## Conservatives Challenge Premier To Run In Prince

SUMMERSIDE — Keith Harrington, Spring Valley was nominated as councillor and Henry Wedge, Summerside as assemblyman at the nominating convention for the Progressive Conservative party for 3rd Prince held last evening in the Legion Home, Summerside with the president George Riley presiding.

Mr. Wedge in his acceptance speech threw out an invitation to seek election in the Third District of Prince. The Premier has not been nominated yet, but has represented Fourth Kings in the Legislature for the Liberals for several terms.

Dignitaries in attendance were provincial leader of the party Dr. Walter Shaw and federal member for Prince Dr. Orville Phillips, both of whom addressed the large gathering.

Mr. Harrington first moved James Hickey of Malpeque as a councillor candidate with William Poirier as a second. However, Mr. Hickey asked that his name be withdrawn and nominated Mr. Harrington as candidate, which was seconded by William Poirier of Mont Carmel. It was later moved that Mr. Harrington be unanimously approved as candidate for councillor.

Cyrus P. Gallant of Wellington moved Mr. Wedge's name for candidate as assemblyman and this was seconded by Everett Ramsay of Indian River.

Mr. Harrington is 40 years of age and a very successful farmer who graduated from Prince of Wales College and taught school in Darnley and Traverses Rest.

Mr. Wedge, 50 years of age, was an outstanding administrator in civic affairs, and served 12 years as Summerside town councillor and later six years as mayor of the town.

In his acceptance address Mr. Harrington stated that if elected he hoped to give the third district the type of leadership it so deserved. He referred to the combination of MacQuarrie, MacDonald, MacLean and Phillips as the strongest representation this province had ever had at Ottawa.

Mr. Wedge referred to the third district as being neglected more than any other district. He also spoke of the many talents of Mr. Shaw and his great services to this province and Canada. Mr. Wedge stated that he understood the Premier would like to be nominated in another district and invited him to nominate in the third district.

Dr. Phillips spoke highly of the roads to resources program under which, he stated, this province was receiving seven-and-a-half million dollars over a five year period. He stated that P.E.I. received as much as Ontario on a per capita basis.

Mr. Phillips stated he felt that everyone was rather shocked and indeed surprised that a defeated candidate from Quebec was chosen by the Premier to represent this province along with himself and the provincial treasurer at the recent Dominion Provincial conference on financial affairs.

Mr. Phillips said he felt that the Premier should have been able to find someone else in the province capable of filling the position other than the Quebec representative and added that he regretted to say that he doubted if there was another province in Canada that depended so much on federal assistance as P.E.I.

## Davison Biggar Is Winner At Alberton Aquatic Day

ALBERTON — Davison Biggar of Summerside won the three-mile swim for the second consecutive year at Alberton aquatic sports day yesterday afternoon. He completed the course in the record breaking time of one hour and nine seconds.

His closest rival in a thrilling finish, Maurice "Sparky" Lodge of Moncton, led in the gruelling race at times and crossed the finish line only 28 seconds after the winner.

Third place went to Lawson Biggar of Bedouque who finished in an hour and 39 minutes, the fastest previous time for the long swim in 1957 when Mr. Lodge won in an hour and 37 minutes.

Gloria Arsenault of Bloomfield, the only lady contestant this year, completed the course in two hours and 15 minutes.

Davison Biggar has now won the three-mile swim on three occasions. Maurice Lodge, a contestant ever since the swim was initiated, has won twice and placed second three times.

Gloria Arsenault, who failed to complete the course last year, was complimented for her determination in coming back again to win the first prize for ladies.

A cold wet day made things most uncomfortable for the large number of spectators but wind and tides favoured the swimmers and accounted for the record breaking times.

The half-mile swim, held for the first time, was won by Elmer Gallant of Summerside. Other finishers were Herbie Murphy of Georgetown, second; Irving Broderick, Alberton, third; David Bernard, St. Eleonors, fourth and Gerald Mitchell of Charlottetown, fifth.
