N.S. Sometimes Described As Prospector's Paradise

HALIFAX (CP) — A 21,000-square mile area in Nova Scotia sometimes called a prospector's paradise, Nova Scotia possesses mineral resources that are virtually untouched. The province's mineral production per square mile of land exceeds that of any other province, but Nova Scotia's 250-year history of mining has been concentrated mostly on coal, and once prosperous but now waning economic asset. But the provincial mines department, founded in 1962, has initiated a comprehensive program of exploration assistance. In fact, more money has gone into mineral investigations in the last five years than was spent in the last half century. The department's geological branch has literally unearthed a variety of potential base metals ranging from antimony, zinc, and a limestone and dolomite inventory of Cape Breton has led to the opening of two new quarries in that area within a year.

Shotgun Starts Capital's Sirens
OTTAWA (CP) — A hunter's shotgun blast was blamed Monday by civil defence authorities for the setting off of 30 sirens in the capital area Saturday afternoon. A spokesman said pellets accidentally pierced a metal casing carrying a number of cables between the federal warning centre at Carp, Ont., and the capital. The resulting short circuit set off all the sirens in the Ottawa area. The spokesman declined to say exactly where the hunter's shot caused the break. Carp is 15 miles west of Ottawa. A minor panic resulted in Ottawa when the sirens began their uninterrupted 35-minute series of wailing. Fire trucks clogged briefly with traffic and police officers were deluged with telephone calls.

Block Company Making Money With New Item
NORTH VANCOUVER (CP) — A company here is turning two-faced business into money, producing concrete blocks — with two different faces. One is grey concrete, the other chipped granite, marble, or polished river stones bonded to concrete for an attractive building material. Using a \$75,000 machine designed by Faenmaster, Block Co. Ltd. makes regulation - sized concrete blocks at the rate of 180 per hour. The blocks give builders benefits of concrete plus decorative possibilities of stone. Chuck Reynolds, president of Faenmaster, and Vice-President Henri Pigeon, both of Vancouver, hold a franchise to sell the blocks in British Columbia.

Medical Care Plan in B.C. Has Troubles
VANCOUVER (CP) — A provincial insurance plan, intended to provide government-sponsored medical care isn't necessary, has run into financial difficulty. Subscribers were informed by letter Wednesday their rates will increase almost 20 per cent. Further enrollment has been halted temporarily. The comprehensive scheme was launched 18 months ago by Medical Services Incorporated, a health insurance agency sponsored and underwritten by the B.C. medical profession. It drops all conditions for eligibility, making coverage available to all uncovered in all categories. It has thus become a plan mainly for the old and the chronically ill, with the average age of its 26,000 members 66 between 47 and 68. The cost of the plan has soared for beyond its monthly premium income of about \$100,000, say MSI officials. The agency declines to be more specific, but Dr. R. G. Wilson, assistant executive director of the B.C. Medical Association, says the increase in premiums will not make up the difference. PAID 90 PER CENT He said in an interview Wednesday doctors in the province "might have to accept some provocation of their fees." Until now the doctors have been paid 90 per cent of each patient's bill. The new MSI coverage had two alternative policies. The comprehensive package and a cheaper catastrophe plan covering accidents, operations and medical care in hospitals. But only 10 per cent chose the latter.
