AN ASSAULT CASE was tried this morning before J. T. Mellish, J. P. A PRACTICAL SERMON.—At High Mass in St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday, His Eminence Cardinal Gibbons, of Baltimore, delivered a striking and masterly discourse on the Gospel of the day. The Cardinal is an excellent pulpit orator and has a fine delivery. In the course of the sermon he referred in glowing terms to the hospitality of the Islanders in general. He subsequently spoke of the proposed new cathedral, and encouraged the congregation to work together to secure it. He was very sorry, indeed, he could not remain longer, but he expressed the earnest hope of having the pleasure of laying the corner stone in a few years, or officiating at the dedication ceremonies. BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

THE QUEEN'S SPEECH

Is Remarkably Short.

LONDON, Aug. 8. The Queen's Speech, as communicated to the chiefs of the Ministerial and Opposition parties, is the briefest speech from the throne ever read in Parliament. It formally intimates that Parliament has met for the transaction of business. It contains no reference to prospective legislation, and is almost silent in regard to foreign affairs and Ireland. The Queen simply says no immediate work can be expected of members so soon after the labors of last session and the fatigues of the general election.

HALIFAX, Aug. 8. Frank Stewart Dickey, a member of the Ottawa cricket team, suicided at the Queen Hotel on Saturday evening by firing two shots from a revolver into his brains. He was a son of Senator Dickey.

CALCUTTA, Aug. 5.—Five Russians captured by Afghan troops among the rebellious Assazars have been sent in chains to Cabul.

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—Sanford Fleming, who represented the Ottawa board of trade at the London congress, in his preliminary report says: "I was surprised and pleased to hear numbers of English manufacturers speak in favor of the fair trade proposal. The actual vote was 47 to 34 in the congress held in the heart of free trade England. It will carry next time, for I learn that the Australians are really with us, and if seven Australian delegates had reversed their votes the resolution would have been adopted."

TORONTO, Aug. 5. Friday night last James Chapman, of Thornhill, was found lying on the road in front of a large hotel with a terrible wound on his head. Everything possible was done for the wounded man, but he died Monday. A short time previous to his being found Chapman was heard quarrelling with some other men, who it is alleged assaulted him and gave him the injuries which resulted in his death. The case will be investigated.

MONTREAL, Aug. 5.—Things are beginning to look bad for those engaged in the Montreal and Sorel railway deal. To-day Manager Lalonde deposed before the commission that many thousands of dollars that were reported to the Quebec government as being part of the subsidy were really paid by the manager himself out of the traffic receipts. There is a general opinion that a clear steal of \$40,000 was effected out of \$112,000.
