Steady Increase In Ferry Traffic Via Wood Islands

The steady increase in traffic via the Wood Islands route is clearly demonstrated by the increase shown in August of this year compared to the figures for the same month of 1950.

During August of this year the service carried 21,238 passengers, 5,559 autos and 911 trucks. This compares favorably with the 21,042 passengers, 5,323 autos and 998 trucks transported in the same month of 1950.

Since the Northumberland Ferries renewed their service on May 1 of this year they have handled 55,674 passengers, 14,479 autos and 3,248 trucks. These figures can be compared to those for the same period last year when there were 51,745 passengers, 13,558 autos and 3,261 trucks moved between Wood Islands and Caribou.
