**HOW A FARM WAS EARNED.**—A young man, says the *Cincinnati Times*, was very anxious to secure a piece of property which was for sale on very advantageous terms. He went to confer with a friend who was a banker, and to inquire whether it would be prudent to borrow the requisite sum and pay it in regular instalments, thinking that he should be able to manage all but the first instalment. He was advised to borrow from the bank a sum large enough to cover the first payment, lay it strictly aside, and then go ahead. "But," said his friend, "you must spend literally nothing. You must live off your place. You must make a box and drop in it all the money you receive." The young man and his wife went bravely to work to follow his advice. **CARE OF BEDSTEADS.**—Old-fashioned housekeepers always selected and set aside the last Friday of the March moon (which often brings it into April) for cleaning and poisoning their bedsteads. It was always known as 'bed-bug day'; not that they had any superstition in the day, but because it was the proper season of the year for that work. Of all mixtures for killing these vermin, half an ounce of corrosive sublimate in a pint of alcohol is the surest. Have a bottle well labeled and handled carefully, for it is a very strong poison. Apply with a small brush (kept for that purpose only) to the unvarnished parts of the bedsteads. If there is reason to suppose the bedstead is unsafe, spread an old sheet on the floor under it, so that if any drop they can be seen. Poison the bedstead before you dust it or take it apart; then take it apart gently and poison the tenons, etc., and let dry in. This kills all the bugs and their eggs without scattering them through the room; afterwards dust, scrub clean, and poison again. Bedsteads should be carefully examined very often, for bugs multiply fearfully and can make you an immense amount amount of labor and trouble.—*Country Gentleman.*

**REMARKABLE COUNTERFEIT.**—The Secret Service has come into possession of most remarkable counterfeit. It is a counterfeit \$20 United States legal tender note, and is calculated to deceive even persons accustomed to handling notes of that denomination. What makes it more remarkable is the fact that the work on the note was executed with a pen and ink. All the intricate figures and curves, all the heads, the seal, the fine engraving work and even the fibre in the paper, are almost perfectly counterfeited by pen and ink. The signature John Allison, formerly Registrar of the treasury, is almost exact, while that of John C. New, formerly Treasurer is perfect. The whole bill, back and face, is a wonderful piece of pen work. The bill was detected at the Sub-Treasury at New Orleans.
