World's Columbian Exposition,
Chicago, 1893.

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada
has accepted the invitation of the Govern-
ment of the United States to take part in the
World's Columbian Exposition, to be held in
Chicago from 1st May to 31st October, 1893. As
it is important that a very full display of Cana-
dian products be made on that occasion, a
general invitation is extended to Canadian pro-
ducers and manufacturers in agriculture, horti-
culture, products of forests, fisheries, minerals,
mechanical, manufacturing, arts, etc., to assist in
bringing together such a display of the natural
resources and industrial products of Canada as
will be credit to the country.
An Executive Commissioner for Canada has
been appointed, who will have the general
charge of the exhibits and the all-time of space,
and the several Provincial Governments have
been invited to co-operate with the view of mak-
ing the exhibits as complete and satisfactory as
possible.
The Dominion Government will pay the trans-
port of exhibits, going and returning, and for the
packing of articles sent.
Exhibitors must be made out not later than 31st July.
The receipt of articles at the Exhibition build-
ings will commence 1st November, 1892, and all
articles, excepting Live Stock, must be in place
by 1st April, 1893.

formation can be obtained by applying to the
Commissioner, Ottawa, or to the nearest office.

Michael Davitt's Letter.

THE LONDON CHRONICLE'S CONVERSION TO
GLADSTONISM.

Mr. Davitt in his recent letter points
out that behind the political aspect of the
home rule question lies a material bread
and butter side—a question affecting the
interests and well-being of the working
population of Ireland. "The depopulation
of Ireland under landlord government," he
says, "has benefited no home ruler nor the
ruled. The theory that it would be of ad-
vantage to the industrial community is fal-
sified by the fact that pauperism has
doubled and that millions of Irishmen have
been driven out by landlord rule. For the
most part they are employed in workshops
in America, and the products of their labor
are shut out from British manufacturers from
the American markets. Others have come
to England and have competed with British
workmen, reducing the wage rate. Under a
sympathetic government all these emigrants
would have remained in Ireland, and
would have produced food stuffs for Eng-
land, taking English manufactures in
exchange. On the other hand the land-
lords are practically excluded from parlia-
mentary representation, and their property
is saddled with £160,000,000 in mortgages
and other burdens. Clearly landlord govern-
ment is no triumph for them."

Mr. Davitt states in detail the demands of
the Irish party. He says: We are radical
enough to believe that the rule of land
monopoly is the underlying cause of im-
poverished Irish labor. It has taxed the
farmer's industry and prevented him, from
paying better wages. It has driven field
workers into the labor market in towns, and
in the form of ground rents in towns and
city it pursues the interests of industry and
gatherers where it was not sown. We demand
Home Rule to insure that protection of Irish
industry which Lord Salisbury as a landlord
seeks to obtain for British trade by taxing
foreign products. The protection trade re-
quires it from the ground rent and royalty
system, which imposes a burden of £150,000,
000 yearly upon the kingdom's industry,
crushing its productive power and enabling
the foreigner to compete with success.
Vested landlord interests are the real cause
of Ulster's opposition to Home Rule. They
have tempted Lord Salisbury and Mr. Balfour
to justify the contingent of rebellion in
Ulster in their appeal to the feelings of
religious hatred in the hope of confusing the
real issues by the prejudice and excitement
of sectarian passion."

1200 Persons Killed

IN THE RECENT HURRICANE AT THE ISLAND
OF MAURITIUS.

Further mail advices from the island of
Mauritius say that the morning after the
recent hurricane every street in Port Louis
was filled with debris. The governor has
arranged to distribute food to the sufferers.
Hospitals have been erected in various parts
of the town, and to them were conveyed
the injured as soon as they could be re-
moved from the wreckage. Dead and in-
jured were found under the ruins of houses
in every street. It is estimated that 1200
were killed and 4,000 injured. Not a
house in the Tranque Bar section of Port
Louis was left standing. The burial of 600
persons killed in Port Louis alone occupied
six days. Many victims were buried in
common graves at the expense of the gov-
ernment. Out of 62 churches and chapels in
Port Louis, 50 were devastated and the
remaining 12 badly damaged. Boats were
stranded during the hurricane at places 50
feet from the sea. The hurricane was pre-
ceded by a violent magnetic disturbance,
the sea having risen nine feet.

Talk of War in Ireland.

VIOLENCE MAY BE USED TO DEFEAT THE PRO-
POSED IRISH PARLIAMENT.

The Belfast Telegraph publishes the plan
of resistance to an Irish Parliament by a
prominent Irish Unionist. It says that the
men of Ulster will not allow elections to
occur. The election writs will be publicly
burned by the sheriffs of counties and are re-
ceived. Judges and magistrates taking
their commissions from the new executive
will not be recognized.

The police will be re-organized, with
special constables sworn in to replace the
regular police. The Queen's taxes will be
paid, but taxes levied by the Dublin Parli-
ament will not be paid. The Customs house
will be seized and held until the question
is settled. In the event of war, the north
will be in a better position both as
regards credit and geographical position
than the South. Belfast is unassailable,
while Dublin is open to direct and im-
mediate attack.

