Insolvent Bill.

OTTAWA, April 3.

Mr. Curran, yesterday, introduced a bill for the distribution of assets of insolvent traders, and providing for the appointment of guardians of estates, and compulsory liquidation. It was prepared by the Montreal Board of Trade.

LONDON, April 3.

Mr. Parnell, in the House of Commons yesterday, declared that the interview published in the French newspapers, containing the statement that the British Government had commenced negotiations for the Kilmainham Treaty first was correct, and that Lord Carlingford's statement to the contrary was untrue. Mr. Gladstone endorsed Lord Carlingford's statement.

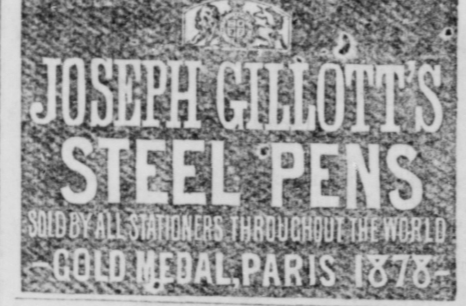
