



**FIFTY YEARS OF WEDDED LIFE**

Many friends called yesterday afternoon on Hon. Forrest Phillips and Mrs. Phillips who were observing their fiftieth wedding anniversary. They were married on August 14, 1907 at Bideford, P.E.I. by Rev. E.S. Weeks who presently resides at Bedeque. Mrs. Phillips was the former Gertrude MacArthur of Enmore P.E.I.

During the most of their married life, Mr. and Mrs. Phillips lived at Mount Royal where they successfully carried on farming and where six children were born to them. They are Vera, Mrs. Beecher Smallman, Knutsford, P.E.I., Olive, Mrs. Ray MacKinnon, Lynfield, Mass.; Evelyn, Mrs. Fred Champion, Berwick, N.S.; Albert of Charlottetown and Thomas in Summerside. A ten year old son, MacLeod died in 1928.

Mr. Phillips was first elected to the Legislature in a by-election of September 17, 1946. He was re-elected in the general elections of 1947, 1951 and 1955. In February, 1950 he was appointed to the Cabinet of Premier Matheson with the portfolios of Welfare and Labour.

**Inquest Adjourned In Death Of Resident Of York Point**

The inquest being conducted by Coroner Dr. L.E. Prowse into the death of George Waldo Dockendorff was further adjourned last night, and ordered to reconvene at 7.30 this evening.

The deceased, a retired farmer 78 years of age, was discovered lying on the floor of his former home at York Point last July 30th. He was removed to hospital in Charlottetown where he died a few days later.

Evidence was given last night by the attending physician, Dr. E.S. Giddings, the deceased's wife, Mrs. George Dockendorff and his daughter, Mrs. John Baird, both of whom reside in Toronto; William Wilfred MacKinley, York Point, who had purchased the Dockendorff farm from the deceased in the spring of 1954, and Dr. H.N.J. Boyd acting Provincial Pathologist.

Questioned by the coroner and lawyer John P. Nicholson who represented the Crown, Dr. Boyd stated that there was no evidence on the external aspects of the skull to indicate that a severe blow had been incurred. There was also indication of swelling in this body injured area of the brain the doctor stated which he said would affect the sight of each eye, and cause at least temporary paresis in the left area.

**Capt. C. R. Hunter Heads Northumberland Ferries Ltd.**

**Producers Co-op Discusses Egg And Poultry Marketing**

Members of Producers Co-operative Association Limited yesterday decided to ask the government of the Province to investigate the present method of marketing eggs and endeavour to provide a better system. They also moved to provide more share capital for the manager and board of directors to work with in future.

Co-op Super Market here, explained that the prices quoted at Halifax are for eggs, ninety-five percent of which come from specialized producers who get a big premium for their eggs. The specialized provinces here would account for a much smaller proportion of the eggs he said.

The organization adopted a resolution asking the provincial government to assist in setting up a co-operatively owned and operated poultry eviscerating plant in Charlottetown to service this part of the province. The resolution noted that the government had assisted a private organization to set up an eviscerating plant at Summerside.

There was a great deal of discussion on egg production and on the marketing system in general. There was sharp criticism of the type of egg that comes from small flocks that eat grass and drink dirty water. These eggs just cannot compete with eggs that come from flocks properly housed, fed properly and clean water to drink.

There was condemnation of the number of grading stations in the province. We have five in Charlottetown and there is room for one Donald A. MacLean stated. He also noted that there are 60 to 65 in the province which is far too many.

Mr. MacDonald endorsed Mr. MacLean's observations about premium prices for a specialized pack. His own flock is housed each fall and are never let out until they are taken to be marketed. They are fed properly and drink only clean water. I have been getting fifty five cents per dozen at retail stores in recent weeks, he stated.

However men like A. MacLean, president of the O'Leary co-operative organization, felt that it was time that something was done in an attempt to remedy the situation concerning egg price spreads, price discrepancies and egg marketing in general. Several others voiced similar opinions.

Reporting as chairman of the Apec agricultural committee for this province, Mr. Yeo said that a study has been made of the egg marketing situation here and he expected the report would be available for publication in perhaps two weeks.

The Producers Co-operative last night promised to co-operate in any possible with the Apec committee to improve the situation.

Kenneth MacLean said that many small farm flocks are housed and fed properly and produce good eggs. It is a case of the little fellow getting pushed out, he suggested.

The final result of the discussion was the resolution calling on the government to probe the whole egg marketing problem. At the dinner meeting there were brief remarks by a number of people. They included J. G. Dennis, government supervisor of co-operatives, W.R. Shaw, Reid Sangster, St. Francis Xavier Extension field man, Mr. O'Connor, Bill Hayward, Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia; Roy MacNevin, manager Summerside co-operative; George A. LeBelle, St. Dunstons University extension field man; Neil A. Matheson of the Guardian and Donald A. MacDonald, Mr. MacLean, Manager of the

the resolution was discussed at great length and finally adopted with the amendment that in no case should a deduction of expense be made from the amount to more than two thousand dollars per member organization.

The discussion on the marketing of eggs covered a very wide field. It was a two-pronged affair. In addition to the actual spread between producer and consumer—one man said it ran as high as twenty-five cents a dozen at times—the difference between egg quotations at producer level between here and Halifax, was criticized. The C.B.C. Maritime Farm Broadcasts, it was stated, reported that eggs at Halifax brought much more to the producer than the prices the broadcast quotes for Charlottetown.