News Notes.

A new religious sect has been established in
Virginia by a negro named Nathaniel Brown,
which he calls the "No Meat Eaters."

Diamond back moths, which were so
disastrous to the crops in 1891, have re-
appeared in Yorkshire and Northumber-
land, Eng.

A protracted drought has been experi-
enced in all the provinces of Russia, and pas-
ture is poor. The failure of spring-sown
crops is feared.

It is rumored the Rothschilds have un-
derstood to lend the Brazilian Government
£2,000,000 sterling, to help to restore the
normal standard of exchange.

Cornet playing is likely to become a popu-
lar fad if something is not done to stop it. The
instrument possesses a peculiar fascination for
amateurs, and the question soon to be solved
is whether to smash the cornets or the
amateurs.

A servant girl in an officer's family in
Lipsic, Germany, has inherited unexpectedly
1,000,000 marks. When the girl received the
news she was sitting at a second story win-
dow. She fainted, fell out of the window
and broke her leg.

Relations between Russia and Germany are
again growing "strained." The officers of the
Berlin and Potsdam garrisons say that if the
Czar is not ready to give an assurance of
peace, the worst war had better be spoken
at once while Russia is staggering in bank
rupty and famine.

Tril by Judge Lynch is no longer a
peculiarly American phenomenon. In Algeria
eight criminals have been hunted down and
shot by the people without pretence of trial.
Only the other day an Arab who had slain a
little girl was flung over a precipice by his
fellow countrymen.

Cal McCarthy was defeated by Bobby
Burns in an eight round contest in the Coney
Island Athletic Club on Monday night. The
stipulated weight was 118 lbs., but Burns was
seven pounds below that. He was never-
theless quite heavy enough for McCarthy, punish-
ing him badly in the second round.
Mr. Lockroy, formerly French Minister of
Education, has written declaring that the
Italian court party desires war and is trying
to push the country in that direction. King
Humbert will soon be compelled to do some-
thing to escape a revolution and financial
disaster, and will do his utmost to induce
Germany to open war.

The cholera epidemic at Seraneguir, Cash-
mere, caused 1,600 deaths last week. A
terrible panic prevails among the people, the
horror of the situation having been increased
by a fire which destroyed 2,000 houses and
killed 8,000 persons homeless. Food is held
at famine prices, the crops being almost a
failure. Latest news from Seraneguir state
that 2,450 persons have died there of cholera.
All the inhabitants have left the place.

The fund which George Posobody, the
wealthy London banker, gave thirty years
ago to build houses for the poor has in-
creased from £750,000 to more than \$5,-
000,000. Up to the end of 1891 the trust-
ees of the fund had provided for the artisan
and laboring poor of London 11,273 rooms,
besides bath-rooms, laundries and wash-
houses. These rooms were contained in
5,070 houses. The average rent of these
houses was \$1.20 a week. This grand
work is being pushed and extended each
year, and is one of the greatest boons to
the laboring classes in London.

The latest advice from the fire in Birken-
bug silver mine, near Pzibran, Bohemia,
report 200 missing. Twenty-five dead
bodies have been recovered. Twenty-five
miners were rescued shockingly burned and
crushed. Most of the victims, including 8
men who lost their lives while engaged in
the work of rescue, died of asphyxiation
being overcomes by the fatal gases which
permeated the entire mine. Those who were
examined believe that the fire was caused
by the recklessness of a miner who carried
a naked light into the chamber. They think
the gases coming in contact with the light
caused the explosion and set fire to the
timbers.

Personal.

The Sir John Macdonald Memorial Com-
mittee of Montreal has raised \$20,000.

A well informed gentleman says that he
has it upon excellent authority that no ap-
pointment to the Lieut.-Governorship of New
Brunswick will be made in the near future.

A letter from Dr. Stuhlmann confirms the
report of the blindness of Emin Pasha, the
brave African ruler and explorer. All who
have followed the adventures successes and
misfortunes of Emin will regret the terrible
silliness that has befallen him.
Lord George Hamilton, first Lord of the
Admiralty, pronounces the Canadian route for
transferring naval crews from and to the Pa-
cific a success, and says that under certain
conditions it will be preferred to all others.

Rev. Dr. Bainsford thinks the proper way
of spelling salmon is with one s. One eminent
dispenser in Montreal spells it salmone, and
people get drunk on its whiskey just the
same. As the Montreal Gazette remarks,
there's nothing in a name in the case of the
bar-room.

The Shah of Persia has more than \$35,000,
000 worth of ornaments, gems and precious
stones in one strong room, 20x14. There are
scabbards in this treasury worth \$1,000,000
each. The finest turquoise in the world has
a case all to itself. When leaving home the
Shah locks up his jewelry and "travels in
paste."

The deliberative committee of the
Imperial Federation Council is holding
meetings to complete the work of outlining
a scheme. The friends of the preferential
plan are much aided by the action of the
Canadian Parliament, and now hope to
secure a report on favorable lines. The
Cobden Club and free traders generally
ridicule the idea of Great Britain sanction-
ing such a return to protection.
