ISLAND BRANCH RAILWAYS.

Mr. Martin Shows the Injustice Done This Province.

Mr. Macdonald Supports Him—Davies and Perry Have Their Say.

OTTAWA, June 12.—Prince Edward Island branch railways were discussed in the House yesterday. Mr. Martin placed before the Committee the injustice done his province in the matter of railway appropriation. He showed that while subsidies had been paid for construction in other provinces Prince Edward Island had only the same railway that it had at the time of confederation. Communication with the mainland was about in the same state it was twenty-five years ago. Mr. Martin understood that it was proposed to submit to arbitration whether anything more ought to be done for this province. He protested against arbitration to decide whether branch railways ought to be built. The late government had admitted that these roads ought to be built and had made provision for them. The Minister of Marine had endorsed that programme and could not properly reopen it now. But he was surprised to see that the estimates contained only \$7,500 for the Island, while millions were asked for the Crow's Nest, and still more millions to provide a third line between Montreal and Quebec.

Hon. Mr. Davies, replying to Mr. Martin, said that Premier Peters had proposed arbitration on questions relating to the terms of union. The Government would consider the matter after the session.

Mr. Perry was understood to express satisfaction with the position of the Government which he said had done more for P. E. Island than the late Government did in eighteen years.

Mr. Martin—"What have they done?" Mr. Perry (after a pause)—"They have done a great service; they are going to repeal the franchise."

Mr. Martin did not succeed in getting the information.

Mr. McDonald referred to certain promises of Hon. Mr. Davies of which he saw no sign of fulfillment. He affirmed that the Liberal-Conservatives were committed to the construction of certain branches which would be in the interest of Canada as well as in the interests of the localities affected.

GREAT BRITAIN'S ULTIMATUM

The Turkish Ambassador Dumb With Astonishment.

What Will Happen Should Turkey Defy the Mistress of the Seas.

LONDON, June 12.—Advice from Constantinople say that the British Ambassador has served a notice on the Sultan intimating that Great Britain will under no circumstances consent to the cession of Thessaly. This represents a cleavage of sentiment among the powers as Germany is entirely willing that Turkey should keep the conquered province. Should Turkey decide to defy Great Britain, relying on the support of the Drie Kaiserbund, the eastern question will again assume an acute phase. The Turkish Prime Minister is reported to have grown dumb with astonishment when England's ultimatum was delivered. England at present has an immense fleet in the Mediterranean and is the undisputed mistress of the sea.

PRINCESS ANNE, Md., June 10.—William Andrews, colored, alias "Cuba," was taken from the others at the door of the Court House and killed by a mob. Andrews had been today tried, convicted and sentenced to death for feloniously assaulting Mrs. Benjamin T. Kelly, near Marion, on May 5th. Judge Page, who passed the death sentence upon Andrews, endeavored to reason with the excited crowd, but in vain.

NEW YORK, June 10.—In the record of notable persons who have united with the Roman Catholic communion within the past three months are converts from other denominations. The Paulist Fathers mention the following: Charles Hanson Towne, Theodore Havemeyer, Miss Susie F. Swift head of the Auxiliary League of the Salvation Army; Rear Admiral Truxtun of the British navy; United States Marshal John H. McCarthy, Aubrey Beardsley, the artist, and Edward Scott Marble, actor and dramatist.

OTTAWA, June 9.—The Methodist conference here is drawing to a close. The report of the Sabbath observance committee was quite complimentary to Ottawa, praising the quiet Sunday. Things are not satisfactory, however, as the report reads: While rejoicing in the increased attention now being given to the question of Sabbath observance, we deplore the laxity of some of our people, especially in the larger centres of population; we deprecate the retrograde action of the citizens of Toronto regarding the running of street cars on the Lord's Day. We would urge our brethren to request of all young people with our church, who may use bicycles, that they abstain from all pleasure riding on the Lord's day, and that those who may join bicycle clubs seek to have the forbidding of Sunday pleasure riding by its members incorporated in the minutes."
