - peace" clearing house. An announcement of how the program will work and what countries will participate will be made within the next few weeks, it was learned Wednesday.

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) - The World Council of Churches Wednesday came to grips with a re-committed "main theme" regarding denouncing communism as a corruption of history and declaring democracy falls short of its ideals. Action by delegates on the key document is still to come.

QUEBEC (CP) - The Quebec attorney-general's department issued a prepared statement Wednesday saying an autopsy and laboratory tests have led police to believe the death of Allen Paul Richards, 36, was "accidental death, pure and simple." He was found unconscious a week ago on the grounds of the lieutenant-governor's residence. He died Saturday.

KENTVILLE, N.S. (CP) - A road grader Wednesday fatally injured eight-year-old Wade Bezanon while he was playing on the street. An inquest was ordered.

QUEBEC (CP) - The Duchess of Kent and Princess Alexandra prayed quietly Wednesday in both an Anglican and a Roman Catholic church to mark the 12th anniversary of the Duke of Kent's death. They left by train for Toronto at 6 p.m. EDT where they will open the Canadian National Exhibition Aug. 27.

DIBRUGARH, India (Reuters) - Swirling waters from India's Brahmaputra river have cut off the tea-producing state of Assam from the rest of India. More than half the homes in this city of 50,000 were under water or collapsing Wednesday and newly-discovered oilfields have been inundated in Assam's worst flood in history.

SOLDIER HOME WITH PRETTY JAP WIFE

MONTREAL (CP) - Lance-Corporal Robert Duquette arrived home Wednesday with a pretty Japanese wife he married after a two-year international courtship.

Cpl. Duquette and his wife, Kazuro, were married in Japan Aug. 31, 1953. Between their first meeting and their marriage, his army postings separated them by thousands of miles.

"It was strictly by chance that I met her," he said. "We were driving along and we needed directions. She was standing beside the road and I went over and asked her. I had to go ahead with the group but I came back later."

The meeting occurred in 1951 and a short time later Cpl. Duquette was sent back to Canada. They wrote to each other until he returned to Japan on a second tour of duty last year.

Kazuro, the daughter of a farmer at Okayama, some 300 miles from Tokyo, was given the names Louise Marie Cecil when she was baptized prior to her marriage last year.

SOLEMN SERVICE OF INDUCTION IN THE FREE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND

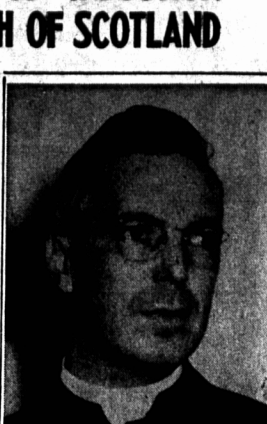
Rev. J. H. Bishop, B. A. was introduced last evening in the Free Church of Scotland, Birchwood St., Charlottetown with Rev. Prof. D. MacKenzie, M.A., Free Church of Scotland Deputy, presiding and preaching. The charge to the Minister was also given by Prof. MacKenzie and the charge to the congregation by Rev. W. MacLeod, J. P., M.A. Free Church Deputy and Principal Clerk of the General Assembly. There was a large congregation present, many of whom were from rural points.

Prof. MacKenzie based his sermon on the Apostles' words in 2nd Corinthians: "Now then we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God did beseech by us; we pray you in Christ's stead, be ye reconciled to God."

The speaker referred to the gentleness of Christ and the Apostles' entreaties that the Corinthians might learn of it. He described the constraining love of Christ and the merit of his atoning sacrifice. New Testament pastors were expected to have certain qualifications, he said. "They were to be blameless in life and pure in heart. They had the duty of preaching the Gospel and of attending the flock of God."

Following the sermon he gave a short narrative of the proceedings in the call to the Rev. James Harvey Bishop. In 1928 the assembly of the Free Church of Scotland received a petition from the Elders, members and Adherents under the oversight of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island asking for the ordination of Mr. Bishop who had attended with success a full course in the Free Church College at Edinburgh.
