Annual Meeting Held Of Trinity United Church

The annual meeting of Trinity United Church was held in Hearst Memorial Hall Wednesday evening with a good attendance despite the inclement weather. Rev. G. Howard Christie presided at the meeting with a brief worship period after which Rev. A.F. MacLean made suitable references, through prayer, to those members of the congregation who had been called to their heavenly home during the past year.

On motion of Mr. C.H. Black, Col. G. Elliot Full was named as chairman for the business meeting with Dr. G.D. Steel and Mr. E.E. Clawson, joint secretaries.

The statement from the session, presented by the clerk, Dr. G.D. Steel, gave evidence of fine spiritual growth and leadership in the congregation during the past year. Trinity Church ministers to approximately 440 individuals from 1200 families, of which 121 associated with Trinity for the first time during 1956.

The financial statement, presented by Mr. F.A. Large, on behalf of the Board of Stewards, showed the church to be in a healthy financial condition. All departments of the church had met and exceeded their allocations for the year. Particularly gratifying was the report of the Missionary and Maintenance Committee, presented by Mr. Stewart Pierce, which showed contributions well over \$20,000 for the work of missions at home and abroad.

Delightful Program Last Night By Community Concert Artist

The large number of music lovers who braved the wintry blast of last evening's pocket blizzard in order to attend the first Community Concert Association presentation of the winter season, held at the P.W.C. auditorium did not regret their efforts.

Described in advance notices as bringing to the American concert scene a fresh, exciting and delightful talent, the artist, Miss Mary McMurray, mezzo-soprano, fulfilled every expectation. Displaying an extensive and varied repertoire, she delighted her hearers in every section of the diverse program.

As would be expected the voice of this young talented American was displayed in its full range, power, and accomplishment in the arias—two from operas by Rossini: "Una Voce Poco Fa" from the Barber of Seville, and "No More Pats and Pans" from Cenerentola; and one from Le Prophete by Giacomo Meyerbeer, "O Pretres de Baal."

Adding variety and spice to the entertainment were such voice portraits as the sombre "The Forsaken Girl" by Hugo Wolf; the happy, vivacious, "Midsummer-
